## Soil Temperature Nearing Ideal 60

The ten-day average minimum soil temperature at a six-inch depth has been 56 degrees, as recorded at the Spur Experiment Station.

Over the same ten days, the 12-inch reading was 58 degrees. The minimum and maximum for the period at the six-inch reading was 52 and 59 degrees.

Most farmers who depend upon the soil temperature to dictate their planting date, plant their cotton when the minimum temperature has averaged 60 degrees over a ten-day period. When the cloudy, rainy weather ceases and the area gets a few days of clear sunny weather, the soil temperature should begin to rise steadily.

District supervisors are meeting in regular monthly session today in Spur. The approval of conservation plans and making final plans for the observance of Soil Stewardship Week are the items coming up for attention. Soil Stewardship Week will be observed by districts throughout the nation the week of May 26 to June 1.

Cecil Estep has Blackwell switch grass coming up to a good stand following the recent rains. This improved strain of switch grass is becoming popular in this area. Estep's planting is a pure stand and planted in 40-inch rows.

Requests for fish for restocking purposes have been on the increase since the rains. Fish requests have been received from J. H. Daugherty, E. B. Blumberg, Paul D. Hagins and A. C. Alexander during the last two weeks. Fish are available through the district and applications may be

made through the Soil Conservation Service office in Spur.

New farms entering into cooperative agreement with the district recently are J. W. Vickery, Jr., J. B. Morrison, Jr., Paul D. Hagins, C. H. Harris and J. S. Perryman.

Field planning with district co-operators having conservation reserve land signed up in the soil bank program is receiving attention from SCS technicians. Technical assistance and advice is available to all participants in the program, points out John H. Taylor, Work Unit Conservationist of the Spur office. Planning to date indicates that about 70% of the land signed up in this program will be planted to native grasses for use as future pasture or range land. The remaining 30% will be planted to cultivated permanent grasses such as sorghum alnum, blue panic, or Johnson grass, points out the summary.

## Dates Set For May Distribution Of Surplus Commodities

Distribution of USDA commodities in Dickens County will be made on Thursday and Friday, May 16 and 17, states County Judge W. H. Hindman.

Judge Hindman stresses that applicants for the foodstuff who cannot come to the distribution point at the court house in Dickens in person, may send someone else only by sending a written request with the one to pick up the food. Even the wife of an applicant must have a written request to pick up the USDA surplus commodities for her husband, he adds.

In the near future, all applicants for the surpluses will be reviewed for eligibility except the persons who get old age assistance, reports Judge Hindman.

## Two Plans Told For CR Acreage

The Dickens County ASC office is now paying farmers \$2.50 per acre for seed bed preparation of land designated to the conservation reserve program of the soil bank, states W. W. Gunn, office manager.

Gunn states that farmers who have not yet done so, may apply for this financial assistance at the office.

He explains that farmers who have planned land in the conservation reserve program have two alternatives in complying for the program. First, he states, a farmer may choose to simply keep a cover crop on the land, planning to put it back in cultivation after the duration of the soil bank contract. If this route is to be taken any of the approved cover crops may be used, such as sorghum alnum, blue panic, perennial sudan, or Johnson grass. If a satisfactory stand is attained the farmer has complied.

The second alternative, explains Gunn, is to plan to put the land into permanent grass. If this plan is chosen, he will be required to put a cover crop on the first year to create a mulch in which the grass seed may be planted next spring. Approved mulch crops include grain sorghum, sweet sorghum, sudan, or millet.

Gunn explains that on either route the government offers considerable financial assistance.

He adds, however, that farmers must comply not only with soil bank regulations, but also all cotton and wheat acreage regulations to receive any soil bank assistance or rental.

New grower wheat allotment applications must be in the ASC office by July 1, states Gunn.

Wheat growers who have not yet destroyed excess wheat may apply for an extension of time to May 20, reports Gunn. The dead line is tomorrow, May 10.

### Shower Dumps 4 Here Wed.

The brief hail, with stone about finger-nail size, fell along with the rain but no damage was reported.

The thunder shower brought the month's total to 7 so far, at the station, on May 2, 21 fell; on May 1 a trace was recorded on May 3, and another trace on May 7.

The average fall for May is 2.97.

## RELUCTANCE SHOWN AT MEETING AS ALL BUT ONE AGREE ON LEASE

The lease contract between the City of Spur and West Texas Utilities Company was endorsed as "the best thing to do" at a meeting Tuesday night of ex-mayors and ex-councilmen on the lease proposal.

The mayor adds that two of the ex-councilmen were unable to attend the meeting, and one of those present still opposes the leasing of the light plant.

Mayor McNeill states that the meeting with the former leaders of the city was very constructive. He reports that reluctance was shown by several at the meeting, but, with the one exception, they agreed the lease arrangement is best for the city.

The meeting was held in conjunction with the regular Tuesday night city council meeting. Next Tuesday the council meeting will be devoted to an open discussion of the proposal. Anyone so desiring is invited to attend the meeting to ask questions

or enter the general discussion on the city's electric department and the proposal from West Texas Utilities.

Saturday week, May 18, 1957, is election day on the lease proposal.

At last Tuesday's meeting, one of the requests of the city dads was to have at least a condensation of the WTU proposed lease contract published. That condensation, along with the election order, is published in this issue on pages two and three.

## Mother Tells of Fun . . . SENIORS RETURN FROM FULL FOUR-DAY GALVESTON TRIP

As I try to put into writing some of the experiences we had with the seniors and teachers on our trip to Galveston, I would first like to express my thanks to the class for the privilege of being one of the mothers to go. I do not feel that I had done anything to deserve to be treated so royally, but I shall always feel that it is one of the highest honors I could receive.

When I began to plan for the trip I would look forward to it with excitement one day and the next have doubts and misgivings about whether I should go. Ride to Galveston and back on a school bus with 40 noisy high school students? But, I would tell myself, it was as much my responsibility as any other parent's; but now I am thanking you for the privilege of going.

The things we did might seem uninteresting to people who have traveled extensively, but very few in the class had ever been to the places we went, or stayed in such places as the Jack Tar Motel in Galveston, or the Statler Hilton Hotel in Dallas.

one half mile to where the Battleship Texas has been grounded in the mouth of a small channel. I believe that this stands out in everyone's mind as being one of the most interesting places visited.

We arrived in Galveston about 5 p. m. and some of the students did not lose much time in getting to the beach. We spent the next two nights and one day at this delightful place. We took a 14-mile ride on the ferry boat the first thing, and spent the rest of the morning on the beach. In the afternoon most of the girls and women went shopping, but none of the boys would go with us. (Most of them had been shopping with a woman before.)

Some of the class went skating for the first time with Coach Henry accompanying them. To use his own words to describe it, "The others did the skating, but we furnished the comedy." Poor Jodie Conway, out of the goodness of his heart, offered to teach some of them, but was soon dragged down with them so many times that he had to give up in despair.

Our first stop was about 2:00 a. m. in Abilene for gas. The next one, which we did not intend to make, was just past Santa Anna about 3:30 a. m., when the motor of our bus just died as we rode along the highway. Mr. Nunley came back to find us and then to find and wake a mechanic to locate the trouble.

With a new set of points, we were on our way in two hours with everyone still in high spirits.

We ate breakfast in Fredericksburg, then drove to Boerne where we went through the Cascade Cavern. It is only one half mile long, but interesting all the way.

After driving on to San Antonio we registered at the hotel (we aren't saying which one, because none of us can recommend it very highly). Everyone found a place to eat, and at 3:00 p. m. we went to Breckenridge Park and zoo. We had to rush back to see the piano before it closed at 5 p. m.

Most everyone went sightseeing that night but I was ready to call it a day.

We were ready to leave shortly after 6 a. m. for Galveston. We drove to Seguin where we all went to the same cafe for breakfast and Mr. Nunley and Coach Henry nearly had to change their orders from breakfast to lunch.

We drove through the edge of Houston and out to the San Jacinto monument by 1 p. m. After riding to the top of the monument and down, we drove about

Even though we had fun all the time, everyone could hardly wait to get home. We had a wonderful devotional service at 11:30 Sunday morning, led by Lyndal Womack, at a beautiful roadside spot.

We stopped for our last meal on the trip Sunday noon in Mineral Wells.

The nicest thing to me was getting to know the seniors and teachers better. I hope you will all be more thankful, as I am, that we have teachers who are not only teaching the subject matter of the text books but who are working equally as hard to teach them to become better men and women of tomorrow.

**TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS:**  
 TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Spur, Texas, on the 18th day of May, 1957, to determine whether or

not the City Council of said City of Spur, Texas shall be authorized to lease the lighting and electric distribution system and plant owned by the City of Spur for a cash rental of \$22,500.00 per year for a period of 40 years and upon such other terms and conditions as the City Council may deem proper and to the best interests of the City of Spur and its inhabitants; and which election was duly called and ordered by the order of the City Council of

said City, passed on the 30th day of April, 1957, and which election order is made a part of this Notice, and is in words and figures as follows:

 THE STATE OF TEXAS CITY OF SPUR COUNTY OF DICKENS  
 On this the 30th day of April 1957, the City Council of the City of Spur, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall in Spur, Texas, there being present and in attendance the following members of said City Council, to-wit:

and plant for a cash rental of \$22,500.00 per year for a term of 40 years plus certain other considerations in the form of reduction of rates to consumers and other agreements concerning a franchise tax to be paid each year to the City of Spur and all as set out in detail in the written proposal, the original of which is on file with the City Secretary. It was pointed out to the meeting that it is advisable for an election to be called and held at which the qualified voters of the City of Spur authorize such lease thereof by the City Council. After an examination of the proposal and a discussion thereof during which all members of the City Council agreed that it would be proper for the voters to pass upon the question at an election held for that purpose, Alderman Loyd Roberson made a motion that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Spur, Texas, a proposition as follows, to-wit:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Spur be authorized to lease the lighting and electric distribution system and plant owned by the City of Spur for a cash rental of \$22,500.00 per year for a period of 40 years and upon such other terms and conditions as the City Council may deem proper and to the best interests of the City of Spur and its inhabitants?"

The above motion was seconded by Alderman Rex Holder and carried by the following vote:  
 AYES: Mayor J. R. McNeill, and Aldermen Rex Holder, M. H. Bragg, W. K. Callan, Jackson East and Loyd Roberson.  
 NOES: None.  
 Thereupon, Alderman M. H. Bragg introduced an order calling an election for the purpose of submitting the proposition to a vote of the qualified voters of said City of Spur, and moved the passage and adoption of such order. The motion was seconded by Alderman Loyd Roberson.  
 The motion, carrying with the passage and adoption of the election order, prevailed by the following vote:  
 AYES: Mayor J. R. McNeill, and Aldermen Rex Holder, M. H. Bragg, W. K. Callan, Jackson East and Loyd Roberson.  
 NOES: None.  
**THE ELECTION ORDER IS AS FOLLOWS:**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Spur, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the qualified voters of the City of Spur, Texas, a proposition as to whether the City Council shall be authorized to lease the lighting and electric distribution system and plant owned by the City of Spur for a cash rental of \$22,500.00 per year for a period of 40 years and upon such other terms and conditions as the City Council may deem proper and to the best interests of the City of Spur and its inhabitants;

THEREFORE:  
**BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS:**

I.  
 That an election be held on the 18th day of May, 1957, which date is not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Spur, Texas, to-wit:

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**  
 "SHALL the City Council of the City of Spur, Texas, be authorized to lease the lighting and electric distribution system and plant owned by the City of Spur for a cash rental of \$22,500.00 per year for a period of 40 years and upon such other terms and conditions as the City Council may deem proper and to the best interests of the City of Spur and its inhabitants?"

II.  
 That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Spur, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

III.  
 That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:  
 HOMER DOBBINS, Presiding Judge; Lester Garner, Judge; Mrs. Jack Rector, Clerk; and Mrs. Leon Reagan, Clerk.

IV.  
 That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the General Laws of the State of Texas as provided therein, and only qualified voters shall be eligible to vote at such election.

V.  
**IT IS FURTHER ORDERED** that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with

The Election Code of the State of Texas, Chapter 492, passed by the 52nd Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

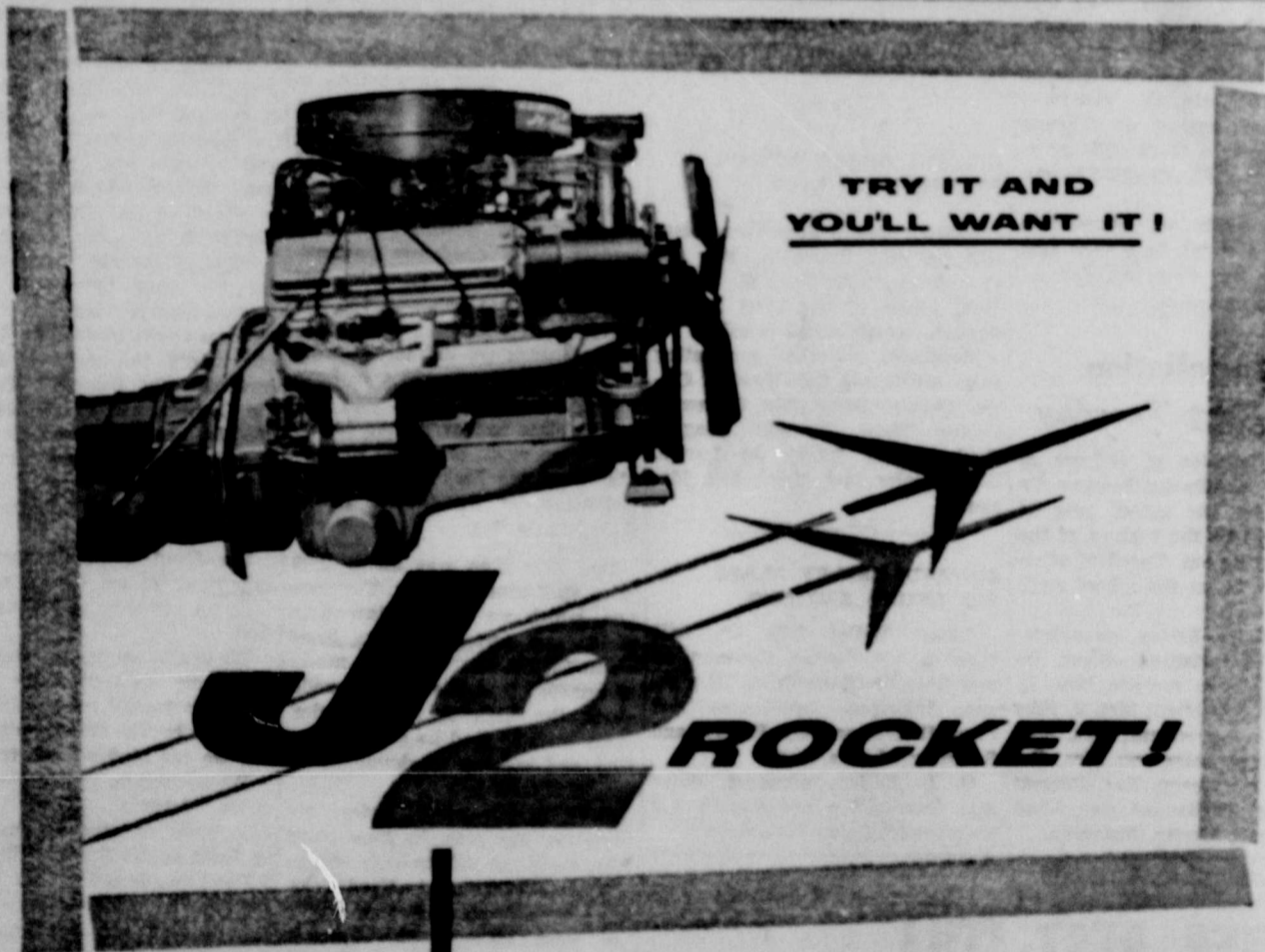

**A Condensation of the PROPOSED LEASE CONTRACT between the City of Spur and the West Texas Utilities Company.**

(The proposed lease contract, in double spaced typewriting, covers 18 legal size pages. The following is a mere condensation of the contract, and is an attempt to cover the high lights and basic provisions. Complete copies of the contract are on file at the City office and are open to inspection to all persons who are interested in all of the exact details.)

**PROPERTY COVERED BY THE LEASE:** All of the properties comprising the City's electric generating plant and distribution system, including land, buildings and machinery, except such items which are specifically exempted from the lease.

**PROPERTY SPECIFICALLY EXCEPTED AND NOT COVERED BY LEASE:** Cash, bills, notes and accounts receivable as of the effective date of the lease; all office furniture, fixtures, equipment and office supplies; all automobiles and trucks; the new Enterprise engine and all appurtenances thereto; all traffic signal lights; the sheet metal covered building located behind the main plant building; all electric operating material and supplies on hand, including fuel and lubricating oils; and all income from minerals and royalties and leases on minerals in connection with the City's properties.

**RIGHTS GRANTED BY THE COMPANY:** The right to operate and maintain the leased property

within the City and the right to use the streets and alleys and other public ways of the City for the operation of an electric distribution system to serve the electric needs and requirements of the inhabitants of the City.

**TERM OF THE LEASE:** Forty (40) years.

**CONSIDERATION TO BE PAID BY COMPANY TO CITY:** The sum of \$22,500.00 per year, plus a franchise tax payment amounting to two percent (2%) of the sum total of the annual revenue received by the Company from its domestic and commercial customers in the City of Spur, but such franchise tax is not to be paid on revenues received for services provided for industrial, municipal or other governmental uses. Such annual rental of \$22,500.00 and such franchise tax are to be paid in equal monthly installments throughout the 40 years term of the lease contract, making each monthly installment the sum of \$1,875.00 (for rental) plus the proper sum for franchise tax.

**OBLIGATIONS CONCERNING REVENUE BONDS AGAINST THE CITY'S SYSTEM:** City obligates itself to pay such bonds and the interest thereon as they fall due, with the Company agreeing, however, that if any bond or interest is not paid at maturity or if any bonds should be accelerated due to any default or act on the part of the City, Company will have the right to pay any and all of such matured bonds and interest and accelerated

bonds, and Company will have the right to pay any judgment which might be procured against City so that the lease properties will not be in jeopardy; and with it being agreed that if the Company does take up and pay off any judgment or bonds or interest, on which City may have defaulted, then, in addition to having the right to be repaid by City, Company will have the right to charge its actual interest cost on bonds or borrowed money so that Company will not lose on such bonds, either by way of corpus or because of interest; and in such events, Company will have the right to withhold one-half of the rentals and franchise taxes due the City under the lease, as same fall due, in order to reimburse itself.

**CUSTOMER DEPOSITS:** City shall pay to Company within 30 days after lease the amount of all refundable deposits, and Company assumes the liability to refund such deposits.

**AGREEMENTS AS TO BOOKS AND RECORDS:** City to furnish Company with a list of depositors, and City to make available to Company all records and other data as might be useful to the company in setting up its books of accounts on the leased property, with same to be done with due regards to the convenience of the City.

**OTHER OBLIGATIONS OF COMPANY:** Company will merge the two distribution systems and keep it in good working order so as to render customers in Spur adequate electric service at all times. Company will carry insurance on the leased property. Company will pay taxes to the city on all of its property, except the lease property. Company will place in effect its standard rates for electric services. None of these rates are higher than present rates. Some are lower. Average: 8% lower.

**POWER FOR MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS:** City will purchase electric service from the Company.

**DISPOSITION OF CITY'S DIESEL ENGINES:** Company shall maintain such engines as are covered by lease until Company has either put in new generating equipment or has provided two-way transmission line service to Spur, at which time the Company may call upon the City to sell or otherwise dispose of such diesel engines and City shall have 12 months to sell or dispose of same.

**RIGHTS AT THE END OF THE 40 YEAR LEASE TERM:** At the end of the 40 years period, the City shall have the option to acquire the leased properties by reimbursing Company for the agreed value of Company's por-

tion of the merged distribution system at the date of the lease and for all expenditures made by the Company thereafter on the system, less a sum equal to an annual rate of depreciation of two and one-half percent per year.

Or if the City does not elect to acquire the leased properties, the company will have the option to extend the lease agreement for an additional term at a cash rental to be then agreed upon by the City and the Company, or the

Company, in lieu of such lease extension, may pay the City a cash consideration in an amount to be then agreed upon for full and final purchase of the City's assets in the merged electric system as of that date, and if the

City and the Company cannot agree on the amount of cash consideration, same shall be established by an inventory and appraisal of the leased property by independent engineers or by a disinterested committee of three

persons, the details of the selection of which are provided for in the lease contract.

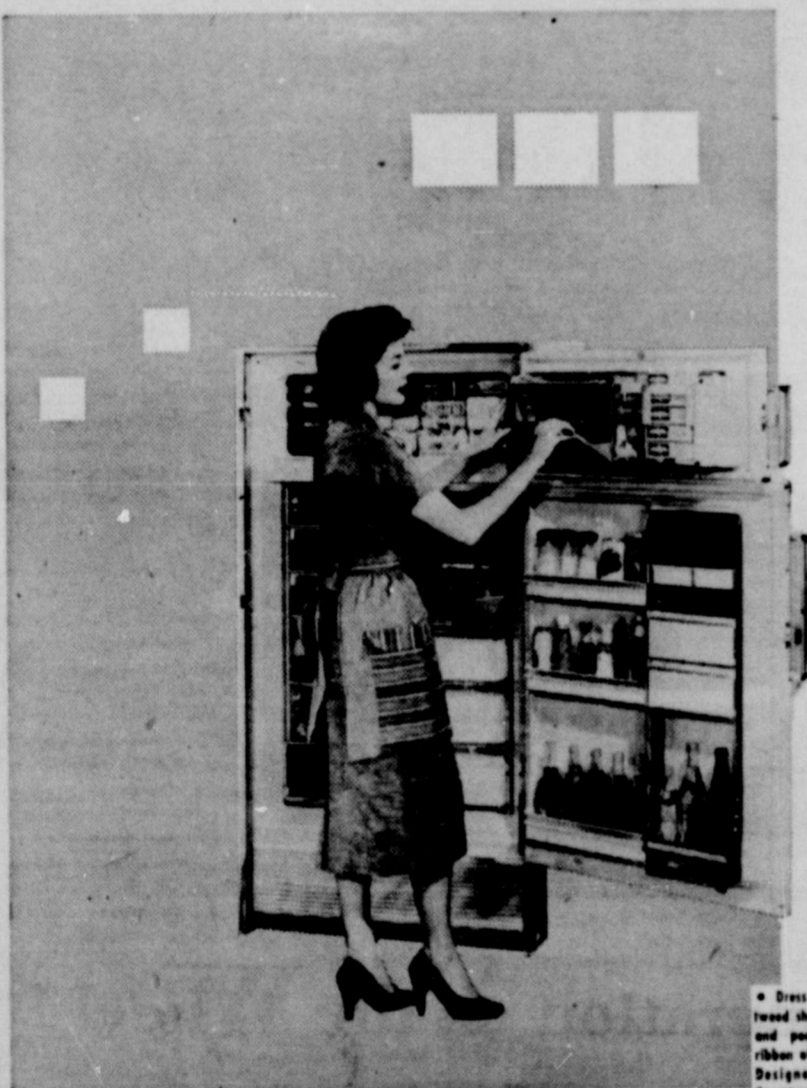

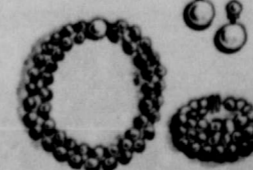

## Way Back When

A few houses gradually were built. Uncle Jimmy Jones was a carpenter and he built a house on the present Forrest Ragland home place. The Davis family lived in a house rather early on the old Hughes place. Braddocks house was the present B. F. Burt home. The Whittakers had a little house with no ceiling or floor, but it was a house.

Afton, located in the north-west part of Dickens County, is an unusually good farming section and is capable of unbelievable production during periods of deficient rainfall. Many irrigation wells now set the problem of no rain. Much water is found in this community. The surface wells have only to be ten to twenty feet deep, and the water found there is not gyp.

The soil in Afton is known as

the sandy loam type, unusually fertile, and ideal for gardens and orchards, as well as cotton and grain.

**First Schools and Churches**

Before the first little school was built there was a dug out school. It was located about in the present field of Mr. Ben Middleton. This was a good while before the turn of the century, and from far and near, the pupils came to this little dugout school, as they were eager for learning. Mrs. B. F. Whittaker taught there and some of the pupils were children of the following families: Alford, Duncan, Williams, Davises, Jacksons, Joneses, Winklers, Austins, and Braddocks.

After a number of families had settled here, their thoughts naturally turned to the two things which are uppermost in our mind—the church and the school. They wanted a church where they could worship, and a school for their children.

Thus the first little building, which few people remember today, called Cottonwood.

This building served its purposes, believe me, as all denominations went there to worship and the children went there to school.

According to the late W. M. (Uncle Bill) Austin, this building was in use before the year 1896 and the first teacher in this school was Minor Wilson. W. A. Harrell taught there before 1900 and it is believed that the only pupil who remains in this community who attended the first school is Paul Braddock, who resides in the East Afton community. It seems all the others have moved away, or passed on.

This school was located more than a mile east of the present site between the cemetery, and the Patton Springs from which our present school gets its name.

Sometime around the turn of the century, a one-room building was erected about a mile from our present school site—west.

One rainy night in the year of 1900, a very pretty girl arrived in Dickens, Texas, in the downpour, and at 2 o'clock in the morning she reached the Dickens City Court House, riding in a cart pulled by a high stepping Spanish mule. The young lady then was 20 years old, and was destined to name a place and change the community of "Cottonwood" to "Afton". This girl was Miss Myra Kelly, the

present Mrs. Duff Green, of Roaring Springs, Texas.

After having graduated from Throckmorton high school May 18, 1900, Miss Kelly had a yen to come to West Texas and teach school. To reach this point, it was necessary to come via the mail back to Seymour, Benjamin, Guthrie, and on the what was then called "Dickens City".

Mrs. Green was met by a cousin, the late Bob Forbes, when she arrived in Dickens. Mr. Forbes was a trustee in the Cottonwood school and had secured the teaching job for Miss Kelly.

A dear neighbor and friend of Miss Kelly's mother, Judge W. T. Andrews, (father of Will Andrews) had often given Miss Myra some sound advice, and on one occasion he said, "Go West young lady, where salaries are good and cowboys are plentiful. "While \$35 per month was not such an alluring wage", said Mrs. Green, at least there was one cowboy. (I quote Mrs. Green "The journey was made without event until we reached Guthrie in a heavy rain. There I was transferred to a two wheel cart, pulled by a Spanish mule that could really step. The driver strapped my valise, and one sack of mail, and with a couple of straps to hold onto, we resumed our westward trek."

Chapter Presidents and their members have lighted their candles from the Torches of the Founders, the Past State Presidents, and other leaders and have developed this year a strong, professional program.

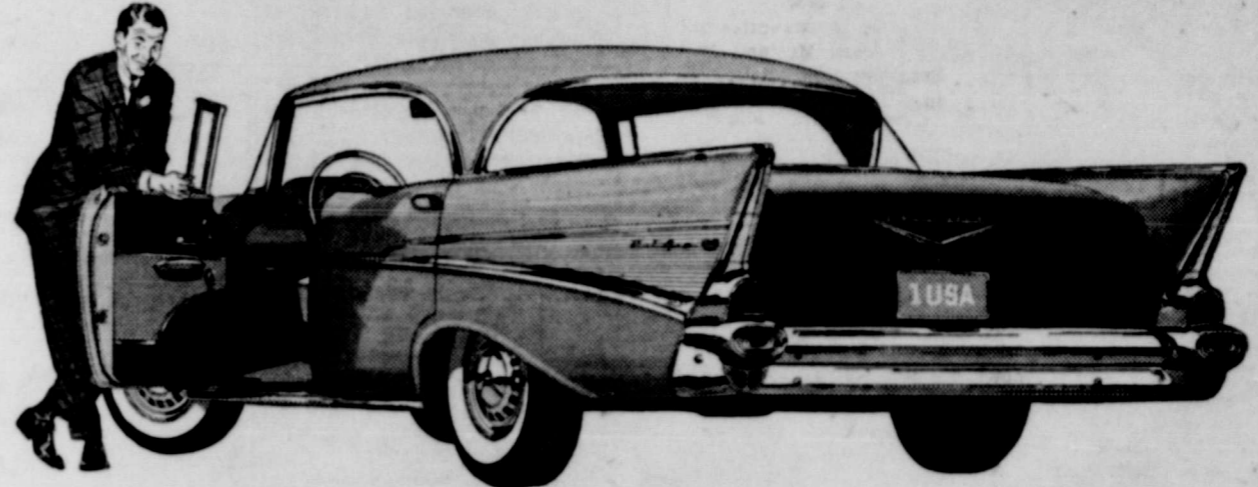

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## AN OPEN LETTER TO SOUTHWESTERN BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY

Gentlemen:

Four weeks ago the Citizens of Spur directed a petition to your company.

This petition asked that Southwestern Bell seriously consider retaining a local switchboard operator on duty at all times, for the specific purpose of handling emergency fire and police calls, when the dial system becomes operative.

Forwarded with the petition was a request that Southwestern Bell make a public reply directly to the petitioners within seven days from date of receipt.

Three issues of the Texas Spur have been published since that date. And still no reply. Southwestern Bell — could you tell us why?

Since no public statement has been forthcoming, it is obvious that Southwestern Bell has elected to ignore the petitioners' request.

It is not certain as to just who is advising and encouraging SW Bell to take such an unbusiness-like stand against their customers and against the public interest,—but—

It is fairly certain that Southwestern Bell is being poorly advised in the matter—in fact, very much so—as far as the general public is concerned.

It is difficult to believe that a business concern of the good standing and reputation of Southwestern Bell would pass up an opportunity to respond to the desires of its customers, at least to the extent of showing them the courtesy of a public reply.

Spur now has the finest telephone operators and the best manually-operated switchboard in the Southwest. The manner in which these operators now handle emergency fire and police calls leaves nothing to be desired,—a manner that cannot be equalled by any substitute "dial" plan. Frankly, we would like to keep our operators for this service,—a service that is intimately concerned with the safety and welfare of every individual in Spur.

An informal poll of a large majority of the Spur Firemen reveals that Southwestern Bell officials have offered no substitute proposals that would make them desired to change the request of the original petition.
