Whoa, Now!

We're anxious to get down to see the new Mercury at Hoover-McAtee. Next to hunting and fishing, probably our favorite sport is looking over the new automobile models each year. Today's showing of the Mercury will wind up Spur dealers with '35 models, including the Chevrolet, Ford, Oldsmobile, Pontiac, Cadillac, Dodge, and Plymouth.

Remember how many laughed at Homer for his "chamber of commerce estimate" of over 12,000 bales of cotton in the county? Well, the total figures to date haven't been gathered, but the county's ginning is nearing the 20,000 mark!

Both private and government lending agencies in town report that most farmers are exceeding their expectations in meeting obligations, and Spur merchants are enjoying the beginning of what will probably be the largest Christmas season in four years. Wonder just what effect the November election had on the better times that seem to be coming back!

A good, slow, soaking rain over the area along about now to boost wheat prospects, etc.—ah, but that's dream-talk—but such would be nice, wouldn't it?

We believe that our City Manager Wilburn Spray stands a good chance at being right in his assertion that the City needs additional generating equipment if we are to profitably remain in the power and light business—and we believe that the results of the not-yet-forgetten light plant election indicated that the majority of our citizens want to stay in the business.

Most of us, a laymen, lack the technical knowledge to intelligently survey the city's power output facilities and have to rely on what the experts tell us as being facts. If we can consider F. O. Pusey, Director of Electrical Services of the City of Lubbock, an expert, then let's consider what he has to say about the situation here.

(The following letter, dated Nov. 22, 1954, is addressed to the City Manager.)

"It was a privilege last Wednesday to have occasion to discuss with you the problems confronting the electric system of the City of Spur.

"I have had an opportunity to study the operating figures you gave me covering a period of five years, and would like to mention some revealing facts which confirm your line of thinking indicated in our discussion.

"In observing the electric kilowatt demand on the municipal generating station it is evident that your city experienced some abnormal conditions at the beginning of years 1952 and 1953. An abnormal drop in electric demand was indicated during these periods; however, the current year of 1954 indicates an even greater increase than the general trend over the five year period.

"With the present capacity of your plant, this means that you have only two alternatives: (1) increase the capacity of your plant before next summer, or (2) negotiate to decrease the connected load before next year's summer peak hit. The latter would of course be detrimental to your city's progress, because there would be even less net revenue available for the city's use than is available this year.

"These comments are supported by the fact that you have a total capacity of 746 in the five units now installed. Allowing for the largest unit to be out of service during the peak provides a firm capacity of 250 KW. The peak demand this year reached 580 KW in August, and that is a condition NO engineer desires to 'sweat through'. You were fortunate in having all units serviceable at that time.

"It is reasonable to predict that your existing connected load will experience an even higher demand next summer, since the demand last August was 21.7% higher than the same period the previous year, and 12% higher than any previous year.

"The logical step would be to add generating capacity as you need it. Then you would have a steadily programming system that would provide the citizens of Spur the security in electric service that they expect, and duty deserve.

"I certainly hope that you can arrange a satisfactory financing

Political Announcement

Doctor Robert J. Wasson of Snyder, Texas is submitting his candidacy for State Senator of the 24th Senatorial District in the special election to be held on December 11th, made the following statement:

"I am thirty-six years old. After my discharge following more than five years army service and after completing my medical studies and training, returned to this District and have since practiced medicine and surgery in Snyder. I am married and have two children, a boy nine and a girl three years old.

I represent no special group. I am a citizen like the other candidates in this race. As such I am interested in the civil affairs of our District and our people as well as their physical and bodily pains. I am offering myself as a candidate for the State Senate because I think a well rounded democracy should have representatives of all walks of life in its legislature. Not in many years has there been a medical doctor or surgeon in the State Senate, yet each year the State spends millions of dollars of tax money for public health and sanitation projects and upon our State Hospitals.

A big portion of all of the expense of our State Government is now borne by taxes upon our virgin natural resources which God has seen fit to provide for us here in Texas. When these natural resources are depleted as they surely will be, first a greater portion and then all of the cost of State Government will have to be born by our farms and ranches and the industries. We hope to have by then, with the threat of drought and unstable prices our agriculture, farming and ranching can not assume the big end of the current expense of State Government and still carry on the necessary building and expansion program in our State Institutions which the growing population will require. The only solution to this is that while we have taxes from natural resources every dollar spent be required to set its full value to the State. It is generally believed that full value is not now realized to the State for each tax dollar spent. As your Senator, I shall study carefully each building plan and insist on full value for every dollar spent so that we may have as much of our building program behind us as possible before our natural resources become depleted.

The Big Springs State Hospital for the insane and mentally ill is less than forty miles from many people living near my office, yet my patients are required to go about one hundred and fifty miles to another State Hospital. This is an additional unnecessary expense to the County as well as the patient and his family. As your Senator, I shall insist upon an appropriation equitably serve the patients from for the Big Springs State Hospital large enough that it can ad all the adjoining counties to Howard and this area. I shall study carefully the districting for the hospitals and insist that for the convenience of the patients and their families that the patient be committed to the hospital closer to his home. I shall work to the end that more money be spent for equipment where needed and less on decorative granite. I shall work for better research staffs in our hospitals so that our State Hospital may become institutions for cure and not merely for incarceration. I shall attempt to guide the cancer research program which may be entered into

by the State. There is no adequate State Hospital or School in Texas for the feeble minded. I shall strongly support the movement already well under way to establish a school to train mentally retarded children and help them to grow into useful citizens. As your Senator, I shall favor the complete reorganization of the Abilene State Hospital for Epileptics, to give it additional research staff and equipment.

I shall favor no law that will hamper in any way the development of oil, gas and other minerals or will place any under burden on the land owner or the developer in this District.

As your Senator, I shall not favor a tax for road purposes on gasoline used in the fields. Our farmers in this District already have all they can do to combat drought and other hazards without placing on them additional burden. The amount of money that this tax would bring to the State would be negligible to the State but would be a big burden on the farmer.

I am for private enterprise first, last and always. I am no more for socialized medicine than I would be for socialized farming and I do not favor either.

I feel that the present workmen's compensation law is inadequate and I am open minded to suggested conservative changes, but I shall favor no law

that will take away the working man's constitutional right of trial by jury.

I shall represent the people of this District and their general welfare above and beyond any special or minority group including my own profession.

It has recently been called to the attention of all of us that our insurance laws are inadequate to protect the insured. Advertising is in many instances misleading and the assets and reserve of many insurance companies are not sufficient. As your Senator, I shall insist on legislation to correct these deficiencies.

Until the time that the pension of the old aged, needy and blind shall be suspended by the Social Security Program, I shall favor liberal payments in line with the increased cost of living.

Although we do not have as much underground water for irrigation in this District as many of our neighboring districts, I realize a need for water conservation. I believe that control of soil erosion and other soil conservation measures is the best manner of water conservation in our District, but I shall study all underground and surface laws to be submitted, and there will be many, to see that they are favorable to our District.
