





DICKENS GINNER INSTALLS **NEW MACHINERY**

B. Y. Love, the progressive ginner at Dickens, moved a new 150 horse power Primm Oil Pull Engine from Spur, which he is installing in his gin at Dickens. This is one of the latest model engine and has all the latest improvements on it. The engine complete weighs 38,000 pounds, the fly wheels alone weigh 10,820 pounds.

The crank shaft is eight inches in diameter and is set in a bronze bearing of the highest character. Through its high mechanical efficiency the enne is capable of developing its full pacity of 150 horse power. It is esmated that the new engine will develope only 1-13 of the expense of the old time steam power. The original cost of the engine is nearly \$9,000.

Another great feature that Mr. Love is attaching to his gin plant is a cotton dryer. This is one of the great est improvements of modern times, and is the only one in this part of the country. One of the great needs of the times is an apparatus that will dry cotton before it is ginned. That is the puropse of this new dryer.

When wet cotton is brought to the gin it is first sent through the dryer, which removes the water from it. Then


