Beautiful moments are possible for all. Some of us make it very difficult indeed for beauty to make any headway at all with our faces. We do this chiefy by having wrong thoughts and the wrong attitude toward life. All of the massages, creams and lotions and powders in the world will not do a paritcal of good of our minds do not furnish some spiritual assistance. We may not have been gifted lovely in the way of faces, and then we make the situation practically hopeless by developing minds that are quite the opposite of beauty.

Think beautiful thoughts of hope, joy, love and good cheer, and you cannot miss reaping satisfactory results. One who is depressed and unhappy shows these thoughts and feelings in the lines of the face, in the ex-

ance—a little time apart each day for mental relaxation—these will pay us back a hundred folds in visible beauty that will be imprinted on our faces. This is the first rule of beauty.




