Myers wins buckle at Junior Rodeo

Garrison Myers, soon to enter the fourth grade, isn't quite ready to go back to school. He's having too much fun rodeoing and "working" at Muleshoe Motor Co.

The Journal caught up with the nine-year-old cowboy answering phones at the dealership this past Tuesday. He's just recently won the Second Annual Trey Bilberry Memorial Scholarship Buckle at the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association (HPJRA) Rodeo in Clovis, an award the young man is proud to have received.

"I'm very proud of it and glad they chose me," said Myers, son of Thurman and Rhonda Myers of Muleshoe. "They gave it to me for sportsmanship."

Myers has been competing since he was about five years old according to his father; but he's been riding horses since he was "about three" according to the buckle winner.

"He's a good competitor, yet, he'll be the first to pat his competitors on the back," said his proud father. "He has fun and that's what it's all about."

Garrison told the *Journal* he enjoys making friends and competing, but he really competes because he likes to ride horses

"Our whole family rides and all three of us kids compete," he said. Garrison has two siblings, Madison, 15, and Jackson, 13. "Dad competes in some team roping events, but not many." T. Myers said he's "proud of all my children." They all compete with the utmost sportsmanship.


Myers competes in barrels, poles, goat tying and the roping event. However, because of his age, next year he'll have to quit competing in barrels and poles and set his sites on winning calf roping competitions.

According to Myers, that's "okay" with him because "roping is fun." He plans to continue rodeoing as he grows up and he'll take his horse "Snazzy" along for the ride. He also participates in stock show events, another hobby he'll "stick with"

Dad is especially proud of him for winning the Trey Bilberry buckle because he used to rodeo with Jeff Bilberry, father of the buckle's namesake.

The award was created in honor of Jeff's son, Trey, who died last year in a horse-riding accident. This award goes to the eight-and-under division who show the most heart and courage. Myers received the award just before turning nine at the end of the season.

"The award isn't necessarily for champions. It's for kids who show sportsmanship toward their competitors and I'm proud that Jeff's family honored Garrison like this," said T. Myers.

Medicine at school: Written requests for those students taking prescription/non-prescription medication must be turned into the school nurse along with the properly labeled bottle. The nurse will give medicines at proper times or give the student permission to take as directed.

A number of missionary children are involved, and more than a few of those kids are my sons' own cousins. My nephew and his wife are some of the permanent missionaries there at Mbale.

I was glad Ian & Danetta finally made it clear that they had in mind for our sons to teach such subjects as English, pre-algebra, history, and Bible. Chris & Stephan are also qualified in other subjects that involve mud, ammunition, an occasional cigar, wrestling, spittin', and minor mischief that I'm not sure I'm all that proud of but that I suspect even missionary kids (boys in particular) would likely be willing to learn.

Really, I think it will be good for Chris & Stephan to put on, at least for a few hours a day, the "hat" of authority figures, even though that hat may look a little cockeyed on their pointed heads.

I also think it will be good for the missionary kids (the students) to get to wrestle with the kids who are "missionaries" (the teachers) on occasion. They don't get many guy teachers over there and very few cousins. Looks like a win-win deal to me.

I don't know what folks in heaven are able to see of the "goings-on" right here on earth, but I've got a feeling my mom and dad are smiling. I've been thinking of them, too, even more than usual lately. Years ago, when they said goodbye at the airport when my oldest brother and his wife, Ian's parents, went to Malawi, Africa, the "goodbye" was for several years. The mission was just being born, a letter might arrive in two weeks but more likely three, and phone calls were so difficult to arrange, so expensive, and so unreliable that one or two calls a year was the best you could expect. The best form of communication was by tape recording. Pretty one-sided and three weeks away. It's never easy to watch your kids leave to head around the world, but Mom & Dad had a much harder job in that regard than Juana & I do. We've got e-mail and every phone line in Uganda has Internet access built in (10 cents per minute-no ISPs). Their European cell phone service is better than the USA's. Amazing!

Yes, two of our sons are going to a "far country." But, sadly, the farthest countries are those that kids can go to in their hearts and attitudes even if they live in the same house with you. Uganda is closer and better.

Yes, I've found myself thinking of that loving father with no name. But I'm thinking much more of the Father who is love and in whose Name we trust.

LDP's in effect on corn, grain sorghum

Cash Markets have fallen to the point where Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's) are in effect on corn and grain sorghum.

Producers are reminded that in order to be eligible for LDP's, you must have beneficial interest in the harvested commodity on the date that LDP benefits are requested. If beneficial interest is lost upon delivery of the commodity, you must complete a CCC - 709 prior to harvest. By completing the CCC - 709, you are eligible for the LDP Rate in effect on the day you deliver or the date you lose beneficial interest in the commodity. Producers must complete a CCC - 633 if the commodity is delivered to a storage warehouse to be stored.

Eligibility Requirements: Certify Crop Acreage; Have beneficial interest in the crop. You must have title, risk and control of the crop. If the crop is delivered to a buyer, you have lost beneficial interest. If the buyer pays you for the crop, even if it hasn't been moved from your farm, you have lost beneficial interest; LDP's require beneficial interest at the time of the LDP request; Actively apply an approved conservation plan; Have a completed and approved payment limitation form on file; File a CCC - 526 - Average Adjusted Gross Income Certification form (AGI).

The Commodity must meet these requirements: Be merchantable for Food or Feed; Be in existence and in a storable condition; Be produced by an eligible producer; Not be substituted or purchased; Be within ac-

ceptable moisture levels. All production evidence submitted including scale tickets must show the following: Producer's name; Crop Year; Type of Commodity; Class, if applicable; Date of sale - if sold; Proof of payment from buyer, if commodity was sold (settlement records or copy of check); Net bushels of corn; Net weight for Grain Sorghum.

Production evidence may be handwritten, but is not acceptable for any type of production evidence submitted by the producer for the producer's own production.



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
