

An abundance of blister bugs were

died. The remainder were put on a
balanced diet, vaccinated against possible infection during their weakened
condition, and most of them recovered.

Pecan oil, described by chemists of the United States Department of Agriculture, as of very mild, agreeable, and characteristic flavor, is one of the latest additions to the long list of products manufactured from what were formerly farm wastes. Fine nut fragments accumulated at the pecan shelling plants. Chemists have made experimental pressings of this waste and determined the properties and composition of the oil. This cill is of excellent quality and can be used for making salad dressings or other edible products. It is necessary to express the oil before the nut waste becomes rancid, otherwise, however, the oil would not be edible.

Discovered in Paris

Discovered in Paris

Paris.—The long-drawn-out polemics and discussions as to whether Benjamin Franklin ever wore a sword at the courts of France and England have been solved by the discovery of the weapon in the private collection of M. Honore Hecquest d'Orval, a descendant of P. J. Cabanis.

It was presented to M. Cabanis by Franklin shortly after the conclusion of the treaty of peace by which Great Britain recognized the independence of the United States of America.

A unique feature of the sword is that it is not similar to those usually regarded as a "courtler's sword's being of fill millitary length with a triangular blade of the finest Sheffeld mottoes and the elaborately chiseled bilt and guard—the gift of Louis XVI—It might have been the sword of an officer.






