| A whole cooked chicken in a tin can is a new thing in the marketing of poultry products that has recently been says he bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture. The birds are inspected for wholesomness before cooking, by bureau representatives operating under a nation-wide inspection service for the quality and condition of dairy and poultry products.
