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## Three Cities Ready To Advance Lake Plans

### Enthusiastic Spur Delegation Indicates Strong Local Favor Of Project

Over fifty citizens of Spur attended the meeting in Crosbyton last Thursday night to indicate Spur's interest in the proposed project to dam White River and create a lake to furnish water for Spur, Post and Crosbyton.

The meeting was attended by well over 200 representing the three principally interested cities and Ralls and Lorenzo.

Col. Freeze of the Freeze and Nichols engineering firm of Fort Worth discussed the project in as much detail as is available at this time. He showed the proposed location as being about a mile north of the Kalgary bridge across White River. He said the lake would hold 40,000 acre-feet of water and would have approximately 25 miles of shoreline.

He explained that the dam would be earthen and the water at the dam would be approximately 45 feet deep.

The cost of the project was estimated by Freeze as being "substantially less than a million dollars." (The estimated cost had erroneously been reported previously as being two and a quarter million dollars.)

It was estimated that the entire project including preliminary work would take from three to four years to complete. It would include the dam, a filter plant and pipe lines to the three cities.

The cost of the water delivered to Spur was estimated at from 18 to 20 cent, per 1,000 gallons. This cost would include the re-estimate of revenue bonds and the construction of the pipe line. Mayor Walter Gruben pointed out that such a cost in Spur would be almost entirely above the present cost of water.

However rough figuring in round numbers indicates that this additional cost would average \$2.50 per month per water meter in Spur, based on the present number of meters and water consumption.

By standing vote those attending the meeting agreed to request the three city governments to appoint a committee to continue the plans and to authorize the expenditure of approximately \$3,000 for core drilling and other expenses.

The Patton Springs Future Farmers of America and 4-H Club members of this community are holding their annual Junior Livestock Show at the Patton Springs High School on February 17, 1956. All who are interested in seeing a good livestock show are invited to attend.

The boys are very interested in showing the public what they have accomplished since the beginning of school. There will be young boys competing with older boys to see who will walk off with the Grand Champion banners. There will be keen competition all the way.

There will also be a good prize for the boy who does the best job in handling his animal during the showmanship judging.

Two very capable livestock judges have been selected by the boys for this occasion. Doing the judging will be Johnny V. Stephens, manager of Red Lake Cattle Corporation, of Matador and Bill Gregory, supervisor of the high school Vocational Agriculture Department of Spur. Gregory was again selected this year as a result of the fine job he did last year.

Also expected to attend is Walter Labay, supervisor of Vocational Agriculture Education with the Texas Education Agency, of Plainview. Labay is a former agricultural teacher of Spur. The Patton Springs school official will also assist with the show.

## County Farmers To Be Surveyed On Expenditures

## Council Names Trio On Lake Committee

Robert Lewis, L. D. Ratliff and Lynn Burbee were appointed by the City Council Tuesday night as the Spur members of the committee to further investigate the proposed Spur - Post - Crosbyton lake project on White River.

The committee has been formed to take care of such matters as core-drilling the dam site and keeping the project rolling up until a water district can be formed and a permanent board elected.

The committee will meet in Post Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at the city hall.

Serving on the committee with the Spur men will be Dr. A. C. Suman, Tom Boucher and Rube Jennings, representing Post, and Dr. Dale Rhoades, Robert Works and Perry Bell, representing Crosbyton.

The Spur City Council also agreed Tuesday night to underwrite the city's portion of the estimated \$3,000 expenditure needed to advance the project at this time. No definite means of raising the approximate \$1,000 was decided upon. The two methods considered were to pay it out of the general fund or to tax each water meter in town on one month's billing. Considerable interest has been shown in taking private donations to raise the amount. The suggestion came from private citizens and not from the council.

## PATRONS ASK BOARD TO BUILD COMPLETE HIGH SCHOOL PLANT

At the request of approximately 150 Spur school patrons, the Spur Independent School Board of Trustees, called off the \$100,000 bond election originally called for yesterday.

The board originally called the election to approve a \$100,000 bond issue to build a cafeteria, a homemaking cottage, stadium dressing rooms and do needed repairs. Following the calling of this election the board felt that public sentiment favored a much larger building program, so the public meeting was called for last Monday to hear the people.

Discussions at the meeting included the system's present tax set-up and the possibility of a substantially heavier tax load.

The larger building program

indicated by those attending the meeting, as believed by Supt. B. G. Nunley to be the system's needs in the near future includes a complete new high school plant. This would include, stated Nunley, ten classrooms, a science lab, homemaking department, gymnasium, auditorium, cafeteria, band facilities and vocational agriculture facilities. The estimate of cost offered by an architect present was from \$450,000 to \$500,000.

The exact effect of such a bond issue on the present school taxes is not certain yet, explained Nunley, because the new calculation

Farmers Urged To Keep Records

Farmers should keep adequate records in order to be able to file complete tax returns, John R. Robinson, Administrative Officer, Lubbock Internal Revenue announced today.

"By all means keep a complete record of all your income, and all your expenses from your farming operation," Mr. Robinson continued. "Keep your records up to date by recording daily each sale of a farm product and each expense for feed, fertilizer, and other farm expenses..."

"Many more tax returns from farmers will be received this year," Robinson added. "This is true because the coverage of farm operators by social security will require a tax return from every farmer who nets as much as \$400 from his farming, even if no income tax is payable..."

"If you are a farm operator, whether you raise peanuts, popcorn, pigs, poultry, or other farm product, you are obligated to pay self-employment tax and thereby earn social security credit, provided, of course that you net \$400 from your farming in the taxable year," Mr. Robinson said.

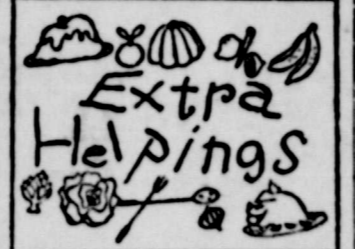

Temple oranges from Florida are juicy and the kind with a peel that zips off like that of the tangerine. The segments separate easily, too. Only about one out of 50 oranges grown in Florida is a Temple, and the season of enjoyment is short, generally January through March.

For fresh oysters, clams on the half-shell, or shrimp, a cocktail sauce with the tang of Tabasco pleases the palate. Here's a recipe of satisfaction: 1 cup catchup, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco, 1 tablespoon horseradish, 2 tablespoons minced celery, and 1 teaspoon grated onion. Mix and chill well. YIELD: 1 1/2 cups sauce.

Evaporated milk lends itself beautifully to casserole sauces. Because water has been removed from this milk, it has double the milk solids and can be diluted with vegetable liquids or broth to get a more flavorful sauce. For a medium cream sauce, the proportions are: 2 tablespoons butter blended with 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup evaporated milk and 1 cup of vegetable or broth liquid. Season to taste.
