A TINY CREATURE DRIVES

The "driver ant" is a very small creature, yet it exercises a great deal of influence and creates a great deal of fear maong the larger animals of the jungle. The little creature is found in South Africa, is probably an inch or more in length when full grown, possessing six legs and two antnnae similiar to ants found in America. Yet there is probably more physicial strength and mental determination wrapped up in this little insect than other species of the animal

These ferocious creatures called by natives "bashikonay" terrify the jungle and drive the monster before

them. And the natives, naked in the jungle leads the flight before the marching army of fearful bashikonay. These creature, ferocious ants of huge size compared with other ANTS, but tiny creatures when compared with other jungle animals, march in a regular

army. The cries of birds an d crashing of big animals through the jungle annouce the dreadful armyy is on the march, ready with millions of sharp pincers to tear and devour everything before it.

DuChaillu, who first investigated and described the gorilla, saw more than once an expedition of driver ants, and described those tiny lord of the

jungle: "This ant is very abundant in the whole region I traveled over in Africa, and is the most voracious creature I ever met.

"It is the dread of all living animals from the leopard to the smallest insect. I do not think they build a nest or house of any kind. At any rate they carry nothing away, but eat all their prey on the spot.

It is their habit to march through the jungle in a long regular line- a line about two inches broad, and often several miles in length. All along the line are larger ants, who acts as officers, stand out side the ranks and keep this regular army in order.

"If they come to a place where there is no trees to shelter them from the sun, whose heat they cannot bear. They immediately build under ground tunnels, through which the whole army passes in columns, to the forrest beyond. These tunnels are four or five feet under the ground, and are used only in the heat of thet day or during a storm.

"When they grow hungry, the long file spreads itself through the forest in a front line, and attacks and devours all it overtakes with a fury which is quite irrestible.

"The elephant and the gorilla fly before the attack. The black men run in their line of march is chased.

"They seem to understand, and act upon the tactics of Napoleon, and concentrate with great speed, their heaviest forces on the point of attack. In an icreditable short space of time the mouse, or dog, or leopard, or deer is overwhelmed and killed, eaten and the bare skeleton only remains."

The description of the ants, imitating the tactics of the great Napoleon and concentrating with great speed their heaviest forces on the point of attack, is intensely interesting to human beings.

We know that ants have reached, in proportion to their possibilities, a much higher development than human being. Millions of years before men came on this earth, the insects were here, already organized in communities for defense and attack.

How powerful will men be in the million years ahead of us, when they have learned to unite, stick together, fight together and defend each other, as these little ants do?


Men, of course will not need to fight pungle monsters. Bullets and traps have made wild animals unimportant except to helpless savages.

But what the ants do to jungle animals, men, when they are concenstrated, united and their intelligence fully developed will do to the jungle itself.

As these tiny ants clean out the monsters of the jungle, or devour them, if overtaken, so men with their greater power, harnessing the forces of nature, will clear away the jungles, deserts and swamps. 

But unlike ants, that have learned through their millions of years experience, the armies of men went out to kill other men. And when they came back many nations were weakened, some bankrupt, millions had been killed in the war, other millions killed by disease, and nobody had gained anything except the profiteer.

Many centures ago, the writer of the book of Proverbs said: "Go to the ant, thou sluggard; consider her ways and be wise.'

Possibly the Old Testament writer knew about the ferocious battling ants, and also knew the ants live more peac fully in their village, caring for their young, looking after the queen ant, representing real civilzation on a small

But, instead of imitating the ants' wisdom, men studied the animal only to imitate their ferocity, never learning wisdom from them. They put wild east in the arena to fight against their own human brothers. They set savage animals to fighting each other.

Even in the jungles, where naked savages fly in terror before the ants, the only thought that occured to them was "Why not use them to torture human beings?" And that is eactly what they did Du Chaillu tells you.

If, however, the object of fear should be met the python glides off with all possible speed leaving the booty to be devoured by the ants should they come upon it."

Possibly the ants and bees that now live in harmony on a basis of cooperation were once as foolish as men, fighting and killing each other instead of helping each other.

Man, with all his foolishness and all his intelligence, is a new comer on the earth. Scientist prove that men are only a few thousand years away from the stone age.

Perhaps, when we have lived millions of years longer we shall know enough to help each other, instead of killing each other.

Meanwhile, there is a lesson for prosperous people in the driver ant and his methods.






