Myers wins buckle at Junior Rodeo

Garrison Myers, soon to enter the fourth grade, isn't quite ready to go back to school. He's having too much fun rodeoing and "working" at Muleshoe Motor Co.

The *Journal* caught up with the nine-year-old cowboy answering phones at the dealership this past Tuesday. He's just recently won the Second Annual Trey Bilberry Memorial Scholarship Buckle at the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association (HPJRA) Rodeo in Clovis, an award the young man is proud to have received.

"I'm very proud of it and glad they chose me," said Myers, son of Thurman and Rhonda Myers of Muleshoe. "They gave it to me for sportsmanship."

Myers has been competing since he was about five years old according to his father; but he's been riding horses since he was "about three" according to the buckle winner.

"He's a good competitor, yet, he'll be the first to pat his competitors on the back," said his proud father. "He has fun and that's what it's all about."

Garrison told the *Journal* he enjoys making friends and competing, but he really competes because he likes to ride horses.

"Our whole family rides and all three of us kids compete," he said. Garrison has two siblings, Madison, 15, and Jackson, 13. "Dad competes in some team roping events, but not many." T. Myers said he's "proud of all my children." They all compete with the utmost sportsmanship.

Myers competes in barrels, poles, goat tying and the roping event. However, because of his age, next year he'll have to quit competing in barrels and poles and set his sites on winning calf roping competitions.

According to Myers, that's "okay" with him because "roping is fun." He plans to continue rodeoing as he grows up and he'll take his horse "Snazzy" along for the ride. He also participates in stock show events, another hobby he'll "stick with."

Dad is especially proud of him for winning the Trey Bilberry buckle because he used to rodeo with Jeff Bilberry, father of the buckle's namesake.

The award was created in honor of Jeff's son, Trey, who died last year in a horse-riding accident. This award goes to the eight-and-under division who show the most heart and courage. Myers received the award just before turning nine at the end of the season.

"The award isn't necessarily for champions. It's for kids who show sportsmanship toward their competitors and I'm proud that Jeff's family honored Garrison like this," said T. Myers.

The Bailey County Commissioners' Court met Monday, Aug. 9 in regular session at the Courthouse.

The bills were paid, minutes from the last meeting were approved along with soil conservation worksheets and in-county travel forms. There were no departmental reports.

The Court considered amending the personnel policy changing mileage reimbursement from .28 cents to .32 cents a mile when using personal vehicles for work. The movement was approved.

The Court also considered proposals for a sprinkler system and landscaping for the new Law Enforcement Center. The Court voted on using Muleshoe Sod Farms because of their lower rates. They will be installing a drip system and sod around the new jailhouse. Details will be available at a later date.

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An adult's role in helping children learn and grow

Learning about what is best care for the development of infants and toddlers is important.

We know that having warm and loving relationships between young children and the adults in their lives has a lasting influence. Warm, sensitive care, in the first year of life can help children handle minor stress in preschool better. Elementary children will show fewer behavior problems when faced with stressful situa-

tions. Children may show more adaptability later on.

A stimulating, learning environment for infants and toddlers can even increase their brain development. Loving care, nutrition, good health care, and daily learning about his or her world add to the child's natural abilities and help the brain to develop.

How to Learn and Grow with Your Infant or Toddler:

*Learn about the child's natural routines and moods. From the first

days of life on, answer his cries for help and his feelings of happiness. Hold, touch, comfort, and play when he wants to. When he needs to rest, let him rest.

*Develop warm, loving relationships which show how much you care, value who he is, and make the child feel safe and secure.

*Understand that each child is different and special.

*From infancy on, talk to, sing to, and read to the child. Early language de-

velopment is the key to school success. Limit television and play music.

*Encourage play and have a safe play space, use stimulating toys, and listen to the child.

*Keep routines and rituals to help the child know what to expect.

*Discipline is teaching.

Help the child to understand the results of their behaviors.

*Choose good child care and stay involved in the care.

*Remember good nutrition, health care, and to take care of yourself, too.

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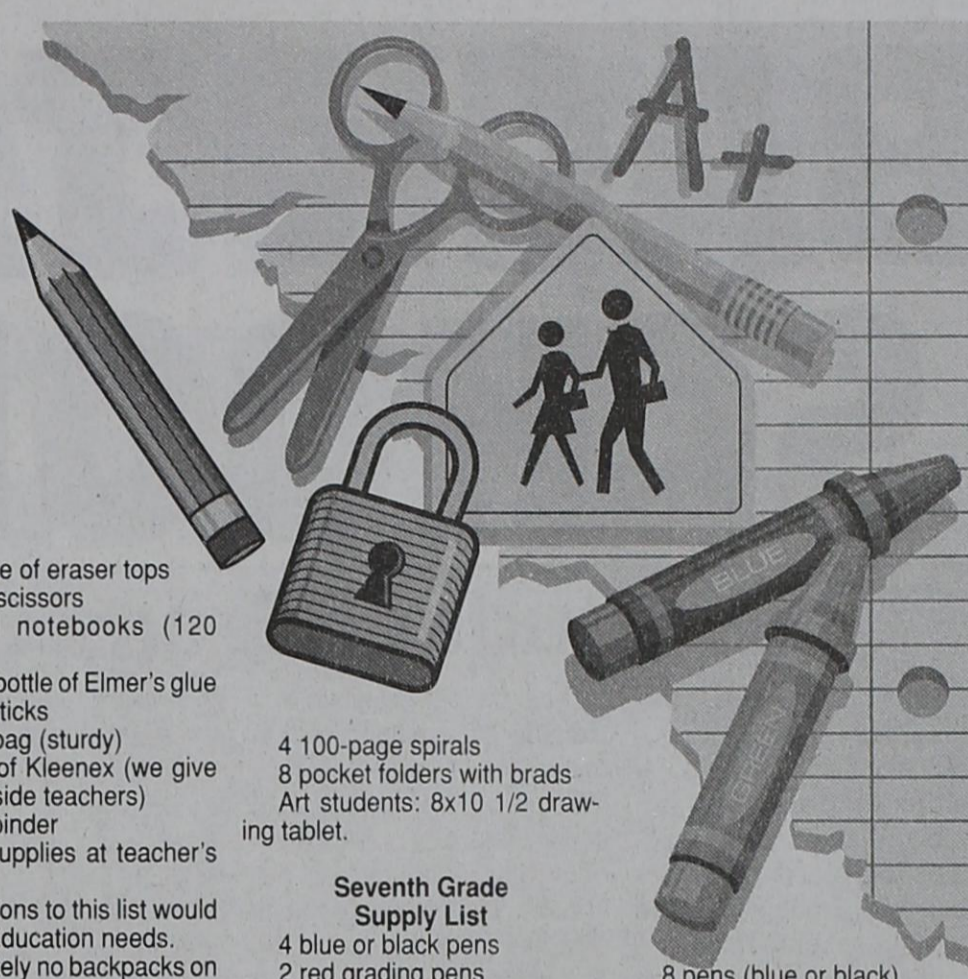

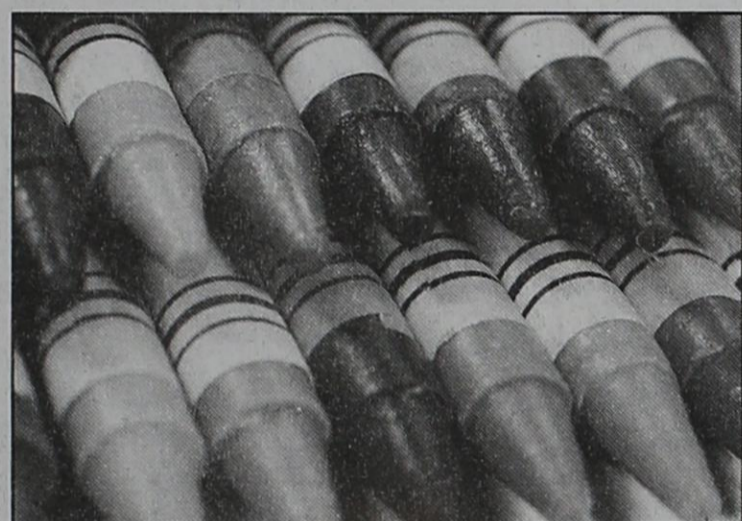

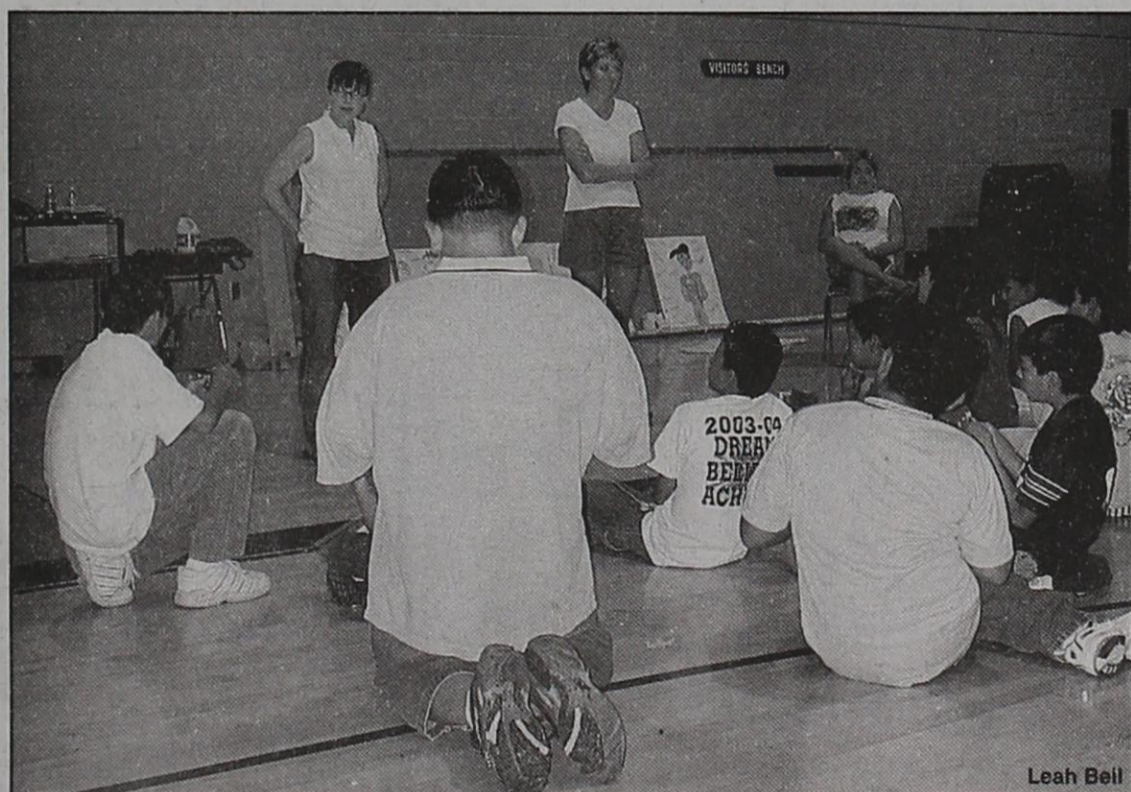

Student Dress Code

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards and teach respect for authority. Students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health or safety hazard to themselves or others.

The District prohibits any clothing or grooming that in the principal's judgement may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation. The district prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that are lewd, offensive, vulgar, gang-related or obscene; advertise or depict tobacco products, alco-

holic beverages, drugs or any other prohibited substances.

Dress must comply with the general guidelines set above and the dress code for students in the student handbook. These guidelines apply to school activities.

Shorts, skirts, and skirt lengths must be mid-thigh. Rips and tears in clothing, net-tops, thin-strap/strapless tank

tops, body piercing, earrings for boys, shirts that do not cover the midriff, sagging pants, oversized belts, and gang-related attire is not acceptable. Color variation in hair, ridiculous haircuts/styles and pony tails for boys are not acceptable. Caps, hats, bandanas, etc. are not permitted.

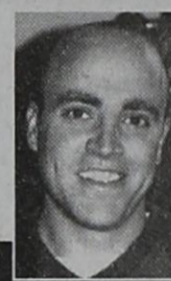

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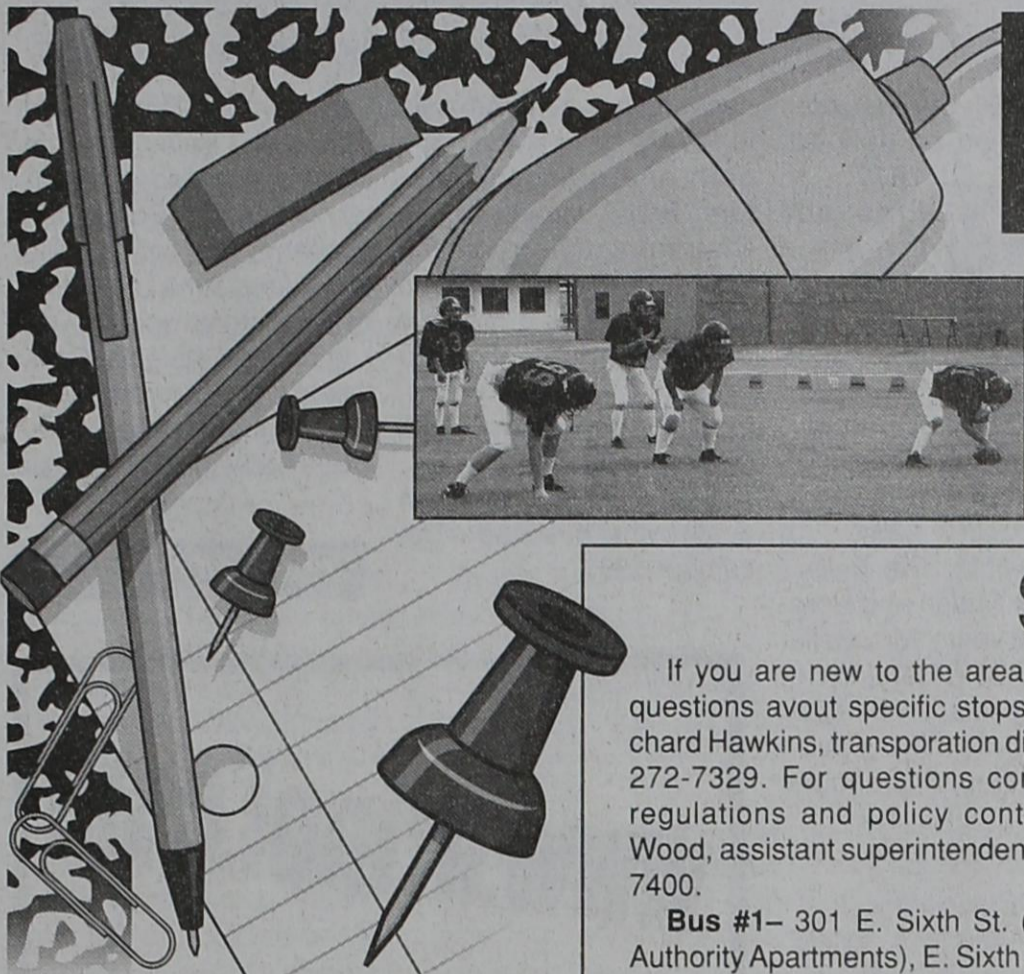

Medicine at school: Written requests for those students taking prescription/non-prescription medication must be turned into the school nurse along with the properly labeled bottle. The nurse will give medicines at proper times or give the student permission to take as directed.

Immunization: A student must be fully immunized against certain diseases. Required immunizations include: diphtheria, rubeola (measles), rubella, mumps, tetanus, Haemophilus influenza type B, poliomyelitis, hepatitis A and B, and varicella (chicken pox). The school nurse can provide information on age-appropriate doses. Proof of immunization may be personal records from a licensed physician or public health clinic with a signature or rubber-stamp validation.

Cafeteria services: The District participates in the National School Lunch Program and offers students nutritionally balanced lunches daily.

Students may buy lunch for \$1.20 (grades K-5) or for \$1.40 (grades 6-12). Breakfast may be purchased for .50 cents (all grades). Free and reduced-price lunches are available based on financial need.

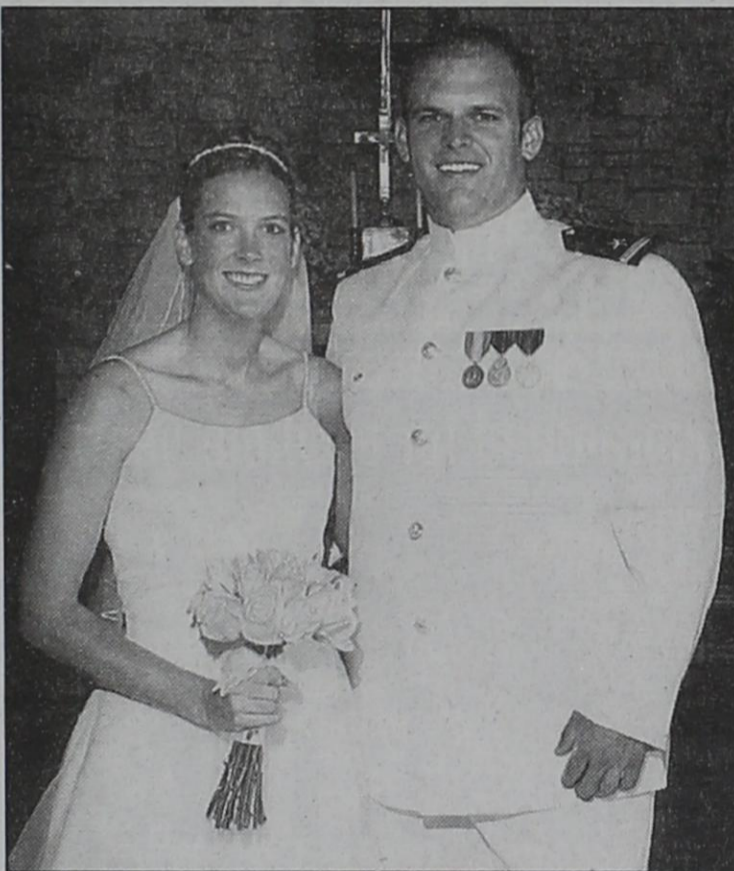

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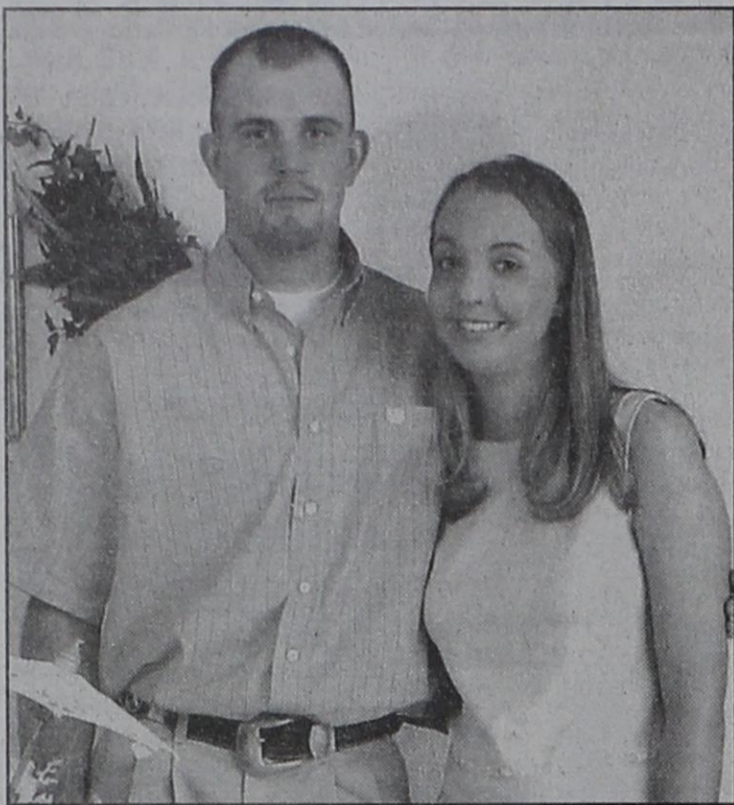

What frustrates wives most

A man typically views his life like a house. Each room in the house represents one of his roles in life. There is a room for his job, another for a sport, another room for his car, one for his garden, one for children, church, and yes, one for his wife.

As he makes his way through an average day, he visits various rooms where he is faced with the role the room defines. When he is in a certain room, the others are blocked out of his mind so he can focus his undivided attention on the role he plays at the time. He does his best when he's not faced with distractions, and prefers to deal with each problem with all his energy and creativity.

The wives of most men are only one of many rooms in this imaginary house. That room represents the "husband" role. When they are in that room, they usu-

ally try to give their wives undivided attention and make a special effort to meet their needs. They also go to that room to have their own needs met, particularly the need for sex.

Dr. Willard Harley, Jr. uses the above illustration to help husbands understand how their wives feel.

What frustrates wives most is that they are relegated to only one room in their husbands' imaginary house instead of every room. In other words, they want to be integrated into a man's entire life, not relegated to one corner. Without such integration, there can be no emotional bonding, no uniting of the spirit, no feeling of intimacy and, in many cases, no sex.

Husbands can learn to become emotionally connected to their wives by inviting them into each room of their house. They can learn to become more than the role of "husband" to their wives. Regardless of his role or responsibility, his wife should be considered in each decision he makes.

Once the invitation is made, the results are startling.

When a husband invites his wife into each room of his house, she helps change his priorities. She reminds him that her feelings are very different from his. As a result, he begins to live his life in a way that is compatible to her needs and values. He learns how to avoid habits that cause his wife to be unhappy, and he learns how to meet her most important emotional needs. He also learns how to give his undivided attention to her and schedule time to be alone with her.

Someone suggests that spouses adopt an agreement to "Never do anything without an enthusiastic agreement between you and your spouse." This type of policy helps each spouse to take their partners feelings into account whenever they make a decision. They avoid thoughtless habits, learn to meet emotional needs with mutual enjoyment and resolve their conflicts. All of this helps create marital compatibility and

emotional bonding.

Why is the word "enthusiastic" in the policy? It's because it's best for a couple to avoid agreements that are coerced or self-sacrificing. It's good for couples to keep negotiating until they arrive at an enthusiastic agreement because they are the ones that stand up to the test of time.

Some men fear that if they invite their wives into every room of their imaginary houses, their wives will take over completely and they will lose all their peace and freedom. They imagine their identities shriveling away and finding themselves a shadow of their former selves. A joint agreement means that both husband and wife must be enthusiastic together, and no one risks losing their identity. The goal is to become united, not to overpower or control each other.

Couples that are already emotionally bonded have little or no trouble doing this. But emotionally distant couples have great difficulty at first. They are accustomed to doing what they please regardless of its effect on each other.

A woman doesn't leave the man who has invited her into every room of his house. That's because she doesn't stand outside the rooms of his house feeling like a stranger. She is welcomed into his entire home as his cherished life partner.

I keep thinking about that famous father with no name whose son went off to a "far country." I guess I'm thinking about him right now because the father under my own hat just watched two of his sons head off halfway around the world to Uganda. Mbale, Uganda, to be exact. (Looks like that town needs to buy a vowel, doesn't it?) This trip to Uganda is a good thing. It really is. #1 and #3 son

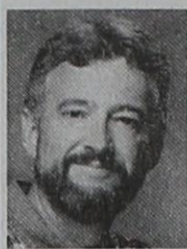
I also think it will be good for the missionary kids (the students) to get to wrestle with the kids who are "missionaries" (the teachers) on occasion. They don't get many guy teachers over there and very few cousins. Looks like a win-win deal to me.

I don't know what folks in heaven are able to see of the "goings-on" right here on earth, but I've got a feeling my mom and dad are smiling. I've been thinking of them, too, even more than usual lately. Years ago, when they said goodbye at the airport when my oldest brother and his wife, Ian's parents, went to Malawi, Africa, the "goodbye" was for several years. The mission was just being born, a letter might arrive in two weeks but more likely three, and phone calls were so difficult to arrange, so expensive, and so unreliable that one or two calls a year was the best you could expect. The best form of communication was by tape recording. Pretty one-sided and three weeks away. It's never easy to watch your kids leave to head around the world, but Mom & Dad had a much harder job in that regard than Juana & I do. We've got e-mail and every phone line in Uganda has Internet access built in (10 cents per minute—no ISPs). Their European cell phone service is better than the USA's. Amazing!

Yes, two of our sons are going to a "far country." But, sadly, the farthest countries are those that kids can go to in their hearts and attitudes even if they live in the same house with you. Uganda is closer and better.

Yes, I've found myself thinking of that loving father with no name. But I'm thinking much more of the Father who is love and in whose Name we trust.

Agricultural News

LDP's in effect on corn, grain sorghum

Cash Markets have fallen to the point where Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's) are in effect on corn and grain sorghum.

Producers are reminded that in order to be eligible for LDP's, you must have beneficial interest in the harvested commodity on the date that LDP benefits are requested. If beneficial interest is lost upon delivery of the commodity, you must complete a CCC - 709 prior to harvest. By completing the CCC - 709, you are eligible for the LDP Rate in effect on the day you deliver or the date you lose beneficial interest in the commodity. Producers must complete a CCC - 633 if the commodity is delivered to a storage warehouse to be stored.

Eligibility Requirements: Certify Crop Acreage; Have beneficial interest in the crop. You must have title, risk and control of the crop. If the crop is delivered to a buyer, you have lost beneficial interest. If the buyer pays you for the crop, even if it hasn't been moved from your farm, you have lost beneficial interest; LDP's require beneficial interest at the time of the LDP request; Actively apply an approved conservation plan; Have a completed and approved payment limitation form on file; File a CCC - 526 - Average Adjusted Gross Income Certification form (AGI).

The Commodity must meet these requirements: Be merchantable for Food or Feed; Be in existence and in a storable condition; Be produced by an eligible producer; Not be substituted or purchased; Be within acceptable moisture levels.

All production evidence submitted including scale tickets must show the following: Producer's name; Crop Year; Type of Commodity; Class, if applicable; Date of sale - if sold; Proof of payment from buyer, if commodity was sold (settlement records or copy of check); Net bushels of corn; Net weight for Grain Sorghum.

Production evidence may be handwritten, but is not acceptable for any type of production evidence submitted by the producer for the producer's own production.

contracts for collection on old tickets. The Court decided to go with the Warrant Enforcement Bureau who will only charge 30 percent on top of the original ticket plus the \$200 for failure to appear. This percentage will be paid by the ticket offender and costs nothing for the County.

An easement was granted to W. Jim Young for a water line to cross County Road 1018 from the northwest corner of Section 43, Block Y, W.D. & F.W. Johnson Subdivision.

The use of county road machinery and equipment for soil conservation and the prevention of soil waste through erosion through the Agriculture Code was granted to two county businesses.

A public hearing was set for Sept. 13, the next Commissioners' Court meeting, to adopt a budget amendment. It is scheduled for 1:15 p.m. in the meeting room of the Courthouse.

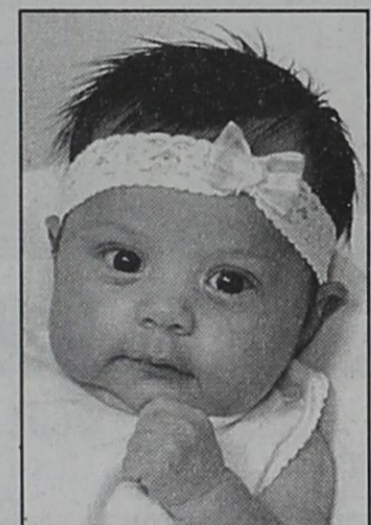

Participants will also receive an alfalfa crop book containing relevant production information, Trostle said.

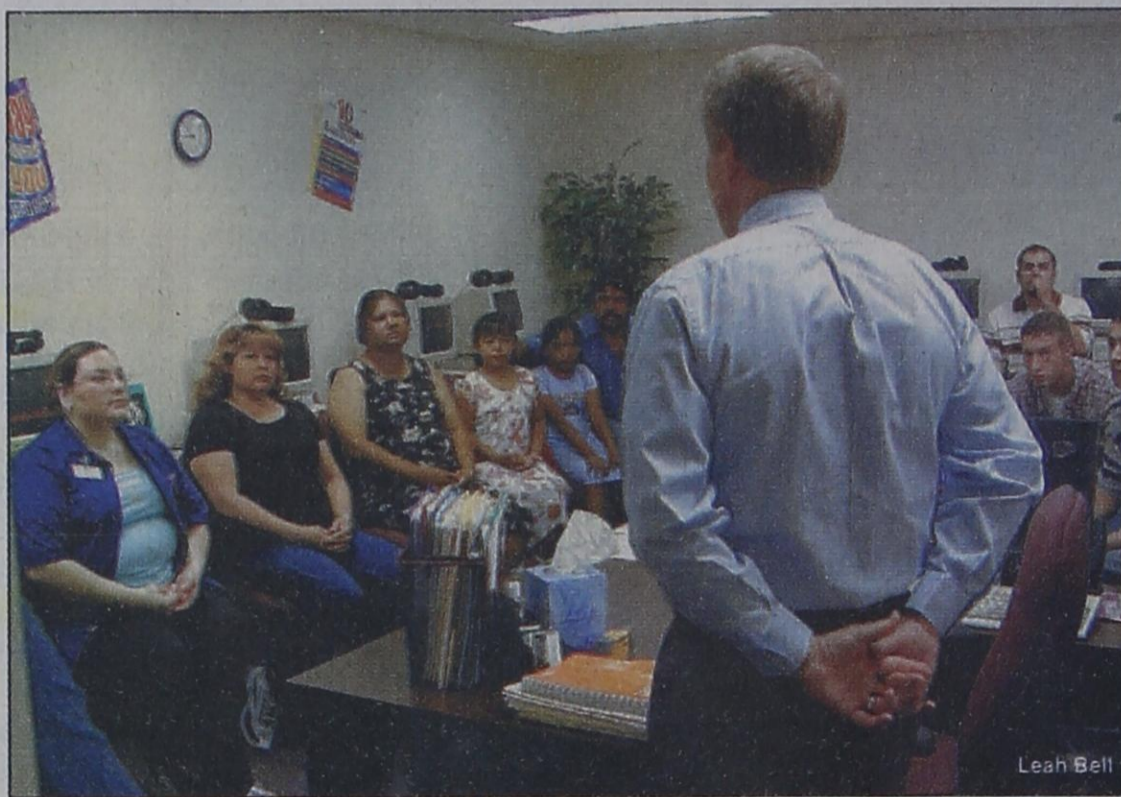
