

DESTROY COTTON STALKS WHEN HARVEST IS OVER

Conditions are Ideal for destroying cotton stalks and boll residue because of the early harvest

The use of stalk shredders is highly recommended since these machines kill many of the pink bollworms left in the field after cutting but that when the shredroll Robertson, Associate Directine ed material is spread thinly over temperatures will kill many of the dreaded worms.

Most dryland cotton, in areas where stalk destrution is recomnended, has or is now being harvested and the specialists again emphasize that stalk destruction should immediately follow har-

vest. They point out too, that in years such as this one, all cotton insects are attracted to late irrigated fields. The farmer, they say, who attempts to produce a top crop on late irrigated cotton with being of great historical sig- will encourage a tremendous

population of boll weevils and pink bollworms. The earlier the stalks are destroyed the longer the insects.





"This year for the first time basic instruction will be given in radiation effects and monitoring instruments," McGill said. "The instruction will afford general familiarization with the hazards of radioactive contamination and the use of instruments required to detect and measure radiation."

McGill said the need for this instruction had become evident with the increased use, storage and shipment of radioactive ma-

"With this new training, fire and rescue workers will be able to evaluate radiation hazards and protect operating personnel working in and around contaminated areas," he added.

TEXAS WHEAT FARMERS SIGN MORE THAN 12,000 SOIL BANK CONTRACTS

Texas wheat farmers signed 12,-116 agreements and placed 919,-985 acres under the winter wheat Acreage Reserve program of the Soil Bank through October 5. The figures were released by the state office of the Agricultural Stabization and Conservation to A. B. Wooten, extension economist.

Wooten said if the farmers who have signed agreements comply with the requirements of the program, they will be eligible for a maximum of \$14,067,075 in Acreaage Reserve payments on the acreage pledged.

Aimed primarily at reducing price - depressing surpluses of wheat, corn, cotton, rice, tobacco and peanuts, the Acreage Reserve program of the Soil Bank is available only to producers having acreage allotments of these crops or a Soil Bank corn base acreage, Wooten. Program details for 1957 have been made available so far only for winter wheat see
