



JULY TO NOVEMBER FARM EXPORTS UP 4 PERCENT

Exports of agricultural commodities from the United States during the July-November period are estimated at \$1,000,000,000, a gain of 4 percent over the same period for 1954.

According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, farm exports in November are estimated at about \$275,000,000, or 11 percent greater than the monthly average in the first quarter of the current fiscal year but 18 percent less for November of 1954. 
