Proper Papers **Can Speed Up SS** Payments

Would you like to help your ocal social security office re duce the length of time neces sary to process applications for retirement benefits?

According to John G. Hutton manager of the social security district office in Lubbock, people making application for their retirement benefits can speed up the handling of their applications if they bring along the papers necessary to estab-lish their right to benefits.

These papers should include their social security card, proof of their age and proof of recent earnings. Hutton explained that your most recent W-2 form furnished by your employer, or your last income tax return along with your Schedule C or Schedule F and the cancelled check showing payment of the self-employ-ment social security tax, if you are self-employed, will suffice for proof of recent earnings. Hutton added that a birth ertificate is not necessary for roof of age but that any old

or proof of age.

Hutton cautioned that no one hould delay filing a claim because he or she does not have one or more of the documents necessary to establish right to benefits. REFRIGERATORS

An average of 23 million cubfeet is being added annually to the Nation's commercial refrigerators to match expanding home refrigerator and freezer space, reports the US Department of Agriculture. The basic reason given for this growth is that the American public has taken to frozen foods in a big
