Editor's Corner

Several persons in downtown Spur, and possibly others stationed elsewhere, witnessed what was described by Abilene weathermen as a "weather phenomenon" about noon Monday.

With the sky practically free of clouds at 11:30 a. m., this writer's attention was called to a fluffy white, apparently boiling cloud, east of Spur. The cloud gave the appearance of being an explosion. The bottom of the cloud seemed to be covered with fog or smoke.

Puzzled, we went in to call a Civil Defense Co-Ordinator to have the cloud checked.

By the time we made the brief call, the cloud had dissipated and only a puff of blue gray smoke remained.

Curiosity aroused, a call was made to the weather station at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene. Radar check revealed nothing and the weatherman explained it away as a weather phenomenon. Verification was made in a matter of minutes.

Quick-Thinking Mail Carrier Revives Youth

Artificial respiration, administered by a quick thinking Spur City Mail Carrier, revived eleven year old Mike McNeese, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl McNeese, when the lad was knocked unconscious by an electrical shock at his home.

The boy had apparently been digging in wet dirt under an air conditioner early Tuesday afternoon when he received the electrical charge. Mrs. McNeese found the boy unconscious and called out to Raymond Gilcrease, City Mail Carrier, who was passing by.

The fire dept. resuscitator was called for but was not needed as the boy was revived and sent to Spur Memorial Hospital. He was released Tuesday afternoon.

County Field Due Extension

A three-quarters of a mile north-east extension to production in the Duck Creek-Tannehill Field of Dickens County has been indicated at Hunt Oil Co.'s No. 1 Mary Copeland according to a report in Wednesday's Avalanche.

Drilled to 4,611 feet, project cemented 5 1/2-inch casing on bottom and perforated the Tannehill at 4,574-7 feet with 12 shots. Perforations were washed with 250 gallons of mud acid and a swab rigged up.

In 15 hours of swabbing project recovered 18 barrels of load oil, 168 barrels of new oil and 23 barrels of salt water.

At last report, testing was continuing. Indicated extension is located six miles southeast of the town of Spur, spotting 1,690 feet from the north line and 600 feet from the east line of Section 203, Block 1, H&GN Survey.

Worlds Championship Polo Tournament Here Aug. 15-17

Three teams have challenged the Dickens County team who have been champs since 1954.

Play in the World's Championship Palmetto Polo Tournament will get underway Friday night at 8 p. m. in Swenson Park. Drawings in the four team meet will be held Friday morning.

Teams competing will be the defending world champion Dickens County Sheriff's Posse; El Reno Wranglers from El Reno, Okla.; Lubbock Rodeo Association and the Fritch Saddle Club from Fritch, Texas.

One hundred and eighty-two invitations were sent out to this tournament. In the early days of the tournament, the meet was held as a playoff of state or district winners only. However, last year, the tournament was made an open event in hope that more teams would enter. The Dickens County team was crowned champions in 1954-55-56-57.

Referees for the three day meet will be Steve Blevens, San Angelo; Glen Webb, Sweetwater, and alternate, Crate Snider, Ropesville.

A parade will kick off the tournament beginning at 5 p. m. Friday afternoon. Anyone who owns a horse and wants to ride in the parade is encouraged to do so says Everett McArthur, president of the Dickens County Sheriff's Posse. The parade will be formed on the lot west of the Farmer's Gin.

O. R. Clark, president of the American Association of Sheriff's Poses and Riding Clubs, Rotan, and Dr. Ted Alexander, secretary treasurer, Wichita Falls, are expected to ride in the parade.

The Spur High School Band will supply music for the event. Norman Arnett, director of the band, says that any person who desires to play with the band, may do so by attending rehearsal Thursday night from 7-9 p. m.

"We don't know what kind of teams El Reno and Fritch have, but we expect a lot of competition from Lubbock," says McArthur. The Lubbock team finished in third place last year behind Tom Green County, and this year has won two games vore San Angelo.

"Since tournament play will be held both Friday and Saturday nights, the posse is not sponsoring a dance this year," McArthur stated.

A trophy for the outstanding player of the meet will be given by the Thomas Trophy Shop, Lubbock. The outstanding player will receive a \$25 hat from Eric Swenson. The runnerup will also be presented a \$25 hat by the Emery Ranch. Last year's most valuable player was James Woodfin, of San Angelo.

The program book is off the press and McArthur says that copies have been mailed to 180 Clubs representing 32 states and Canada.

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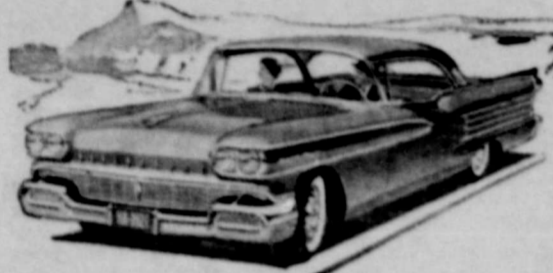

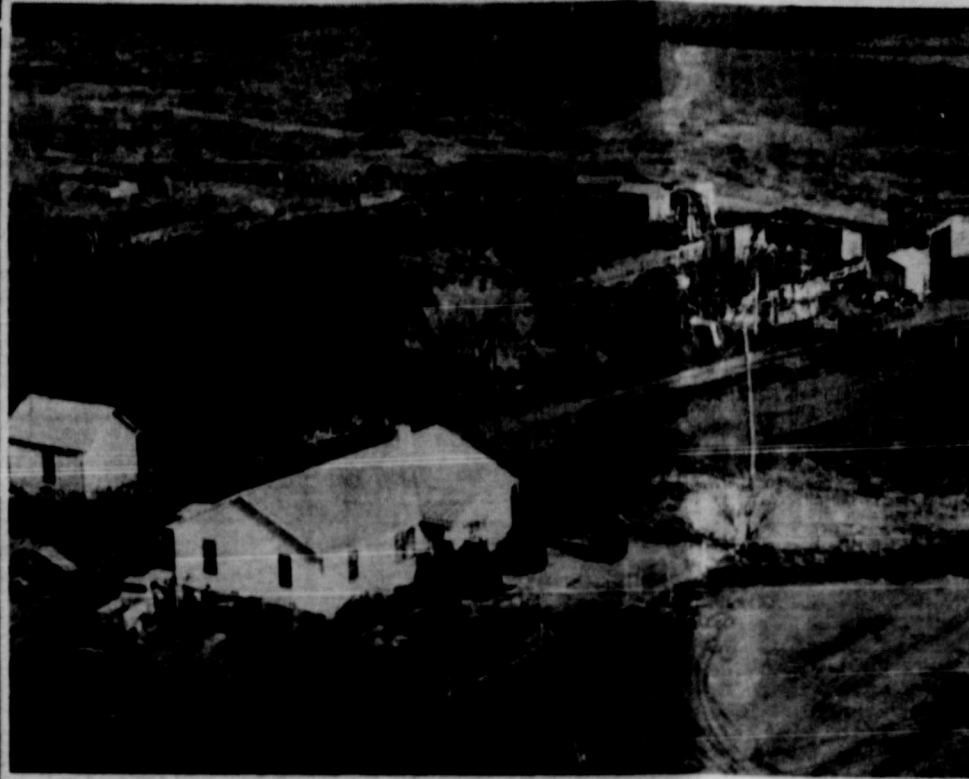

Social Security Officer Makes Change In Date

The regular visit of the social security officer from Lubbock scheduled for Spur on September 17 has been moved up because the regular meeting of the Justice of the Peace office will be in use by a meeting of the Railroad Commission.

What documents do I need to furnish when I apply for my social security benefits? This question is frequently asked of the Social Security office, according to John G. Hutton, Manager.

When a person files an application for retirement or family insurance, some records must be furnished to establish his rights to the payments, Hutton said. The proofs most often needed are proof of age, proof of marriage, and evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding year.

Most people have an old record on which their date of birth and age was recorded many years ago, such as a baptismal certificate, school record, government record, family Bible, insurance policy, poll tax receipt, etc. Census records are sometimes available. A recently established delayed birth certificate is not sufficient proof of age for this purpose.

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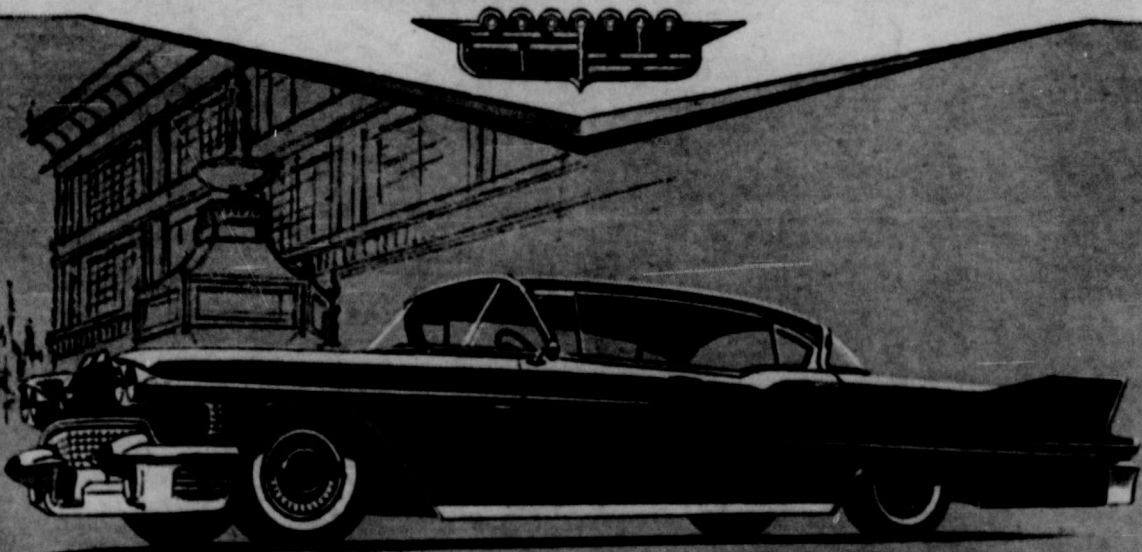

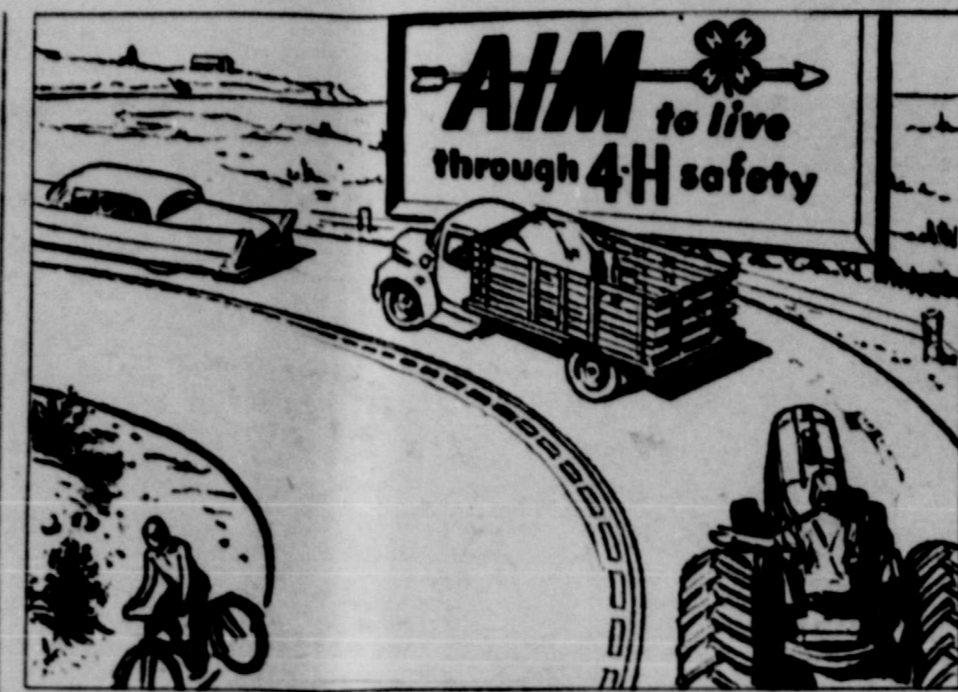

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DIVISION OF ESTATES EXPLAINED

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column, we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirs and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

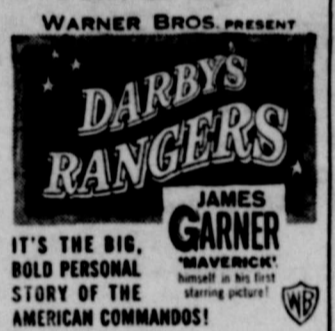

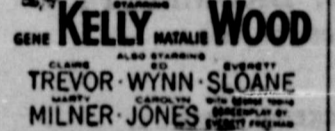

About Your HEALTH

Many Texans like to spend their vacation time with an extended trip to far away places.

There are several health risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense can make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to receive proper immunization.

By all means, you should be protected against typhoid, polio and smallpox.

Your family doctor, local director of health or the State Department of Health can advise you on these recommendations.

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourist hotels and the big cities everywhere, the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas, be careful!

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manner and approved by the local health department.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, etc., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

There is no rule that cooked food is safe food, but you should be especially careful of uncooked foods: refrigeration standards may be poor and especially in sub-tropical climates, foods will spoil quickly. Many local farming habits bring sewage into close contact with vegetables, so eat only fresh vegetables and fruits that you are sure of.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and their descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

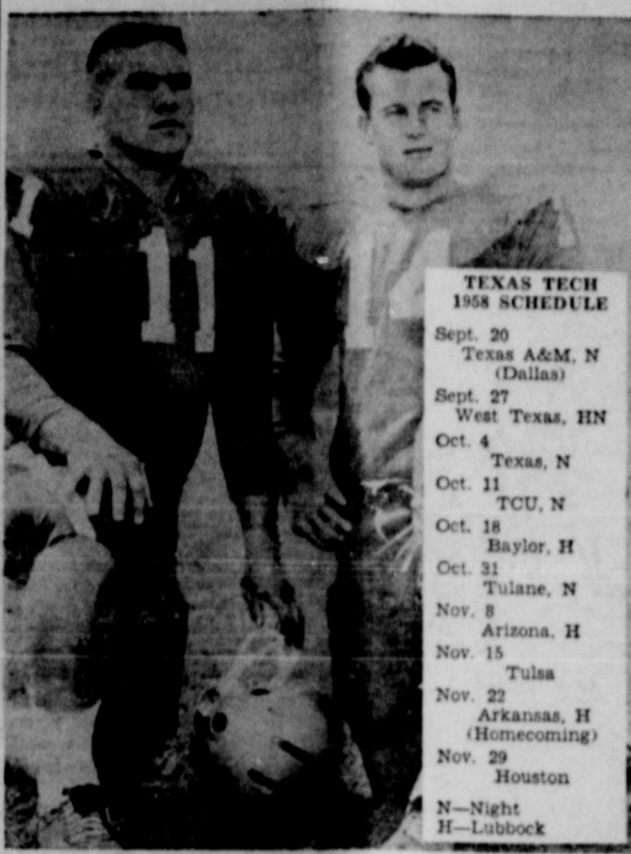

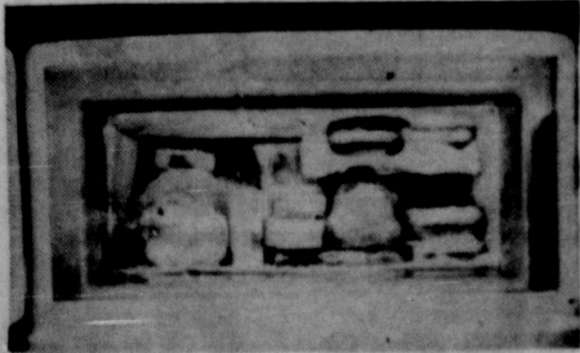

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON
AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL
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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.
proposing an amendment to Section
of Article XVI of the Constitution
of the State of Texas, providing
that the Legislature be authorized
to appropriate money and establish
the procedure for developing informa-
tion about the historical, natural,
agricultural, industrial, educational,
recreational and living resources
of Texas, and for the purpose of
informing persons and corporations
of other states through advertising
periodicals having national circulation
