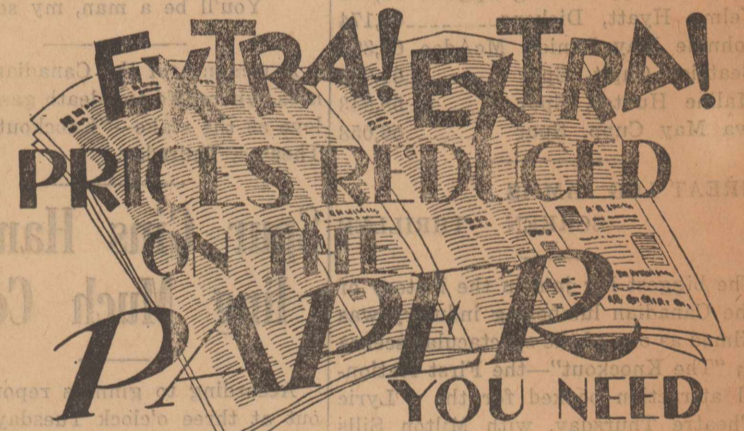

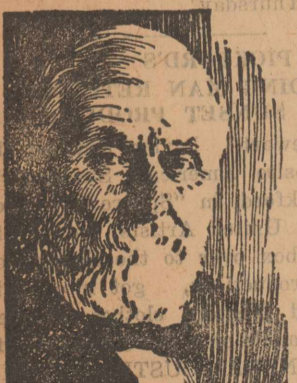

**Believes in Caring For The Babies in Homes**

Pat McNemer, field representative of the Sinclair Petroleum Company was in our city the last of the week looking after his company's interests. Mr. McNemer is one of the few men of our state who takes a special interest in the welfare of the babies of the country. He says: if you start the baby out healthful and strong and look after its younger life, that the future generations will be a more enlightened and cultured people and much of the unnecessary diseases of today will soon be history.

It was a holiday afternoon a year or two ago that Mr. McNemer was strolling through the industrial district of Dallas, his home city, that he was invited to visit Hope Cottage. He accepted and made a thorough inspection of the conditions, purpose and methods of support of that home. In the home he found a great number of babies without parentage. It was the business of this home to secure these babies who were helpless and unfortunate of the manner of their coming into this world, and to try to place them in good homes or take care of them until other arrangements could be made for them.

This home was managed by a lady who was willing to sacrifice her privileges and pleasures for the sake of the children. By skilful interrogations Mr. McNemer found that the only support for the babies was just whatever the public might see fit to give and a meager allowance which was being made by the Catholic Church. He further asked the approximate cost for caring for a baby for a month and placed the amount in the hands of the matron with instructions that he be notified at the end of the next month that he was due another payment. Again, he obtained information that the home was eighty thousand dollars in debt and nothing to pay with.

He went back home and told his wife that he had found and what he had done. His baby girl took the matter up in her Sunday School class and arrangements were made to support another baby. His wife brought the matter before another Sunday School class and another baby received help.

At the time Mr. McNemer was a big official in the Texas Oil Company. He got his bunch together, making the boys a good plain heart to heart talk, asking them to do their duty and to subscribe what they could pay monthly. Then he went to his different salesmen and asked them for their share in the work. As

a result there was a monthly subscription of around \$500. Then he got in touch with some of his lodge brethren and the sum was swelled to over \$900.00. He then went to the various ladies' club organizations and selected some good sensible women, called a meeting and organized the Hope Cottage Association, with the understanding that there should be one man on the Board. They selected the local president of the Texas Oil Company as first Vice-President of the organization and this man happened to be the president of the United Charity Societies of the city.

Mr. McNemer knew there was plenty of money in the treasure of the United Charity Societies but he could not secure a penny of it as he stood. He called for a committee of the Hope Charity Association and heading the procession, marched into a meeting of the United Charity and asked for his organization to be affiliated with them. It carried, and Mr. McNemer and his committee walked out with \$23,000 at their disposal.

Another step was a good boosting talk with the klansmen of Dallas. Mr. McNemer was not a member of the Klan and is not yet, but the Klan had been anxious to help in many ways, and he suggested to the head man of the organization that they put up a building for Hope Cottage. The movement passed the organization and the funds were provided. A new substantial fire-proof building was erected. It was furnished from the funds already provided by the United Charity, and is one of the finest homes in Texas doing a great work for the state.

The Cottage is supported by the

Hope Cottage Association, which is incorporated under the laws of the State. Mr. McNemer and his family still contribute to the work along with the many others, and he says it is one of his greatest pleasures to go to the nice rosy cheek babies in the home kicking up their heels and laughing as the attendants are looking after them. The babies are carefully tested by the best physicians of the city, all laboratory tests, blood tests, and other physical conditions are looked after in a very careful manner.

Many people are going to the home and adopting babies from it. There are some five or six of them throughout West Texas, and many others have been placed in good homes in other parts of the State. Mr. McNemer stated that if there should be a half dozen good citizens come as a result of the home, that it was well worth the time and expenditure that has been used to establish it. "All these babies will grow up sooner or later," he said, "and society can make citizens of them, or they will be little waifs in our state that probably would go off in the wrong direction. God holds us responsible for the future

citizenship of this country." Mr. McNemer does not know that this is going into print and we hope no one will tell him as he is a much larger man than we are. He lives in Dallas, and we trust that our circulation will not reach him at least this time. But we feel that few people know about Hope Cottage and the work it is doing for the State, and it is for this reason that we publish the account of its founding. Love was the great impulse, and charity brought the victory.

### Miss Audrey Emery To Marry Duke

Miss Audrey Emery, youngest daughter of Mrs. Alfred Anson of 5 East Sixty-eighth Street, is to marry the Grand Duke Dmitri of Russia. This was learned here yesterday following cable messages to relatives from France, where Miss Emery and her parents have been spending some time.

One of these messages was sent by Miss Emery to the housekeeper at the Anson town home here who was formerly her nurse. Another was sent to Mrs. Benjamin Moore, her sister, whose home is in Syosset, L. I.

The announcement of the engagement came as a surprise to New York friends of the family, who, it was said, did not even know that Miss Emery and the Grand Duke were acquainted.

Miss Emery is one of the five children of the late John J. Emery of Cincinnati and Mrs. Anson, who married Mr. Anson, a brother of the Earl of Lichfield, four years after Mr. Emery's death.

John Emery, a brother of Miss Emery, who is in her early twenties, was married on Aug. 31 to Mrs. Irene Gibson Post, a daughter of Charles Dana Gibson and a niece of Lady Astor.

Representative for Cyril The Grand Duke Dmitri Paulovitch who has made his home in Paris since the Russian revolution, has been acting as the personal representative of Grand Duke Cyril since Cyril issued a proclamation announcing himself as Cyril I, Emperor of Russia.

He is one of two children of Alexander III's youngest brother, the Grand Duke Paul. He was brought up by his aunt, the widowed Grand Duchess Sergius, sister of the former Czarina, as his mother died soon after his birth. Because of an escapade in his younger days he was banished from Russia for four months just prior to the outbreak of the World War.

With Prince Felix Youssouppoff he is popularly believed to have been responsible for the death of Rasputin, the monk, and as a result was extremely popular with the Russian people who had resented Rasputin's strange influence over the royal family. When a council of prominent exiled Russian noblemen was held in Paris several years ago to decide on who should be considered the logical claimant to the Russian throne should the Bolshevik regime be wiped out, Grand Duke Dmitri was one of those considered for the honor. That council, however, selected the Grand Duke Nicholas.

In connection with the death of Rasputin it was reported that the monk had spoken in a slighting manner of Dmitri's sister and the Grand Duke was determined to avenge her. With his regimental comrade and kinsman, Prince Youssouppoff, the monk was induced to visit a house where the noblemen were concealed.

Then, it was reported, Dmitri offered Rasputin a chance to fight for his life. He proposed a duel where both would have an equal chance. Rasputin, however, it was said, seized the revolver that was handed to him and before the Grand Duke had an opportunity to pick up his own weapon, fired at him. Having aimed his weapon too high, the bullet flew over Dmitri's head and before Rasputin could fire a second shot, he was dead by Prince Youssouppoff.—New York Times.

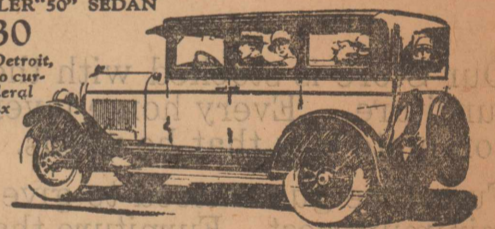

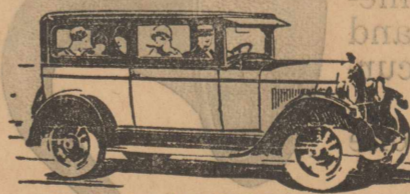
