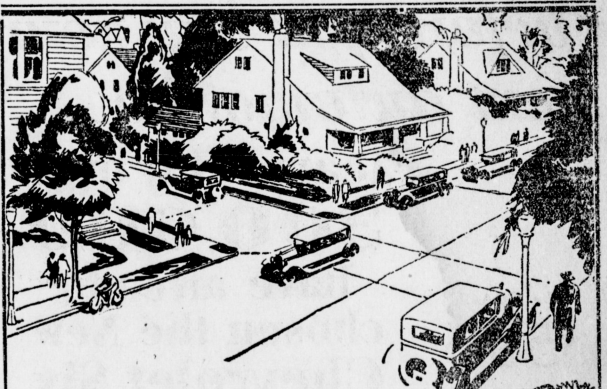

Death Valley in Java Exudes Poison Gases

For years travelers in Java have told of a "death valley" on the slopes of the volcano of Tangkohon Prabu. The bottom of this valley, so they report, is paved with the skeletal remains of birds and lizards, and, according to some, even the skeletons of a few venturesome human beings who dropped dead there or staggered out of the fatal bowl only to die on its rim. This valley has now been definitely located by the chemist of the volcanological survey of the Dutch East Indies.

The Java valley, says Dr. E. E. Free, seems to deserve its name, for inconspicuous vents in its bottom have been discovered by the chemists to be discharging not only carbon dioxide gas, which displaces the oxygen of the air and might suffocate the unwary, but also a still deadlier poison, hydrogen sulphide gas. This compound is the evil-smelling gas given off by rotten eggs. In the small traces set from such decaying substances, or as used in equally small amounts in chemical laboratories, the gas is not seriously dangerous. Analyses made in Java's deadly valley show, however, as much as 10 per cent of this gaseous poison in the air—enough to poison any creature that breathes it for more than a few seconds.—Pathfinder Magazine.

Slumber Long, Advice of Woman Physician

Furfural is Now Cheap

Once a chemical curiosity, selling for \$20 a pound, furfural, widely used as an insecticide, now sells for 10 cents a pound as a result of recent discoveries by chemists who have succeeded in producing it from oat hulls and other waste farm products.

A discovery by Prof. Orland R. Sweeney, chemist at the Iowa State college, has opened up an entirely new source for furfural in sugar beets. After the sugar has been extracted from the beets, the pulp is put through an additional process which extracts the chemical.

Besides serving as an insecticide, furfural is used in making synthetic resins.—Popular Science Monthly.

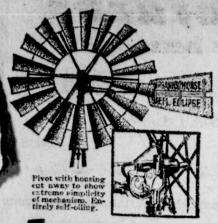

WORLD'S DEEPEST OIL AND GAS WELL LOCATED IN BEAGAN COUNTY ON TEXAS U. LAND

Austin, Texas.—Daily production of the deepest oil and gas well in the world, located on land owned by the University of Texas in Beagan County, has now reached approximately 3,000 barrels and it continues to move upward at an average rate of more than twenty barrels a day, according to latest reports. Production from the well started on December 31 with a daily output of only 40 barrels of oil. The gas flow has increased to more than 22,000,000 cubic feet a day. The oil and enormous flow of gas are coming from a depth of 8,535 feet.

FIRST ENGINEERS SHOW AT TECH SATURDAY, APRIL 20

Lubbock, Texas.—Students and faculty members of the high schools of District No. 2, of the Interscholastic League will be given a special invitation to attend the first Engineers' Show to be held at the School of Engineering, Texas Technological College, Saturday, April 20.

Business men of towns in this section also have a special invitation to attend the show.

The three engineering buildings and all the machinery and apparatus will be put in use by students and faculty members of the school at the Engineers' School to show the general public what work the school is doing.

The show will open at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and will continue until late in the afternoon, according to Dean Wm. J. Miller.

The School of Engineering has seven departments, electrical, mechanical, civil, textile, architectural, geological, and chemical and special tests will be conducted in each of the departments to give the visitors complete information about the work.

FLY TIME COMING AGAIN

Fly time will soon be here again, and an ounce of prevention of fly breeding is worth a pound of fly swatters, sticky fly paper, or traps later on. Manure is a favorite breeding place for flies. Inclosure or screening the manure pit or bin is a great help in controlling this pest. Tent traps or conical traps, placed over holes large enough to attract flies to the light, may be attached to the top of the pit or bin. Water-tight floors are desirable in a stable. Dirt or wooden floors enable many fly larvae to migrate from the manure to the soil and develop there. Troughs and mangers should be kept clean, as surprisingly large numbers of flies will breed in small quantities of material in the corners of such places.

SPRING FEVER

There really "ain't no such animal." But since the elements revolt at a placid change of weather conditions, mother nature might well and as wisely make the old human being revolt also.

April showers are no more than the breaking of the winter and a change in the climatic condition from a colder to a warmer atmosphere. There is bound to be some sort of atmospheric ruction. It may be storms, it may be cyclones and twisters. This is natural.

The adjustment of the anatomy is hardly so turbulent, but it is equally affected. The blood a bit thicker in the winter does not thin down in a day. It must be a trifle thinner in summer. This is a slow process. When the first hot days come, the physical condition is not ready for the change. The slowness and the thick blood are not in accord. Thus the sluggishness, thus the spring fever. The warmer it continues to become, the thinner the blood becomes, until adjustment is made.

That's the natural explanation of spring fever. Sluggishness and laziness are not of the same ilk. They mean entirely two different things. Spring fever is a natural phenomenon with many and not a mere myth.—Exchange.

"Old Sol" Classed as

Quite Ordinary Star

The sun is a very humble unit amid the great stellar population according to a leading astronomer. It is, he says, a very ordinary star about midway in the scale of brilliancy. We know of stars which give at least 10,000 times the light of the sun; we know also of stars which give 1/10,000 of its light. But those of inferior light greatly outnumber those of superior light.

In mass, in surface temperature, in bulk, the sun belongs to a very common class of stars; its speed of motion is near the average; it shows none of the more conspicuous phenomena, such as variability, which excite the attention of astronomers. In the company of stars the sun corresponds to a respectable middle-class citizen.

It happens to be quite near the center of the local star cloud; but this apparently favored position is discounted by the fact that the star cloud itself is placed very eccentrically in relation to the galactic system (the Milky way), being in fact near the confines of it. We cannot claim to be at the hub of the universe.

HOOVER TO CONSERVE OIL

President Hoover has stated that there will be complete conservation of oil in his administration and that unless a mandatory act is passed by Congress, no additional permits for all prospecting on public lands will be issued. In cases where permits have already been issued, the administration will, if oil is discovered, carry out the provisions of the general leasing act of 1920, which requires that the Department of the Interior shall call for bids on lands adjacent to those on which the oil has been found.

This is unquestionably the greatest constructive step yet made toward solving the problem of oil waste. Responsible producers, through the American Petroleum Institute and other organizations, have been making intensive efforts to curtail over-production and effect co-operative development of pools. They have made slow progress because of uncontrolled competition.

Now, with official action, it would seem as if we were on the verge of a solution at last. Production has exceeded consumption for many years; a vast amount of surplus oil has either been placed in storage or wasted to the detriment of both the industry and the public. President Hoover's effort to correct this condition should have far-reaching benefits.—Manufacturers' Record.

Bird, Dashed to Death

According to authorities on bird life, the lighthouses of the New England coast cause the death of thousands of sea fowl every year. In their migrations to and from the southlands the birds, if caught in a storm, try to find a safe haven.

The fixed white lights seem to have the greatest attraction for them. Flying at high speed, they dash themselves against the thick lenses and are either killed outright or are stunned and fall to the rocks or the sea below and perish. Strangely enough, flashing lights and also red beacons apparently repel them, but the blinding, steady white rays take heavy toll from their ranks.

Contrary to popular belief, the sea fowl do not seek southern climes to avoid cold weather.

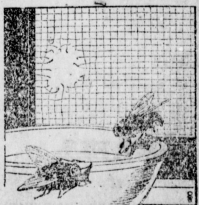

What's Doing In West Texas

San Angelo was chosen as the meeting place for the 1929 convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, at the last meeting held in Houston. T. D. Hobart of Pampa, former vice-president, will direct activities. San Angelo was voted the next meeting place by almost unanimous acclamation.

Hamlin is expecting continued prosperity, considering that the early grass will make fat cattle, and the early season a good cotton crop. Some of the wealth is coming through the cream, butter, poultry and hog avenue, these commodities making the farming outlook better than usual.

Tahoka is to have a talkie theatre at no distant date. The new show house is to be of brick tile construction, 38 by 100 feet in size and installed with vitaphone equipment. This theatre will not cause the old one to be discontinued, but will be under the same management.

At Merkel petitions are being circulated with the required number of signatures already attached asking the school board to call an election for the near future, at which the issuance of bonds to the amount of \$15,000 for improvements to the grammar school building will be the issue. The speedy repairing of the standing building will save the building of an entirely new one.

Lampasas is to be the home of a salt factory as soon as the proper location in the city can be found. It is expected that work will be started on the building in a few days, and it may be completed during the month of April.

San Saba has been the scene of the death of innumerable prairie dogs lately. L. C. Whitehead of the Federal Bureau of Biology, conducted the campaign for extermination of predatory animals, setting out over 300 pounds of poison with the aid of farmers in the community.

Ovalls's Methodist pastor, John W. Price, will conduct a boy's trip to the East, taking 12 boys with him, ranging in age from 13 to 17 years. Some sights scheduled to be seen are the village of Harper's Ferry, Washington's Monument, Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, the Capitol and Mount Vernon.

Ranger and Tahoka will be the scenes of the next two district conventions of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The Oil Belt District will hold its meeting in Ranger April 18, and the South Plains District will convene on April 24 at Tahoka. Well rounded speaking programs have been announced for each.

Estelline is enthusiastic about securing the right of way for Highway No. 5 from the town to Red River. The contract for both bridge and paving will be let early in April. The bridge will be one of the best on the river or in the whole State. The old bridge was too small to accommodate traffic and needed repairing.

Roswell, N. M., is to have sixteen new cabins added to the Girl Scout summer camp in Bear Canyon. This will make a total of 58 new cabins. The camp period is from July 18 to August 15, and 800 girls from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will spend their vacations there.

Booker will have natural gas for fuel by September, according to a franchise granted by the local city council at the last regular meeting to a company which plans to supply Booker, Perryton, Darrouzzett, Fellett, Higgins and Shattuck.

LUBBOCK TO GET GRAIN TESTING LABORATORY SOON

A standard grain protein testing laboratory, such as is used in Dallas, Galveston and other Texas grain marketing centers, is to be installed in Lubbock during June, according to information received here yesterday by S. E. Cone, secretary and treasurer of the Lubbock Grain Exchange, from the Texas Testing Laboratories at Dallas. The laboratory may be installed here at any time during the next few weeks. Mr. Cone said in a statement. Protein analysis of all grains, and cake and oils from the cotton oil mills from this section can be made in the laboratory. The cost will be \$1 per car. Ranchers of this section may also receive analysis of cake shipped into the section from other points at a cost of \$1 per sample. With the installation of the testing laboratory in the city, Lubbock makes another step forward in becoming one of the most important grain centers of the State. Through the services of R. R. Stuard, licensed Federal grain inspector, the bulk of the grain shipped out of the section last season came through the local exchange for inspection. The inauguration of the testing service will bring even more grain through the Lubbock route for other destinations, officials said.

ALL RECORDS OF CHEVROLET PRODUCTION ARE BROKEN

Detroit - All monthly production records in the history of the Chevrolet Motor Company were broken in March, when the company produced 147,274 cars and trucks. A factory statement explained that this figure was considerably in excess of preliminary production schedules and was made necessary to more fully accommodate an increasing demand for the new Chevrolet six.

This March record compares with 135,657 units for March of last year and with 121,249 for February of this year. It exceeded by nearly 7,000 units the best previous month in the history of the company, which was May, 1928, when output totalled 140,775 units.

The March performance enabled the company to exceed all records for the first quarter of the year, with a total of 354,701 units as compared with 324,184 for the first three months of 1928.

In preparation for what promises to be the biggest Spring business on record, the manufacturing division is operating on the heaviest schedule ever undertaken by the company. The company's sixteen giant factories are speeding toward capacity operation with all the haste consistent with precision manufacturing, it is announced. Officials predict that the record activity planned for April will result in another monthly record and for the second consecutive month establish a new mark.

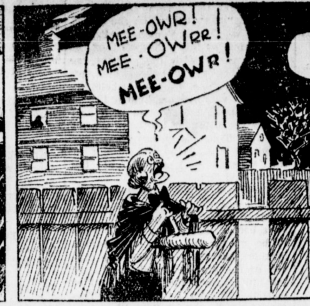

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 3 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as may be prescribed by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive no compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to cases of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State. The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for

good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor, providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 3. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive a compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

WHEN TO PASTURE COWS

In deciding when to turn the dairy cows on pasture, consider both the cows and the grass. Very early pasturing is of little value to the cows; the grass is watery and low in nutrition. Neither is early pasturing good for the grass, as the later yields will be reduced and more damage from trampling may occur. Keep the cows off the pasture until the grass is at least several inches high and abundant enough so that they can get their fill in a few hours.

NATIONAL COTTON SHOW TO BE HELD AGAIN AT MEMPHIS, ATLANTA AND DALLAS

The National Cotton Show will be held again this year at the Tri-State Fair, Memphis; the Southeastern Fair, Atlanta, and the State Fair of Texas, Dallas. Sixty outstanding stalks of cotton will be awarded cash prizes ranging from \$1,000 down to \$10.00. The \$1,000 prize award will go to the best single stalk of cotton in the South to be selected from among the three stalks winning first prize at each of the three fairs. These three winning stalks will be awarded \$200 each at Memphis, Atlanta and Dallas, and the best one of these three will be awarded an additional \$300 at a special judging at Dallas. The single stalks winning second place at each of the three fairs will receive \$300 each, third \$200, fourth \$100, fifth \$50, sixth to tenth inclusive \$35 each, and eleventh to twentieth inclusive \$10 each.

The National Cotton Show, which was held for the first time last year at the three sectional fairs, attracted a large entry list, hundreds of farmers sending their best single stalks to the fair in their district. The show, which is sponsored by the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation and the Soil Improvement Committee of the National Fertilizer Association, is being held again this year to stimulate interest in economical production of better cotton from which the farmer gets more profit.

There are only a few rules governing the contest. Any farmer, whether landlord or tenant, white or colored, or any member of his family will be allowed to enter a single stalk for competition. Only one stalk may be shown from each unit, and it must be from a field where at least one acre of cotton was grown in 1929. No restrictions are placed on spacing, fertilization, irrigation or cultural practices used in growing the stalk, but picking and refilling are prohibited, leaves must be removed, but branches must not be cut from the stalk exhibited. For purposes of identification, a card will be sent to each entrant and the name of the variety must be placed, along with other information, on this card, which will accompany the stalk to the show.

Farmers living in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Florida will show at Atlanta; those in Texas and Oklahoma at Dallas, and those in Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri and Kentucky in Memphis. Judging will be done by outstanding cotton authorities from each section and selections will be made on the basis of score cards prepared by competent agricultural authorities, including experiment station and agricultural college workers. Entry blanks and further information may be had by writing the National Cotton Show in Dallas, Atlanta or Memphis.

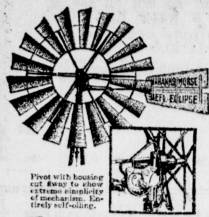

Thistles Routed by Use of Alfalfa Crop Prepare Early for Treatment of Infested Fields.

"For Canada thistles use alfalfa." This is the prescription of A. L. Stone, state weed commissioner for Wisconsin, and the medicine even when taken in large doses is not hard to take.

For besides destroying the thistles, a good crop of rich forage is produced. But soil and other conditions must be right if alfalfa is to thrive and the Canada thistles must be partially subdued before the alfalfa seed is sown, according to Stone.

"Now is the time to begin work on Canada thistle infested grain fields where alfalfa is to be produced next year," advises Stone. "Plow as soon as the grain crop is removed and turn the soil deeply enough to bring the running roots up to the surface. Then with a spring tooth harrow the roots will be pulled to the surface where they can be dried and killed by sun and wind. The field should be kept cultivated until the ground freezes in an effort to keep the plants from forming stems.

"Next spring the field may be plowed again a little deeper than the first time and lime should be added if necessary," recommends Stone. "The first week in June alfalfa seed may be sown at the rate of 20 pounds per acre without a nurse crop. With plow two or three years the Canada thistles will be destroyed and in their place will be a fine stand of alfalfa."

HOOVER TO CONSERVE OIL

FIRST OIL AND GAS ATTED IN REAGAN ON TEXAS U-LAND

Daily production of oil and gas well in Reagan County, Texas in Reagan County, Texas, has increased to more than 100 cubic feet a day. The flow of gas is a depth of 8,335 feet.

President Hoover has stated that there will be complete conservation of oil in his administration and that unless a mandatory act is passed by Congress, no additional permits for all prospecting on public lands will be issued. In cases where permits have already been issued, the administration will, if oil is discovered, carry out the provisions of the general leasing act of 1920, which requires that the Department of the Interior shall call for bids on lands adjacent to those on which the oil has been found.

This is unquestionably the greatest constructive step yet made toward solving the problem of oil waste. Responsible producers, through the American Petroleum Institute and other organizations, have been making intensive efforts to curtail over-production and effect co-operative development of pools. They have made slow progress because of uncontrolled competition.

Now, with official action, it would seem as if we were on the verge of a solution at last. Production has ex-

ceeded consumption for many years; a vast amount of surplus oil has either been placed in storage or wasted to the detriment of both the industry and the public. President Hoover's effort to correct this condition should have far-reaching benefits.—Manufacturers' Record.

Birds Dashed to Death

According to authorities on bird life, the lighthouses of the New England coast cause the death of thousands of sea fowl every year. In their migrations to and from the southlands the birds, if caught in a storm, try to find a safe haven.

The fixed white lights seem to have the greatest attraction for them. Flying at high speed, they dash themselves against the thick lenses and are either killed outright or are stunned and fall to the rocks or the sea below and perish. Strangely enough, flashing lights and also red beams apparently repel them, but the blinding, steady white rays take heavy toll from their ranks.

Contrary to popular belief, the sea fowl do not seek southern climes to avoid cold weather.

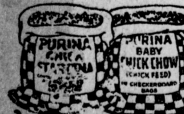

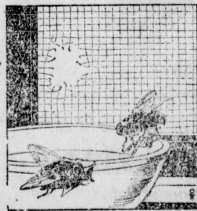
