



In 1955, he took the job of cashier with the First State Bank of Abilene.

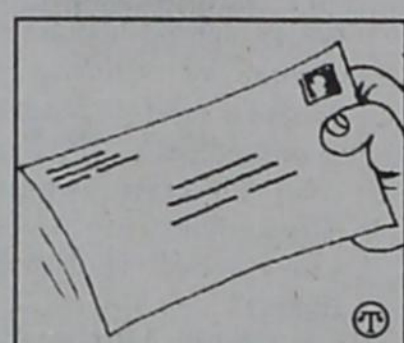

(NAPS)—Following the Supreme Court's 1989 decision legalizing flag desecration, I experienced flag burning. I attended a basketball game between two rival colleges in Louisiana. A few kids in the center were acting unruly, and they were asked to quiet down. Frustrated, one teenager took a lighter and set the American flag on fire. Everything stopped. Teams stopped playing basketball, the band stopped playing music, and everyone in the stadium became silent. And then one by one, each person walked out of the center. No one spoke.

It was a sad day. Sad because just a few minutes prior we all stood together and sang the national anthem in unison. Sad because the hateful act of one person took from everyone else something we cherish: families coming together to share an American pastime.

The remarkable thing about that day was the people. I was pleased to discover that nearly everyone felt the same way I did—that the flag is a sacred symbol worthy of our respect.

The gym was filled with many different faces that day. But they were all people, and the American flag represents everyone despite our differences.

This is why passage of the constitutional amendment to protect the flag is important. There are few issues that the large majority of Americans agree on, and this is one of those issues. In fact, in five Gallup surveys, 80 percent of Americans said they support this amendment.

This is because the issue affects everyone. The American flag does not discriminate according to race,

And I have learned that this amendment is about something greater than protecting the flag from physical desecration. This amendment is about values—sacred values which we as an American people share—values such as respect, decency and the American way.

And although the proposed amendment will not solve all the world's problems, it will bring us one step closer to keeping these values intact for our children.

The Supreme Court's 1989 decision legalizing flag desecration deprived us of our right to safeguard our national banner. Now it is time to take back that right.

I support this proposed amendment because it is the right thing to do. This is our country, and we the people have the right to protect it.

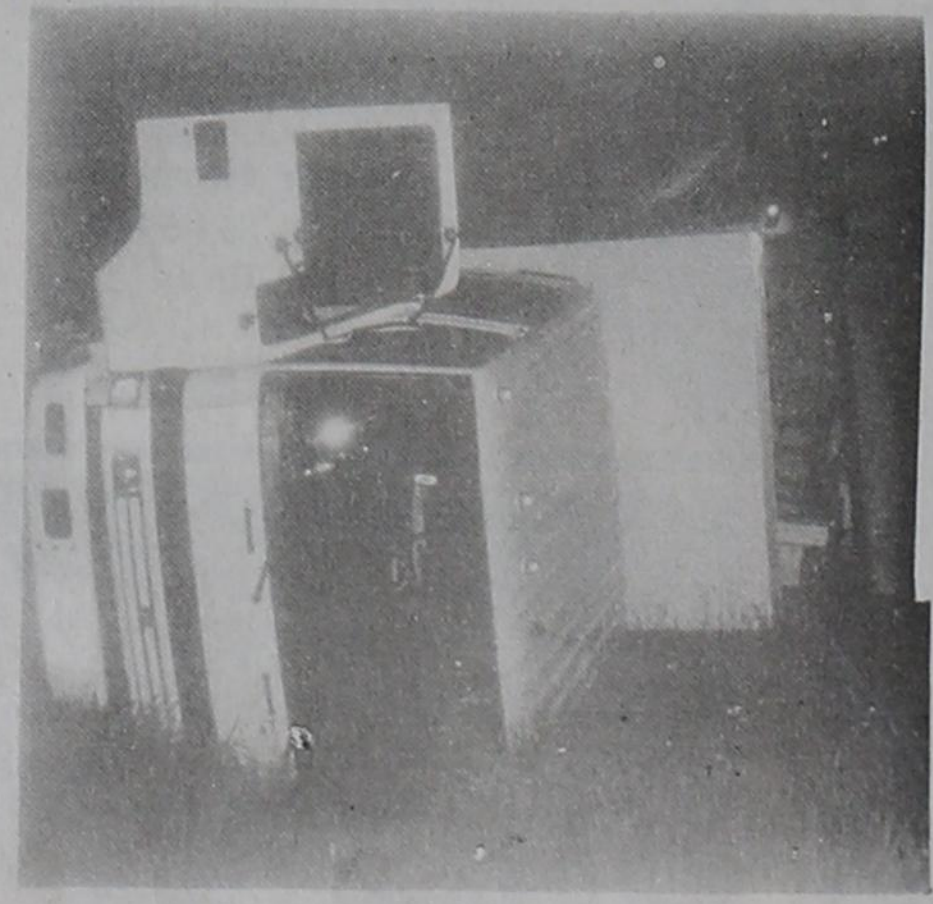

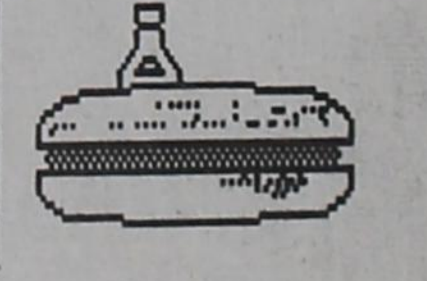

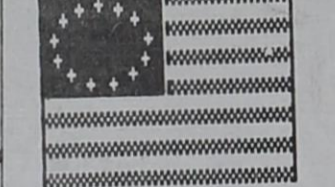

Do you remember Haiti? You don't hear much about it in the news lately and there's a reason for it. There's a lot of hanky panky going on and the Clinton administration is right smack dab in the middle of it!



A Haitian woman named Alerte Belance is at the heart of this matter. When Raoul Cedras and the military junta were in power in Haiti, she was a victim of their brutality. In October, 1993, members of a "death squad" sliced off one of her ears, her right hand and forearm and part of her nose and mouth with a machete. When they left, they assumed Belance was dead.

Balance somehow survived the attack and lived to cheer on the U.S. troops when they arrived to "restore" democracy (easier said than done; Haiti's never been a democracy in the first place!). Now, aided by the Center for Constitutional Rights, Belance wants justice from a U.S. federal court against FRAPH, the paramilitary Haitian group responsible for her mutilation.

In order to prove her case, Belance must have documentation. And guess what? President Bill Clinton, the man who "feels your pain" and weeps conveniently in public when it's expedient for some cause or another, is standing in her way. When our troops went into Haiti, they were ordered to take every official record of the terror regime, which would include the documentation sought by Belance about FRAPH, who was involved, whom they murdered and attacked, etc. Fully 100,000 pages of documents were taken from the Haitian Army's general headquarters and another 60,000 were lifted from the headquarters of FRAPH. Those files now sit in our nation's capitol.

Haiti has demanded the return of its documents. Indeed, even Democratic Congressman John Con-

yers of Mich., sought to get to the bottom of this and requested an opinion from the Congressional Research Service, which said: "Under international law, official government documents are property that belongs to Haiti as a state... their retention by the U.S. government violates Haiti's ownership rights."

What is the administration hiding? While Clinton promised to return those documents, they remain in the hands of the U.S. government. The State Department has said it wants to delete the names of any American citizens before it releases those files. They also want the Haitian government to keep the documents sealed.

Who are we to censor another country's documents and tell them what to do with them? Well, word on the street is, somewhere in those 160,000 pages could be significant revelations about our own role during and after Haitian president Jean-Bertrand Aristide's fall from power. Some news agencies have even reported that Emmanuel Constant, the founder and leader of FRAPH, was on the CIA's payroll. In addition, several leaders of the terrorist group were citizens of this country, of Haitian descent.

At every turn, Bill Clinton has demonstrated arrogance, defiance and abuse of power. This is just one example. Can you imagine what else lurks in the dirty doings of this shameless charlatan?

I had never heard of the term "environmental racism" before and so decided to attend a recent symposium on that subject at Dartmouth College.

The principal proponent of the theory that there is such a thing as "environmental racism" was one Vernice Miller, a black woman introduced as "director of the Environmental Justice Initiative," which I gather is sponsored by a branch of the Methodist Church.

The two other panelists were Roger Masters, a government professor, and James Worman, chemistry professor.

Vernice Miller speaks as if she cannot discipline her flow of words, but the upshot of her case went as follows: Environmentally hazardous sources of toxic chemicals tend overwhelmingly to be placed in "minority" communities. She also argued that "minorities" to a considerable degree are trapped in such toxic areas.

Professor Masters, a brilliant theorist, came in at an unexpected angle. He says concentrations specifically of lead and manganese in the environment can be strongly correlated with the familiar social pathologies: crime, illegitimacy, drug and alcohol addiction and the rest.

Nevertheless, he also says previous ethnic minorities in poor areas were subject to the same toxicities as Vernice Miller was talking about.

Professor Worman, the chemist, came at the issue from another direction. He challenged the notion that small amounts of toxins are damaging, and asked for a demonstration that the industrial plants Miller was talking about really were harmful.

Worman also noted that such plants most often are built where real estate is less expensive, that successive minorities have tended to live in just such locations, and that therefore

Understanding Your Nutrition

Why Seniors Should Take A Closer Look At What They May Or May Not Be Eating

(NAPS)—Research continues to stress the importance of good nutrition for leading healthier, longer lives.

According to the government's Third National Health and Nutrition Survey, elderly men and women are not meeting requirements for important nutrients such as iron, magnesium, zinc and vitamins B6, B12 and E. To educate seniors about proper nutrition, the American Egg Board highlights the following reasons why seniors should take a closer look at what they may—or may not—be eating

• **Boost Immunity**—Too little of vitamins E and B6 may lead to abnormal functioning of the immune system. Roughly two thirds of older adults have dietary intakes below recommended levels. Vitamin E-rich foods include dark green vegetables, whole grains and nuts. The presence of trace to significant amounts of vitamin B6 is found in eggs, fish, liver, grains, nuts and most vegetables.

• **Ensure Mental Acuity**—Insufficient amounts of vitamin B12 may be associated with impaired mental function. Good sources of B12 include eggs, organ meats, salmon, herring, crabs, clams and oysters.

• **Prevent Hip Fractures**—A recent study from the USDA Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging at Tufts University showed that getting vitamin D in foods such as eggs, salmon, milk and fortified breads and cereals may spare many elderly from painful hip fractures.

• **Build Protein**—According to researchers at the USDA Human Nutri-

tion Research Center, protein requirements for physically active older men are higher than current recommended levels. The protein in eggs is of such high quality that it is the standard by which other protein is measured.

• **Make Sure Every Calorie Counts**—With a decline in metabolism and exercise, calorie needs decrease with age. It's estimated, for example, that a 70-year-old man requires 30 percent fewer calories than a 30-year-old man of the same size. Top low-calorie, nutrient-rich foods include eggs, fruits, vegetables, yogurt and lentils.

"In light of new findings—which show that eating eggs is okay for people with normal blood cholesterol levels—it's now time to re-evaluate the importance of eggs to the health and well being of our seniors," said Donald J. McNamara, Ph.D., Executive Director of the Egg Nutrition Center. Eggs are a high quality source of protein and can provide many of the vitamins and minerals that seniors may be lacking in their diets. In addition, eggs are inexpensive, delicious and easy to prepare.

**AUSTIN** — Texas Attorney General Dan Morales filed suit last week against the "Republic of Texas" accusing the group and 25 of its members of filing fraudulent liens, tampering with government records, interfering with property sales and restraining trade.

State District Judge Paul Davis of Travis County signed a temporary restraining order prohibiting the "Republic of Texas" or the 25 members from breaking the law or filing false claims.

The restraining order also allows the attorney general's office to undo liens without going to court.

The Republic of Texas members believe the state and its officials are acting without authority, and the group has created its own common-law courts, filed "charges" of sedition against Morales, Gov. George W. Bush and others.

Morales said members of the group "are not free to misrepresent their organization as an official government" and he spoke of the havoc group members have caused, costing time and money of public clerks, title companies and property owners trying to sell their land.

The Republic of Texas' chief ambassador, Richard McLaren of Fort Davis, has been arrested on federal charges connected with filing false documents.

District-Shuffle Hearing Set  
A July 11 federal court hearing

has been set for the changing of congressional district boundaries in Dallas and Houston.

The changes were required following a June U.S. Supreme Court ruling — in favor of Republican plaintiffs — declaring two districts in Houston and one in Dallas illegal because of racial gerrymandering.

Because so little time separates the scheduled hearing and the Nov. 5 general election date, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and the districts' congressional representatives — all of whom are Democrats — want the court to put off the changes until the 1998 mid-term election.

But Attorney General Morales said, "I think it is wishful thinking to believe that this court will allow us to go through the 1996 election cycle with unconstitutional districts."

If the boundaries are changed, new elections would be required in each district in which boundaries change, even though voters selected nominees from the two major parties in the March and April primaries and runoffs, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Secretary of State Tony Garza listed three ways the scenario could play out in the redrawn districts, in which the court could:

- Order new primaries, to be conducted by Sept. 6; or
- Order a special election on Nov. 5 that is open to candidates from all parties; or
- Order the precinct chairman in each party to select new nominees without primaries.

**SSC Land to Be Resold**

Land bought by the federal government for the Superconducting Super Collider project — which lost its funding in 1993 — is going to be resold to the public.

The Texas Natural Research Laboratory Commission and the Texas General Land Office are coordinating the resale of about 10,000 acres of land in Ellis County, southeast of Dallas. The federal government eventually gave the tracts of land to the state

of Texas after the project was suspended.

General Land Office spokesman Ron Calhoun said the land sales will be done in a "systematic, prudent way" but people who lived on the land before it was taken over by the federal government will get no special privileges.

**Official Wants Tobacco Dumped**

State Board of Education Chairman Jack Christie sent a letter dated June 17 to the managers of the Permanent School Fund asking that they sell off any holdings in tobacco-producing companies.

"This is to let them know how a few of us feel," Christie told the *Dallas Morning News*.

"I find it incredible that we generate funds through investments in tobacco, which have to be used to educate students to avoid the very product that our investments support," Christie said in the letter.

The state filed a lawsuit March 31 against major tobacco companies, seeking \$4 billion for money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

**Other Capital Highlights**

- The cost of providing ATM services is decreasing but Texans are paying more for them, according to the Texas Consumers Union. When a bank customer uses another bank's automated teller machine, 65 of 93 Texas banks surveyed charge fees of up to \$1.50 per transaction. The report urges the Texas Legislature to monitor ATM fees for a possible cap, or prohibition on the non-customer surcharge.
- Sixteen universities in the state have increased fees to the point that they exceed tuition, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board said in a report to the House higher education subcommittee. Rep. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, vice chairman of the subcommittee, said the Legislature should try to simplify the fee structure "so parents have a better idea why they are paying so much and what the money is going for."

Americans go to a lot of trouble — and often travel a lot of miles — to celebrate during Independence Day.

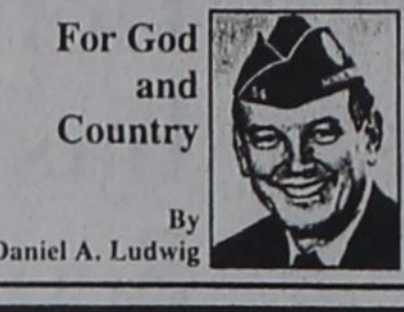
But, are we celebrating America's independence?

### The House Approves Most-Favored-Nation (MFN) Trade Treatment for China

The future of American agriculture will increasingly rely on developments in countries and markets far from our shores. A case in point is China.

On June 29, the U.S. House of Representatives voted 286 to 141 to extend MFN treatment for China. This means that the U.S. will allow China's products to enter our country at the same low tariff rates that apply to virtually all trading partners.

While MFN treatment for China has been a controversial issue, it is important to keep in mind just how important trade is to the agricultural sectors in Texas and the United States.

For example, it is likely that grain supplies will continue to be tight through next year. A rising demand from Asian economies could result in an export boom that could keep

both production and prices at the boiling point for much of the upcoming decade.

From fiscal year (FY) 1994 to FY 1995 agricultural exports increased by 175% U.S. agricultural exports increased by 175% U.S. agricultural exports to China topped \$2.6 billion last year, compared to \$333 million worth of goods in 1993. In 1995, Texas was responsible for 23% of U.S. agricultural exports to China, with exports totaling \$650 million.

China's economy is one of the fastest growing in the world. Its income has grown 10% this year and is expected to continue at this rate through the coming decade. China has a population of 1.2 billion -- four and a half times more people than the U.S. -- and includes a growing middle class with more disposable income that can be spent on more varied and more nutritious diets.

By 1995, U.S. grain exports to China had already reached 9.1 million tons. China's demand for grain is expected to outstrip supply by over 20 million tons as early as the year 2000. In fact, at 12 million tons per year, China is the world's largest wheat importer. By the year 2030, China is expected to import about 90 million tons -- one half of today's total global grain trade!

China is the world's largest importer of cotton, and is the largest export market for U.S. cotton -- importing 18% of total U.S. exports. Cotton exports to China increased from \$497 million to \$813 million between 1994 and 1995.

The U.S. currently exports \$12 billion in agricultural products to China each year, providing more than 170,000 American jobs. For each additional \$1 billion in agricultural

## Rylander Initiates "Texas Energy Awareness Month"

Carole Keeton Rylander, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, today launched an initiative to increase awareness of the importance of the oil and gas industry in Texas.

"Every aspect of our lives is impacted by the oil and gas industry. Everything from the gasoline in our tanks, to milk jugs in our refrigerators, to the gas in our barbecue grills, is directly attributable to oil and gas. Yet, in my opinion, too few Texans know the facts about how much the oil and gas industry in Texas had done," said Rylander.

In recent poll (conducted by the National Energy Education Development Project or "N.E.E.D."), only 43% of United States teenagers knew that gasoline came from oil. In Texas, the largest producing state, it was even more surprising—only 38% of Texas teenagers knew that gasoline came from oil.

"That's why I initiated an aggressive effort to heighten the awareness of Texas oil and gas. That effort will be centered around Texas Energy Awareness Month which will be September," said Rylander.

Chairman Carole Keeton Rylander, joined by Commissioners Barry

Williamson and Charles R. Matthews, unanimously voted to begin efforts to raise awareness of the energy industry in Texas. During projects, bring speakers into the classrooms, and hold regional meetings with representatives from the Railroad Commission, the oil and gas industry and educators.

"T.E.A.M. is absolutely essential for the future economic development of Texas. The oil and gas industry creates some of the highest paying and highest skilled jobs of all sectors of the economy. But unless people appreciate its importance, then we will continue to see these jobs exported overseas, and government will continue to make poor policy decisions that severely limit this key industry's ability to grow and employ more Texans," said Rylander.

"Texans enjoy good schools, good roads, exemplary universities -- all without a state income tax largely due to the Texas Oil & Gas Industry and I want to keep it that way-- without a state income tax. That means doing all we can to make certain the energy arena keeps pumping out paychecks and jobs for our children and grandchildren well into the 21st Century," said Rylander.

Rylander. The Texas oil and gas industry in 1995 alone:

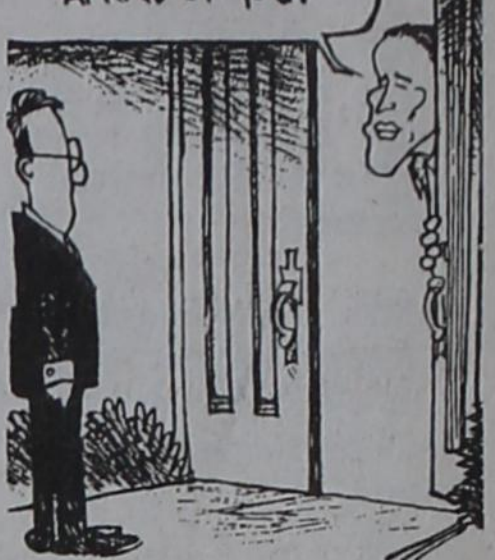
- \* Pumped over \$52 billion into the state economy
- \* Employed over 293,000 Texans
- \* Contributed \$141 million to the Texas Permanent School Fund.
- \* Contributed \$57 million to the Texas Permanent University Fund

"On the list of natural resources, our fossil fuels rank behind only clean water and clean air in importance. You can drink a little less soda or stop chewing gum, but you still have to get up in the morning, get in your car and get to work. and you can't do that without a productive and vibrant domestic energy industry," said Rylander.

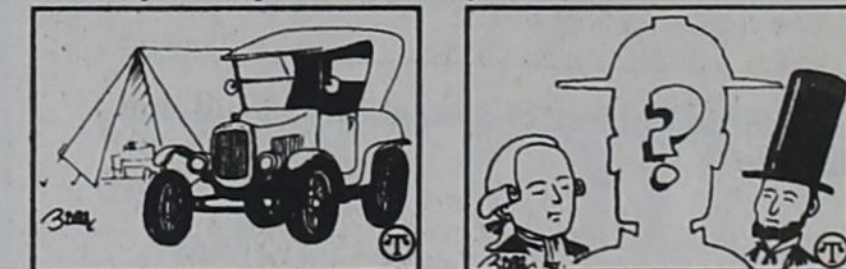

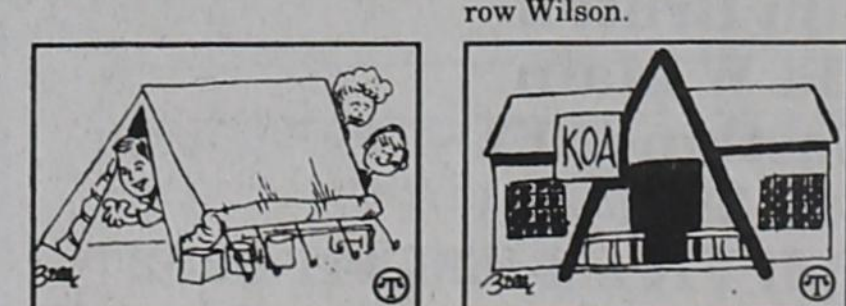

### Operation: Running Clean

(NAPS)—While some Olympic athletes are busy passing the torch to one another as they travel from city to city, nearly 150 staff members of the 1996 Olympic Torch Relay will be passing their dirty uniforms on to dozens of drycleaners and laundriers who have volunteered their time and skill in the true spirit of the Olympics to Operation Running Clean.

It is estimated that the staff members will need as many as 30 cleaning stops along the 84-day, 15,000-mile route.

Approximately 500 shirts and pairs of pants, and 150 mesh bags containing personal items will be processed by members of the International Fabricare Institute at each stop in less than 24 hours.

"We appreciate the quality laundry and dry-cleaning services being provided to the Torch Relay staff," said Hilary Hanson, Director of the 1996 Olympic Torch Relay. "This service will contribute to the efficient movement of the Torch Relay across the United States."



Behind the scenes of the 1996 Olympic Torch Relay are over 100 staff members who face the hectic routine of traveling from city to city, and dozens of drycleaners who have volunteered to keep the staff looking their best.

Prior to the start of the relay, the official uniform—which is a plum and gray shirt and khaki pants—was laboratory-tested to ensure minimal color loss and proper finishing procedures.

America will be glad to know the pants and shirts laundered well. The most significant problem noted was the shirt's colorfastness to light and color change due to perspiration. But, so far, everything looks great.
