The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allen Shivers provides for an alocation of one millions dollars of federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such a program is needed.

Mr. Walter T. McKay, Texas State Director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, Director of Credit Services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA County Offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates. The County Offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make daily reports on the tonnage reuirements covered by such appliations to Mr. McKay's office. Mr. McKay has been asked to olicit the assistance of the Texas USDA Drought Committee and the Office of the Governor in making a careful reappraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements. Mr. Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires Secretary Benson, the Deportment will continue to work closewith Governor Shivers and ders in the State and give all istance possible within authorty and funds available to the Department in providing assistance drought stricken farmers and anchers in Texas.


