

O. L. Evans, manager of the Spur Poultry Ranche, stated this week that they had enjoyed a good business ever since they started the operations at the Ranche. They have sold practically everything they have produced, and will have but little to carry over.

At present there are probably as many as 1000 chicks ranging from a week old to four weeks old at the Ranche. Mr. Evans stated there were probably 300 fryers now at the Ranche, and they are beauties too. Considering the untold thousands of baby chicks that have been produced by this plant, the above figures represent a very small carry over.

The last hatching for the Summer was taken from the large incubator Tuesday morning. This part of the plant will be closed for July and will be in operation in August just in time to have baby chicks ready to ship September 1st. The Ranche already has an order for 3000 to be shipped the first of September. These go to one party, and does not include the numerous small orders that have come in.

The Spur Poultry Ranche has proved a success, and placed many high grade chickens in the county. 

COMBINATION GIVEN A SEVERE RAP NOW.

Denunciation of the Rockefeller-Fosdick combination was expressed in a resolution adopted last week by the Baptist Bible Union of North America in the closing session of a six-day conention held at Seattle. The Northern Baptist convention expected to be attended by 3,000 delegates from over the United States, convened July 1st., and debated the resolution, which continued throughout the session.

The resolution called upon all Baptists to express their disapproval of the principles of Dr. Fosdick and condemned the action of the trustees of the Park Avenue Baptist Church in New York for calling Dr. Fosdick to the pastorate.




