Property owners must render their property for taxation before May 1, and themselves designate a homestead if they wish to save the state tax on 53,000 of the homestead evalation as provided by last year's amendment to the state consti-

Unrendered property, placed on the assessor's list for such property, will not be eligible for listing as a homestead, and neither will the exemption be allowed unless it is claimed by the owner.

Austin, April 9.—The legislature is now in the fourth month of its regular session. Under the constitution the \$10 per day compensation lasts 120 days. Extension of the session beyond this period is possible, but pay of the members will be reduced by half. It is not likely that the session will be prolonged much beyond May 9 when the fourmonths period of high pay ends, though some members believe it will last until the latter part of May. There is strong sentiment among many leaders to bring the session to a close as early as possible, due chiefly to the fact that there seems to be an almost hopeless lack of harmony on many important subjects with little prospect of composing these differences.

Up to this time, efforts to levy new taxes have failed with the single exception of an income tax, which has House approval. But there will be a determined effort Spreads to N. > The income tax bill follows many provisions of the federal income tax. As amended it exempts \$2,500 of the income of married persons and permits an exemption of \$500 for each dependent. The rates graduate from one per cent on the first \$1,000 of net income for individuals ot seven per cent on incomes in excess of \$11,000. The corporation rate is from two per cent on the first \$1,000 to six per cent on incomes in excess of \$6,000. Passage by the Senate is regarded as doubtful.

The Senate has passed the four major appropriation bills. The House has passed three and is yet to act on the educational appropriations. The judiciary appropriation bill has passed both branches of the legislature and has been signed by the governor. The eleemosynary and departmental bills are in the hands of free conference committees to adjust differences between

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

#### PRESIDENT STRESSES AN OBSERVANCE OF MAY DAY

Austin. April 18.-Franklin D. Roosevelt has designated May first as Child Health Day, and calls upon all agencies, public or private, and all individuals having the interest of the children at heart, to set aside that day for earnest consideration of the needs of the children in their communities and in their homes, and to inaugurate constructive activities to protect and promote the health and physical vigor of the youth of the nation.

In this state the work will be this observance is to focus the attention of the general public upon the child and that the interest thus aroused will continue throughout the year. The list of activities included in this program start with prenatal care and continue through


the school life of the child. Dr. H. N. Barnett, director, Bureau of Child Hygiene, said, "The most solemn duty of any civilized society lies in the protection of child life, as no form of government can perpetuate itself unless it insures it's future through fostering and safeguarding the lives of the children upon whom its very existence must depend. We have made great strides in art, science and literature, which our advanced civilization demands, but unless we have a people of intelligence, full of health and vitality, all these are as nothing. Without health, it is impossible for our children to carry on the burdens of our civilization." Plans and literature for the building of child health programs may be secured from the Texas State Department of Health, and it is hoped that the President's call for this observance will be enthusiastically received.

Repeal of the Robertson insurance law would break down protection which has given Texas companies a big start, employing many Texas people, and would remove one of the state's principal sources of funds for real estate loans. The present law provides that out-of-state companies writing policies in Texas must invest 75 per cent of the reserves on their Texas-written policies in Texas.

WHY GAMBLE WITH A SURE THING?

Repeal of the law would leave the state wide open for the big insurance companies of the east to write as much insurance in Texas as they could sell, sending all of the reserve wherever they might choose for investment. Before the law was enacted insurance companies had invested \$6,000,000 in real estate mortgage loans. Now all companies combined have \$309,000,000 invested in this way.

Proponents of repeal state that many major companies would invest huge sums in Texas if the law were repealed. Would they, though? Is it likely that they will do something voluntarily that they do not do under legal restriction? An individual might, but a corporation, never. Let's let a good law stand, and take no chances, either with home industry or this source of real estate financing.



"The act provides that any publication shall be denied privileges of the mails if it neglects to comply with such orders within 10 days after notice by registered letter of such failure.

"An additional provision provides for fines of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 for any editor or publisher printing editorial or other reading matter for which compensation is paid without so marking the material." - Kerrville Mountain Sun.

### Dipping Frees Goats of Lice, Tests show

Babcock Conducts Successful Demonstration at Station

Two dippings resulted in lice-free goats at the Ranch Experiment Station near Sonora, tests conducted by O. G. Babccck, entomologist with the United States Department of Agriculture, show.

The Station flock was dipped Oct. 7 and again Oct. 17 in a solution consisting of 10 pounds of thylox sulphur dust, 25 ounces linseed oil soap, 25 ounces sodium phosphate tribasic, and 100 gallons of water, according to a recent issue of the Extension Service News.

Mr. Babcock states that he believes the use of the formula will keep goats free from lice for extended periods, but that they will undoubtedly become re-infested from contact with stray goats and stock brought to the Station.



### Sheep Enjoy Chew of Tobacco, Said

Canadian Authorities on Animal Husbandry Say Weed Helps

Ottawa, Can., April 11.—Even sheep like tobacco, and it's good for them, according to Canadian authorities on animal husbandry. An official bulletin issued jointly by the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture said:

"Ten pounds of crushed tobacco leaf mixed with 100 pounds of salt and exposed regularly to sheep will help greatly to keep down the number of stomach and intestinal parasites with which so many flocks have become infested.

"The tobacco leaf should be dry in order that it may be broken up in a size equal to wheat bran. The salt and tobacco are mixed together and just enough water added so that the tobacco will stick and the salt settle into a firm cake."

In 1929 the Smiths had an income of \$40 a week. In 1929 the Smiths were paying \$50 for a \$35 house. In 1929 Mrs. Smith was forced to do considerable squeezing of pennies to keep the grocery bill within \$12 a week.

In 1932 the Smiths had their wages cut to \$34 a week. In 1932 the Smiths forced the landlord to accept \$35 for his \$35 house. Rather he refused to accept it and the Smiths moved to a house owned by a landlord who had discovered that times had changed.

The Smiths' income had been reduced \$312 a year, but the Smiths have cut their rent bill \$180 a year.

In 1932 Mrs. Smith has discovered she feeds the family better on \$7 a week than she could in 1929 on \$12. The Smiths are saving \$260 a year on food.

Rent and food saving amounts to \$440. Wage cuts amount to \$312.

In 1929 the Smiths were in debt some \$500. In 1932 the Smiths are in debt \$60.

Mrs. Smith needs two new dresses, which can be bought at less than half of the 1929 price. Mr. Smith needs a new suit.

The radio which cost the Smiths \$160 in 1928 can be duplicated now for less than \$75. The old radio has started to wheeze.

The small car the Smiths own is getting a bit shabby. Mr. Smith is thinking thoughts about a new car.

The Smiths in 1932 have more money than in 1929.

The Smiths have been a bit cautious in their buying because they heard so much depression talk . . . But now they've begun to suspect that things are not so bad as some people had painted them.


