R. A. Conner, chairman of the Dickens County Savings Bonds Committee, reports that Savings Bond sales in this county were \$5,359 during the month of May. Sales during the first five months of 1957 were \$14,987 or 50.7 per cent of our year's goal.

The five leading counties in the state are as of May 31: Bandera, 110.3 per cent; Hemphill, cent. District No. 3 leads the state 79.8 per cent; and Archer, 66 per club. with 58 per cent or goal attained. (Dickens County is in District No. 4 and is second in the state with 46.4 per cent of goal.)

Texas now ranks 25th in the nation in percentage of goal attained. At the end of May, Texans had purchased \$72,578,201 in Hurst and Homer Marcy. E and H Savings Bonds.

Sales in Texas were \$13,840,433 during May which was an increase the trip. of \$260,000 over the month of April. The State of Texas now has reached 37.6 per cent of its 1957 goal.

Yarborough Seeks **Crop Damage Compansation**

A bill to provide emergence cash compensation for flood and other natural disaster-destroyed farm crops has been introduced in the Senate by Democratic Senators Ralph Yarborough of Texas, and Mike Monroney and Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma.

Both states have been hard hit by an unprecedented series of spring floods and tornadoes.

A CHANGE IN THE POLIO PICTURE

With the introduction of the Salk vaccine the polio pio ture in this country has undergone a radical change. Since this change has a bearing on the health of your entire Lions to jump off to a 5-0 lead. family, you ought to know about it.

Here's what has happened in the past few years:

Children from five to nine years old used to be one of the largest group of victims. In 1952 they accounted for 24 per cent of all paralytic cases. By now most of these school youngsters have been vaccinated and the proportion of cases among them is declining. In 1956 it dropped to 16 per cent of all cases. That's the bright side of the polio picture.

Of course, with a decline in one age group, there has been a corresponding rise in percentages among other age groups not yet protected by Salk vaccine.

Take pre-school youngsters under five years old, for instance. In 1952 they comprised 29 percent of paralytic cases. In 1956 the proportion had climbed to 39 per cent. Infants one and two years old had the highest percentage of all. That's why polio authorities like the National Knights of Pythias, but got beat, lead to stay in the bottom of the Wade Wright. Foundation for Infantile Paralysis urge that they be first on the vaccination list.

The next most vulnerable group in the new polio picture are teenagers and young adults from 15 to 40 years. In 1952 they comprised 33 per cent of paralytic cases. In 1956 the percentage was 34 per cent. Since polio paralysis is especially disastrous to wage earners in a family, they need protection urgently.

Think these figures over. If your school-age children have been vaccinated, that's fine. But don't forget the other members under 40 in your family, starting with the

COTTON AT THE CROSSROADS

The cotton industry of Texas and the nation has a vital decision to make in the next few years.

It must decide whether to accept more and more controls and restrictions or meet the challenge of modern technology. The first path leads to virtual extinction of the small farmer in a decade or so-the other opens up vast new fields in marketing and demand.

The key to a successful future for cotton lies in greater research towards developing new uses and wider markets for the production, or per-acre yields. We have gone about as far as we can go in that direction under the preent economic demand.

It is a cold, hard fact that almost every bale we produce over the 9-million bale mark each year must be either stored, subsidized or dumped at a loss in countries abroad. Once our domestic consumption nexceeded 12-millio bales. But synthetic fabrics have cut deep inroads in cotton markets at a time when our main goals were to get more cotton from less acres!

Today, the industry and government agencies must develop a new approach. The surface hasn't been scratched on all the potential uses for cotton. Only a vast research program will bring them into being.

There are several immediate goals which could create a market demand to equal and eventually surpass our previous 12-million bale consumption. But the cotton industry, and the government, have been guilty of letting many opportunities slide away.

As an example, a vast quantity of jute is imported each year to make binding cloth for cotton bales. Using even poor grade cotton, a competitive fabric could be manufactured to wrap cotton bales and increase consumption by about 35,000 bales annually-right on the cotton industry's doorstep.

Other outlets can be developed by producing superior quality in cotton fabrics such as:

- 1. Flame resistant cloth which would open up a demand for an additional 11/2 million bales each year. 2. Cotton garments that require no ironing would
- utilize some 1 million bales.
- 3. Rot and weather resistant cloth 200,000 bales. 4. A superior but competitive cloth for auto seat cov-

ers - 100,000 bales. These are just a few examples of new possibilities in cotton marketing.

Of course, our present controls and regulations cannot be immediately abandoned until demand comes closer to the supply. But restrictions should be regarded as emergency measures, not permanent institutions.






