> The law also excludes from taxcommunity chest, and similar charitable organizations, and allaws each giver an exemption of \$30,000 - before the tax applies.

The tax applies whether the gift is of money or of property. If it is of property, the tax is computed on the fair market value of the property at the date of the gift.

The purpose of many gifts is to remove the property from the taxable estate of the giver at the time ow his death. This may or may not be accomplished. The fe'deral law provides that transfers made within three years before date of death shall be deemed to have been made in contemplation of death and shall be taxable in the estate of the one who

It may be advisable to "look a gift horse in the mouth" for the gift may cost the one who receives

An example will show the apolication of the rules. Suppose a farmer acquired his land in the early days at a cost of \$10,000. The farmer wishes to retire and the escape estate taxes, so he gives the farm to his daughter.
