> WARRANTS REQUIRED IN NARCOTIC HUNTS

Washington, Oct, 12.-Federal agents operating under the Harrison narcotic act, have no right to search residences without a search warrant, except where arrests are actually made, the Supreme Court declared Monday in the appeal of Thomas Agnello and others arrested in Brooklyn,

The case considered a precedent, arose from the arrest of Agnello and and four associates after they had completed a sale of heroin and from search of their residences and a parber shop in Brooklyn, where they had been meeting.

The lower federal courts held that the search without warrants was

"The protection of the fourth amendment extends to all equally, to those justly suspected or accused, as well as to the innocent," the opinion said. "The search of a private dwelling without a warrant is in itself unreasonable and abhorrent to our laws.

"Belief, however well founded that an article sought is concealed in a dwelling house furnishes no justification for a search of a place without a warrant.."

COPELAND DEFENSE MOTION OVERRULED

Waco, Oct. 12.—Efforts on the part, of the defense to secure an instructed verdict of not guilty failed Monday morning in the case of Rev. A. Reilly Copeland, charged with having criminally libeled Miss Adelaide Hague, city health nurse.

After the prosecution rested, the motion was made, only to be overruled by County Judge Jenkins.

An attempt was made, when the first witness for the defense was called, to prove the existence of a conspiracy by the Ku Klux Klan as the basis for the prosecution of Copeland. Judge Jenkins held that an effort might be made to show a conspiracy before the indictment was returned and the State was allowed time to present authorities as to this feature of the case.
