### Loss To Floydada Would Erase Bulldogs From Conference Race

#### CAPACITY CROWD IS EXPECTED

The Spur Bulldogs, picked to finish in fourth place, one step ahead of Post in District 3-AA this year, will be playing for the District championship tomorrow night in Jones Stadium when the Whirlwinds from Floydada blow in for the crucial tilt.

The Bulldogs were given their low rating by a poll of District Coaches this summer at the annual coaching school in Houston. The Cinderella team has notched three straight district wins, knocking off Tahoka 40-0; Slaton 42-12 and Post, 38-14. They have compiled a 6-2-1 record. Dropping their opening game to high-rated Abertathy and later bowing to Quannah at mid-season. They also sport a 14-14 tie with Anson.

The game is rated a toss-up by most sports enthusiasts. Floydada has an 8-0 record.

The Winds will field a starting line that averages 176 compared to the Bulldog forward wall of 163. Floydada starting backs will average 169 to 159 for Spur.

Bulldog reserve end Joe Kenneth Watson underwent surgery in Lubbock Tuesday for a slight brain cocoonism and will miss the Floydada game. Otherwise, Coach Henry reported the Bulldogs at full strength.

(Center Don Kidd has an injured hand but will play.) A report was received early this week that Floydada will be at full strength for the first time this year since their opening game.

A pep rally will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:35 in the High School Gym. All Bulldog Boosters and interested persons are invited to attend.

**SPUR 38, POST 14**  
Led by Fullback Joe Copeland who scored three touchdowns, the Spur Bulldogs eased past the Post Antelopes last Friday night, 38-14. Besides scoring 20 points, Copeland also was the leading rusher of the game, picking up 113 yards on 12 carries.

Spur received the kick-off and marched to a touchdown in 8 plays driving from the Antelope 49 yd line. The drive featured one pass, Quarterback Freddie Walker to Halfback Kenneth Suitt good for 16 yards, but the rest of the drive was on the ground. Copeland sparked the drive with runs good for one, six and 10 yards; Suitt ran for four and one yards; Paronto had two runs, one for three and one for four. Copeland scored.

Mae's Food Market is securing all the donors for the pancake mix, bacon, syrup, coffee. Grady Lackey, Jr. is in charge of the cooking detail.

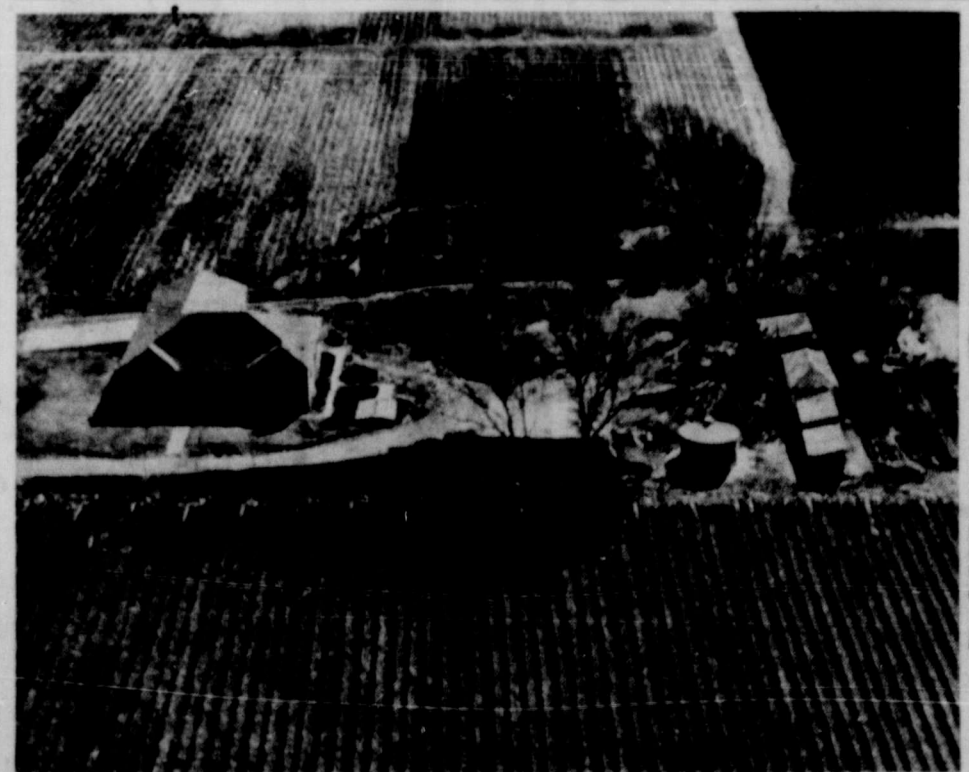
## Gins Continue Pace Ahead Of '57 Production

A check of area gins Wednesday at noon revealed that 13,558 bales of cotton have been ginned to date. This compares to a total of 3,529 bales ginned on the week of November 14th last year.

With clear skies prevailing the rest of the week, the county total could reach 15,000 bales this week. Estimated production ranges from a minimum of 18,000 bales to possibly 25,000 bales.

**Quail Hunters To Be Plentiful This Season**

Early reports have indicated there'll be a big crop of quail for the opening of the season Dec. 1. Now indicates also point to a good crop quail hunters, according to Al Springs, assistant director of wildlife restoration of the Game and Fish Commission.

"We've had a lot of good food and cover this year, and a wonderful hatch of birds," he said. "Our men from every part of Texas tell us that conditions are excellent and birds are plentiful."

The quail season begins Dec. 1, and ends Jan. 16. The limit is 12 birds per day, or 36 in possession.

Applications are still coming in for the public hunts to be held on the Gene Howe Wildlife Management area in the

Panhandle. These hunts are scheduled for Dec. 6; Dec. 20; Jan. 3, and Jan. 15. All applications must be in the Game Commission office in Austin by 8 a. m. Nov. 14. A drawing then will be held.

The hunters will be paired, with 10 pairs of hunters each day, for a total of 80 hunters. Only persons over 17 will be given permits. The bag limit on this area is 10 birds per person.

Shooters are urged to bring their own dogs. There is a heavy growth of flowering weeds and dogs are needed to prevent loss of birds.

### TRAFFIC LAW KNOWLEDGE SAVES LIVES, MONEY

In the midst of the annual series of football weekends, the thoughts of many Texans are turning toward traffic safety. There can be no doubt but that a better acquaintance among drivers with the "rules of the road" and other traffic safety regulations could greatly reduce the death toll of our highways.

To obtain correct and authoritative information about driving is a simple matter. A letter or postcard to the Department of Public Safety, Driver's License Division, Austin, Texas, will bring an official publication, the "Texas Driving Handbook", to anyone who requests it.

Aside from considerations of personal safety, proper driving habits and observance of traffic laws will help prevent financial loss. This is true in spite of the fact that most people now carry liability insurance as a protection under the Texas "Drivers Responsibility Act." Jury verdicts in personal injury cases tend to go higher and higher, and the likelihood of suffering an adverse judgment for an amount in excess of the limits of your liability policy is ever present.

Fault, or liability, is determined by applying the law to the particular facts of an accident. In Texas the law is in several forms - the statutes enacted by the Legislature, the ordinances of each city and town, and the court decisions in cases similar to the one to be decided.

act is necessary in order to impose legal liability for damages. Where both parties to an accident are negligent, the court will very likely say that both are at fault, and that each must pay for his own damages. Two of the most important legal rules pertaining to accidents are those having to do with "proper look-out" and "proper control". Driving in a lawful manner and complying with all ordinary traffic rules is not always sufficient. In addition, the driver is expected by law to be alert to all that is happening around him. If an accident should occur and the driver has not been alert—has failed to keep a proper look-out—he may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the other driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" such a look-out as a reasonably prudent driver would have kept under the same circumstances. Of equal importance is the rule of "proper control". This

rule means pretty much what those words imply—that the driver should have his car under such degree of control as to be ready for any emergencies as might arise. It may be breached even though no violation of ordinary traffic laws is involved.

For instance, a driver may be complying with the legal speed limit but still be driving at a rate of speed which is unsafe under the existing circumstances.

Even though legal speed limits are expressed in terms of a certain number of miles per hour, conditions may arise which prevent the driver from maintaining "proper control" of his automobile at that speed. On a rainy day on a slick street or highway, or in heavy traffic, the reasonably prudent driver will know that he should reduce his speed considerably below the legal maximum.

**Patton Springs, Guthrie Meet  
In Crucial Conference Tilt Friday**

The Patton Springs Rangers took a long stride toward winning District 999 when they defeated the Jayton Jaybirds last Friday night, 44-14. The Rangers will play Guthrie at Patton Springs tomorrow night, and close the season with Roaring Springs in a home game next Friday.

Both Guthrie and Patton Springs are undefeated in conference play. Guthrie also beat Jayton, so the game tomorrow night can be considered a toss up.

Jayton took the initial kickoff and advanced the ball almost to the north goal line, where the Rangers set the stone-wall defense that proved one of the strong factors in the victory score.

Patton secured the ball in the shadow of the Jayton goal, and in four runs, H. Goodwin and Blasingame had carried it to pay dirt. This broke the scoring-ice, with no conversion, and forced both teams into a cautious, careful attitude that broke up the pay-counts for the first period. The first quarter ended 6 to 0 in favor of Patton.

The Ranger storm really broke loose in the second quarter, the squall letting up only once to allow Jaybird Gary Hicks to make a lone period touchdown for Jayton, and Jaybird Jimmy Bryant to carry over the conversion. All of the rest of the period was taken up by the flying heels of Ranger Harold Goodwin and his hard-running mates, Ragland, Blasingame, and Mullins, who would not be satisfied until they had run over three additional touchdowns.

Alternately, they moved the ball down the field, to be climaxed with the Harold Goodwin Pay-Off. However, blanks were drawn on every effort to secure the extra points, the Jaybirds tightening their def-

ense each time momentarily. At the half, the Rangers held the lead 24 to 8.

The third quarter settled down to a hard-fought battle. Jaybird Gary Hicks finally added 6 points to the Jayton payroll. This closed the scoring for the visiting Jaybirds with a total of 14. When the Rangers took over the ball, Quarterback Ronnie Ragland started his aerial circus that carried over the last quarter. Ranger Billy Goodwin snagged a 30 yd. pass from Ragland that netted 6 points and a conversion of 2 points by Harold Goodwin. The defense tightened on both sides and the third quarter ended with the score leaning toward Patton 34 to 14.

Both quarterbacks on the team sought to make advancements in the air in the 4th quarter. The air-battle netted the Jaybirds only short gains in five trials, while it netted the Rangers two touchdowns.

With Ronnie Ragland on the passing end and Ronnie Mullins and Harold Goodwin on the receiving end, the Rangers spread their wings on two long 30 yard passes and Patton's final score moved up to 44. The latter part of the game ended in a dead-lock in the middle of the field, with neither team able to push over the necessary 1st downs.

**No License  
Big Offense  
Of Fishermen**

Fishing without a license dominates game and fish violations even in the middle of the hunting season, according to E. M. Sprott director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. September arrest report showed 104 tagged fishermen, compared with only 19 arrests for hunting without a license.

Hunting violations continue to rise, however, the director said. There were 132 counts of illegal hunting methods and other game law violations during the month. This figure includes 21 arrests for hunting in closed season, 20 for killing quail out of season, 19 for trespassing, 17 for hunting at night, 17 for exceeding dove bag limits, and 15 for using unplugged gun.

Of a total of 357 arrests, 3 cases were appealed to a higher court, while 10 served time in jail. Convictions cost violators \$8,635 in fines.

The director reminds hunters who are not sure of the laws that they may get copies of game and fish regulations from game wardens, license dealers, or by writing to the Game and Fish Commission in Austin.

While there is no indication at this time of widespread attack of influenza this fall and winter, there undoubtedly will be some cases of the illness as colder weather approaches. Vaccination against it is a prudent measure for certain groups and individuals.

Principal target for vaccination should be groups wishing to guard against absenteeism in their professions and occupations, and those to whom the disease might be an added health risk.

There are now ample supplies of influenza vaccine of the type containing immunizing materials against the important strains of influenza, including the Asian strain.

Last year at this time Texas was braced for an expected epidemic of Asian 'flu, so called because it had first been diagnosed in Hong Kong. The first cases were reported in April in that Oriental city, and a brief five months later Texas had been thoroughly "seeded" with the virus.

There is no expectation of a similar outbreak this fall. However, since vaccination is the only way cases of the illness might be avoided, both the state Health Department and the U. S. Public Health Service recommend the procedure for select groups for whom 'flu
