

There is no way to predict when medical care may be needed, reports Health Information Foundation, and no way to tell in advance how much this care may cost the family in any given year. A recently-published Foundation study shows that iliness and its ensuing costs are by no insurance is now spreading the risks of medical costs over large population.

In the 1953 study, for example, in the 1953 study, for example, is percent of the families questioned had no medical costs whatever, while II percent incurred 43 percent of the total bill for personal health services. 
