County To Realize \$257,527 In 'Bank Benefits' from 18,156 Acres

In Dickens County, 515 Soil Bank agreements have been signed, covering some 18,156 acres, reports W. W. Gunn, county ASC office manager.
When requirements are met, county farmers will receive approximately \$257,527.00 in Soil Bank payments, he states.
Wheat acreage signed up for the Bank total 8,617, and will bring the farmers approximately \$55,465.00. Cotton acreage totals 9,539 and will bring approximately \$202,062.00.

Friday Plow-up Deadline

County cotton farmers who have signed Soil Bank agreements are reminded by Gunn that they must destroy cotton on Soil Bank acreage by tomorrow, Friday, Aug. 3. Gunn, Tom Green, and two local office clerks will go to Childress on Aug. 9 to get the necessary information and equipment to process Soil Bank farms for payment. Gunn states that processing and measuring will begin immediately after the Childress meeting.

County Placed In Drouth Area

The Dickens County ASC office received notification this week that Dickens County has been declared a drouth county and is eligible for participation in the emergency drouth feed program.
The ASC committee has made application for the county to obtain permission to graze Soil Bank acreage. This permission is expected in the next few days.
W. W. Gunn, office manager of the Dickens County ASC, states that being in the drouth area does not automatically mean permission to graze Soil Bank land, but that heretofore the practice of the USDA has been to grant such permission.

Being in the drouth area permits ranchers and stock farmers to purchase emergency feed at a substantial discount to carry base herds.
Applications for such feed are available at the local FFA office.

GINNERS, BUSINESSMEN OFFER \$500 BONUS FOR FIRST BALE

Area gins and Spur businessmen will offer a \$500.00 bonus this year for the first bale of cotton grown and ginned within the Spur trade territory.

Thirteen gingers and businessmen met in Dyess Hall Tuesday night as guests of the Spur Security Bank, and laid plans for the eligibility and presentation of the largest bonus offered on the first bale in recent years.

Robert Lewis, president of the bank, led the discussion of the bonus plan. The project was discussed thoroughly by the group with general acceptance and enthusiasm shown. Bill Glenn, president of the Spur Chamber of Commerce, told the group that the chamber was strongly in favor of the project and is ready to go to work on it.

The gingers and businessmen present decided on a \$500 bonus for this year's crop and agreed to make the bonus an annual event with hopes of larger premiums in years to come.

Eleven area gins will be invited to participate. The various gin managers have not all yet been contacted, but general acceptance is anticipated. Areas hoped to be included are Dickens, Girard, Afton, East Afton, McAdoo, Glenn, Calgary and Spur. Eleven gins are in the area.

The gingers and chamber representatives have drawn up the following eligibility rules for the 1956 \$500 bonus:

1. Farmer must have ginned with a participating gin last year.
a. Or cotton must be grown on farm from which cotton was ginned with a participating gin last year.
b. Must be grown within the area generally considered as Spur trade territory.
c. Must be grown during current season.

2. Bale must weigh 450 lbs. or more.
3. Bale must be delivered to corner of Burlington and Harris Streets in Spur.

4. Bonus to be given solely to operator.
5. Bonus money to be held in escrow by Spur Chamber of Commerce and is to be paid upon approval of governing body.

6. A gin representative from each participating area will compose the governing body to make final ruling on eligibility of first bale.

WARD, FINCH RE-ELECTED; COUNTY BACKS YARBOROUGH for GOVERNOR

Cleo Rogers and J. L. Koonsman go into the run-off for sheriff of Dickens County. In Precinct 3, Arner Watson and Russell Williams will vie for the commissioner's office.

Elected in Saturday's primary were Roy Ward as commissioner of Precinct 1, and C. A. Finch was elected Constable of Precinct 3. Both Ward and Finch now hold the respective offices.

In the governor's race, Dickens County went slightly different from the rest of the state, favoring Yarborough with 712, O'Daniel second with 601, and Daniel third with 535.

For Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District, Dickens County voters heavily favored Judge Alton B. Chapman, furnishing nearly one half of his winning margin.

In the county, Judge Chapman led 1656 to Martin's 274. At latest reports Judge Chapman won the race by an approximate 3,000-vote margin.

John Stapleton carried a large majority in Dickens County as he retained his District Attorney's office. Stapleton polled a total of 1431 in Dickens County to H. A. C. Brummett's 546.

The county is promised two very close run-off contests in that in both the sheriff's race and the Precinct 3 Commissioner's race, the third candidates were not even close. Sheriff Rogers tallied 899 with Koonsman very close behind with 830. Homer Jackson was third man with 342.

Commissioner Watson received 618 in his bid for re-election and will run-off with Williams who got 560. J. W. Pickens was third with 70.

The second primary will be held on Saturday, Aug. 25. Elected without opposition in Dickens County and the area were County Attorney Alfred Walker, U. S. Representative George Mahon and State Representative M. L. Kelly.

Publication begins this week of the nine proposed state constitutional amendments to be voted on by Texas voters at the general election on Nov. 6 and a special election on Nov. 13.

The proposed amendments will be published four consecutive weeks.

Officers Catch Car Thief Tues.

Nine district cooperators are making plans to plant about 400 acres of vetch in irrigated land during the next few weeks. A special broadcast seeder has been purchased by the district for use in the seeding operation which is done at the time the cotton receives its last cultivation. Irrigated soils on which cotton has been grown continuously for several years has begun to decline in soil condition and productivity due to the lack of organic matter. The generally poor quality of irrigation water likewise contributes to the poor soil condition by the accumulation of undesirable salts which evaporate out of the irrigation water.

Vetch, being a legume with a very extensive root system, has proved to be one of our best plants for restoring organic matter, adding nitrogen to the soils, and improving its physical condition. District Cooperators who will plant vetch are Pean Ebu-

gart, Elmer Shugart, Victor Arrington, Willie Williams, T. B. Watson, Joe T. Hale, Sr., Joe T. Hale, Jr., Connie Roberts and Neal Chastain.
Victor Arrington is all smiles over his splendid planting of 30 acres of Blue panic grass. The grass is now from 18 to 30 inches tall and seeding out. The planting was made in early May.
Building stock water dams has received the attention of several ranchers the last few weeks. W. J. Collier, S. D. Hayes, Jr., Wallace Conaway and A. C. Alexander have completed dams. SCS Technician John F. Moore assisted in the layout of the work.
The District supervisors, during their regular July meeting, made plans to encourage farmers to plant soil improving and cover crops this late summer and early fall on all lands that are subject to blow.

"PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 41a, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not transferable for vocational rehabilitation, who are residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be entitled to any completely State approved institution, providing that the assistance shall have the priority that is accorded to the Government of the United States for the permanently and totally disabled individuals receiving such aid; that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of Federal funds; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of Federal funds; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for any individual may not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year.

Section 1. The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States the amount paid to any individual who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap.

Section 2. The proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1956, at which election there shall be printed on the ballot the following clause:

Section 3. The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States the amount paid to any individual who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap.

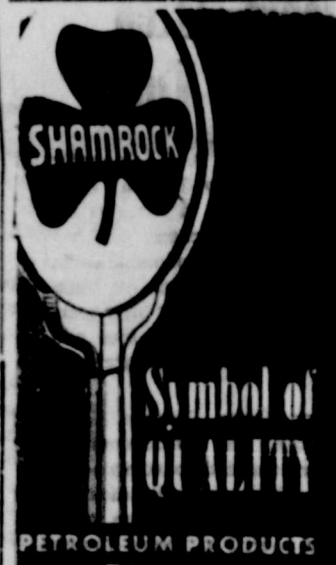

"Proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at an election to be held on November 6, 1954."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 114, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

SECTION 114. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore and a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient.

SECTION 115. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all of the ballots shall have contained thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

SECTION 116. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41 proposing an amendment to Article XVII, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas changing the term of the Clerk of the Office to include appointive officers of the State.

SECTION 1. The Section 1 of Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other appointive officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State, and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected, appointed, or confirmed.'"

The Secretary of State, and all other appointive officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State, and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the term of the Clerk of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

SECTION 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1936.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas, to change the membership of the Veterans Land Board. The proposed amendment provides that the number of members shall be increased to two hundred million dollars.

Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and interest on deferred payments, and all proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans Land Board. The board shall have the right to purchase additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of Texas, to provide that the Legislature shall have the right to remove any member of the State Board of Education.
