



After the materials have been cleaned and put into the shape in which they are to be canned, the canning urocedure for the most products consists Into New Home of five steps-scalding, or blanching, cold dipping, packing, processing or sterilizing, and sealing.

1. Select fresh, ripe, firm fruit or vegetables the day picked or gathered, if possible. By so doing, the canned products will be better and of a higher quality.

2. Grade the ripeness, size and quality. Wash thoroughly and prepare, trim, peel, etc.
