In your column "Whoa, Now!" of December 2, you commented upon the need for "experts" to provide "technical knowledge" as to the City's power output facilities and future needs. In editorial fairness I'm sure you'll want your readers to know what others think of "expert advice". You are correct—we do need unbiased advice.

Last November (1933), in the Texas Spur we were told: "Indicated profits (City Plant) for 1933: \$118,722.40." (This "expert" guess was almost twice the actual paper profit.)

and the engines in the Spur plant are in excellent condition and should give dependable service for at least 20 years."

and the engines can be converted to either natural or Propane gas!

and on the street corners you board, "The plant is paid for and we have an excellent system."

Now, we are told in the Texas Spur:

"Lines are overloaded, sections of the city are without much needed street lights, currents are fluctuating, and excessive line loss on insufficient wiring is triple what it should be."

and "If the City were to install a new LP gas burning unit large enough to carry the full load, the rest of the plant could be used for stand-by service." (A short 20 years.)

and "But this type of equipment does not operate economically on diesel at present cost." (Last year "experts" said the engines could be converted to Propane.)

and "We feel certain that you want and deserve the best electrical service possible."

We certainly do deserve the best and most economical service. We do need expert and unbiased advice. Can Mr. Posey, an employee of a municipal system give unbiased advice? No! Let's skip "expert advice" from municipal employees, machinery salesman, and utility engineers! Let's stop guessing, stop listening to "local experts" stop depending upon biased advice.

Let's employ an independent state licensed engineer to make a real sure enough survey of our system, its present and future needs. Before we go in debt another \$150,000.00 to \$200,000.00 to the machinery concerns, let's get some real professional, unbiased expert advice.

Palace To Introduce Wide Screen Sunday

Wide screen movies will make their debut in Spur at the Palace theatre Sunday, Dec. 16, with the showing of "Carnival Story". Without missing a single show, a new 34x16 cinemascope screen has been under construction at the theatre. J. D. McClain, manager, states that all regular films will be shown on the new wide screen with a 27x16 picture instead of the old 15x12. The cinemascope films will use the full 34-foot width of the screen.

McClain reports that four cinemascope films have been booked for the month of January, including "How to Marry a Millionaire", "Beneath the 12 Mile Reef", "New Faces", and "Hell and High Water".

According to the local manager, the arrival of cinemascope will not cause any advance in admission prices except when films are released by the producers as advanced admission price shows. The January shows will all be at regular prices.

Boys Win Over Chiefs In First Home Court Game

The Spur basketball team took trophies at the Abernathy tournament last week end, but did set a six-year scoring record in whipping Post 62-46.

Spur opened play in the tournament against the team that went on to win the first place trophy—Meadow—losing 34-55.

In the post game everyone got in on the scoring, led by Bruce Johnson with 22, Ronnie Ensey scored 16, George McAteer 19 and Donald Smogras 13.

Blanton eliminated Spur in the consolation final 50-54. McAteer was top scorer for Spur with 13. Beat Crosbyton in Thriller.

The fans really got their money's worth as Spur played its first home game here Tuesday night. Nip and tuck all the way, the Bulldogs emerged on top of a 57-54 score. Crosbyton led at the end of the first quarter 15-12, and at the half 29-26. Spur flipped ahead 43-42 as the third quarter ended.

Johnson led the scoring with 21, followed by Ensey with 14. The B team game also was a thriller, only Spur lost 36-37. Dan Wright turned in 11 points to lead Spur scorers.

Coch Sam Hawkes announced this week that Abernathy has been granted their request to swap home games with Spur to permit their girls' team to enter the H-SU tournament on Feb. 4.

On Jan. 18 Spur will go to Abernathy, and on Feb. 4 Abernathy will come here, minus their girls team. The district girls game will be played here on Thursday, Feb. 17.

Spur will next see action in the Tournament of Champions in Lewistown Dec. 31, Jan. 1. The next home game is with Floydada on Jan. 4.

Girls Win Trophy In Abernathy Tourney

The Spur high school's girls basketball team won the consolation trophy at the Abernathy tournament last week end, losing only to Meadow, the team that won the championship.

In the consolation bracket Coach Billy Hahn's charges defeated Crosbyton 31-29 and then swamped Littlefield 50-28. Carol Gordon was leading scorer in the Meadow and Crosbyton games with 13 and 16 points respectively. Jane Simpson led in the scoring against Littlefield with 20 points.

Gerakline Thomason, Bette Grogan and Gennyce Taylor did the guard duties in the tournament.

Tuesday night in the local gym Spur fans saw three freshman guards do exceptional service during most of the game, only to lose to Crosbyton 36-39 in a thriller. They were Jean Bostic, Nelda Hahn and Nell Smith. 'Twas the 3rd quarter that was fatal to the Spur girls, giving up 18 points in that period while scoring only 7. Spur led at the half 30-16. Carol Gordon was leading point-maker with 13.

The girls will resume play after the holidays, missing Floydada here Jan. 4.

David Ratliff Elected State Senator Sat.

David Ratliff of Jones County walked away from six other candidates in the special election last Saturday for State Senator of the 24th district.

Here in Dickens County a tight vote went 68% for the brother of local attorney L. D. Ratliff. David received 288 of the 424 votes cast in the county. Pat Bullock, who ran a weak second over the whole district, mustered 76 votes in the county. Morrow 28, Wasson 17, Latifer 12, Sorrells 3 and Latimer none.

Koonsman To Head Defense Dund Drive

Mr. J. D. Koonsman of Dickens, has been named as chairman of Dickens County on the Texas United Defense Fund, the statewide group which will sponsor USO's Campaign for \$775,000 in Texas this year. The quota for Dickens County is \$504. At present there are 304 servicemen from Dickens County serving in the Armed Forces.

Mr. Koonsman was appointed today by Mr. J. R. Whitworth, cashier at the First State Bank in Matador, who is District Chairman of the forthcoming fund appeal to carry on the familiar services of the USO to the young men and women of the Nation's Armed Forces.

A major portion of the Texas goal, as in 1933, will be included in the community chest and United Fund Campaign throughout the state this fall.

Farmers Vote To Continue Controls

The cotton farmers of Dickens County, the state of Texas and the nation voted overwhelmingly for the continuation of the cotton acreage control project in a referendum election Tuesday, Dec. 14.

In the county there are approximately 1,600 eligible voters in such elections. Only 282 cast their ballots. Of these 267 voted to continue the plan now in effect, and only 15 voted against it.

The program calls for cotton acreage to be no more than 18,113,200 acres. This year's acreage was 21,400,000.

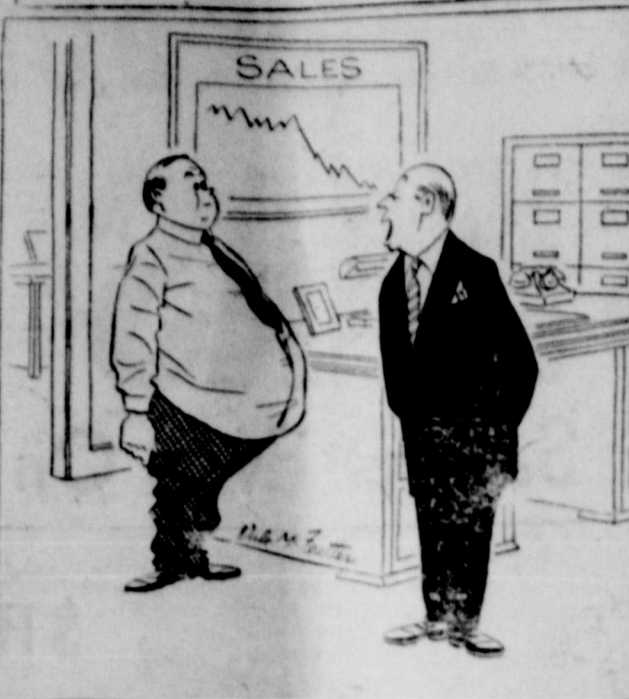

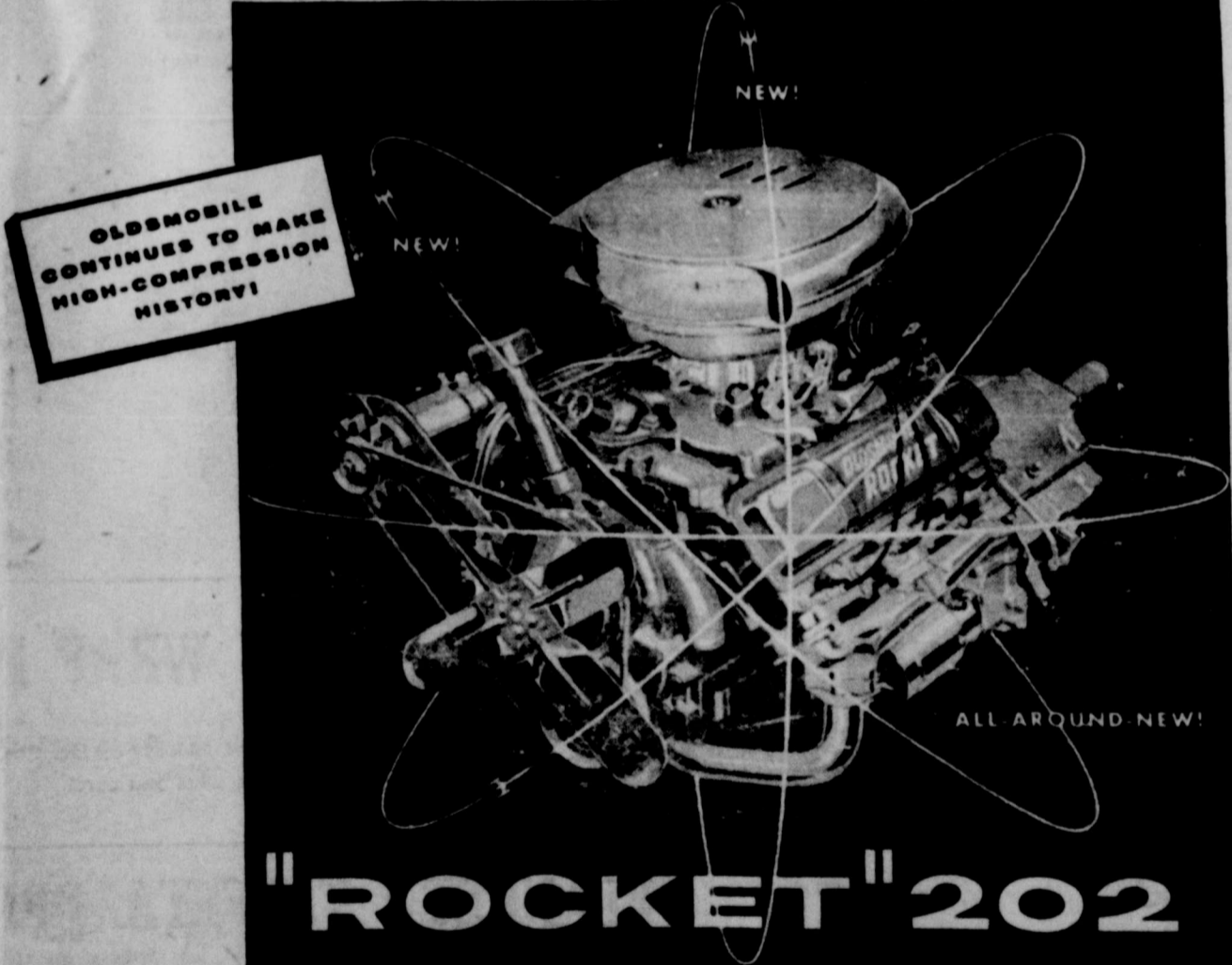

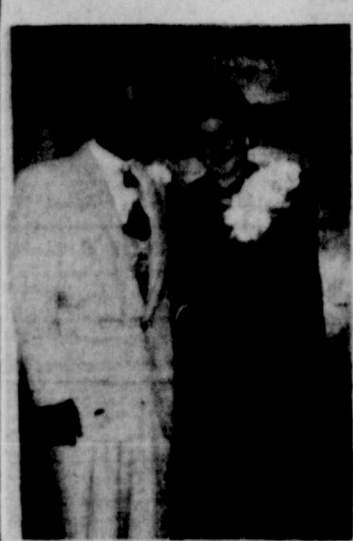

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

Moisture received last week in amounts from 5 to 1.5 inches in this part of the Duck Creek District will assure recovery and further growth of winter cover crops, and small grain. It was sufficient in many instances to assure effective listing of cotton stubble land to prevent blowing. District supervisors are urging co-operators to take immediate steps to either chisel or list cotton stubble land which is blowing.

Would you like a farmstead shelter around your farmstead to serve as a windbreak as well as its value in improved appearance to your home? The District Supervisor has arranged with the Lubbock Nursery Association to secure Arizona Cypress Potted Plants at a reduced rate of 25c each. Other types of shrubs and trees to use in connection with the Arizona Cypress in the shelterbelt are available from the Texas Forest Service at \$1.50 per hundred plants. Any co-operators who are interested in a farmstead shelterbelt should contact their district supervisor or the Soil Conservation Service, 206 North Burlington in Spur.

An excellent stand of Rye and Vetch on the Lonia Lewis farm near Deer Lake is doing a very effective job of controlling

flowing on deep sandy soils. The rye and vetch was planted in October and fertilized with 200 lbs. super phosphate per acre.

Support prices and acreage allotments will be important factors in the outlook for cotton in 1955. Domestic mills are expected to consume more cotton than in 1954 and exports likewise are expected to jump by 700,000 bales.

Careful planting and increased farm efficiency are the tools Texas farmers must use in 1955 to fill the gaps caused by lower farm income, acreage allotments and adverse weather.

Cash outlays for soil and water conservation can be charged as farm expense—rather than farm capital—under recent changes in the Internal Revenue Code, making them income tax deductible.

Detailed information on the changes may be obtained from Internal Revenue representatives.

SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION NOW COMES OFF INCOME TAX FOR FORMERS

Cash outlays for soil and water conservation can be charged as farm expense—rather than farm capital—under recent changes in the Internal Revenue Code, making them income tax deductible.

A host of land and water improvements are included in the change, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, who urges farmers to check further into the new ruling. Costs of soil and water improvements are not deductible in excess of 25 percent of the gross farm income during the taxable year.

The remaining cost may be taken from the income in succeeding years at the rate of no more than 25 percent of gross earnings for each year. Amounts carried forward may go without limit until used up, Bates explains.

The specialist points to the phrase in the code "on land used in farming". He explains the ruling covers only land used by a taxpayer or his tenant, either before or at the time of the improvement for the production of crops, fruits or other agricultural products or for the raising of livestock.

The ruling covers costs of treatment of moving earth, including leveling, grading and terracing and contour farming; the construction, control and protection and diversion of channels, drainage ditches, earthen dams, water-courses, outlets and ponds; the eradication of brush... and the planting of windbreaks.

Costs for purchase, construction, installation or improvement of structures, appliances or facilities, however, which are subject to regular depreciation may not be taken as ordinary expense.

OUTLOOK FOR LIVESTOCK FEEDS AND HAYS IN 1955

Livestock feeds and hays in 1955 are expected to cost Texas farmers about the same as this year.

Prices of high protein feeds will probably hold steady and the cost of cotton-seed meal probably will rise this winter and continue high into 1955, predicts John G. McFarney, extension agricultural economist. A rather marked difference in prices of individual feeds is on the '55 horizon.

By individual feeds the economist sees it this way: Shipments of hay to Texas will continue for the duration of the drought. Hay supplies for the nation as a whole are above last year but supplies in the Southwest are very short.

Corn-The '54 corn crop does not meet local requirements and later in the marketing year, prices probably will rise above

those of a year earlier. Sorghum grain. The 8,900,000 acre harvest of grain sorghum this year in the U. S. was the third largest in history. With a normal growing season in '55 prices probably will not improve.

Oats and barley—Oat supply are near record levels. Prices for this commodity and for barley are expected to average lower than normal in relation to the price of corn. High production again this year paves the way to a depressed market for oats next year.

"Stored Grain Insects" is the title of a new publication released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Insects prevention and control of insects which infest stored grain are among the subjects covered in the new bulletin. It is available from local county agents or by mail from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station.

Fruit trees should be checked carefully for fruit buds before the pruning job is done. Unfavorable weather has caused sub-normal terminal growth on fruit trees in all parts of Texas. Where this condition exists, very little pruning should be done.

Now is the time to check orchards for San Jose scale. A dormant spray—three gallons of 57 percent oil emulsion in 100 gallons of water—will give effective control provided every inch of bark on the tree is thoroughly covered with spray.

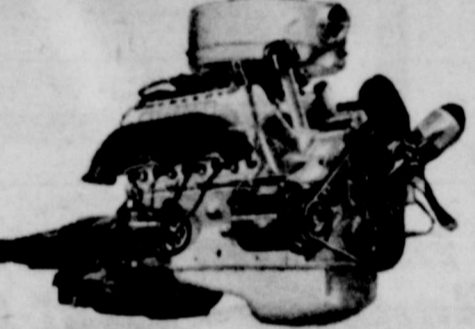

AMERICAN 'BILL OF RIGHTS' EXPLAINED
 The American "Bill of Rights," consisting of the first ten amendments to the United States Constitution, was adopted in one time in 1791. It is a guarantee of a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Noted by subsequent amendments as jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today.

Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, speech, and of the press. The same article protects the right of peaceful assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

 The process of law enforcement emphasizes not only the physical guarantees. Every American is secured against being seized twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; and against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation.
 He is also secured against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamously crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no man shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly legal procedures, or due process of law.
 The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to confront witnesses and to have the as-

istance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights".
 Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.
 Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the unyielding intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."
 The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."
 Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed", has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.
