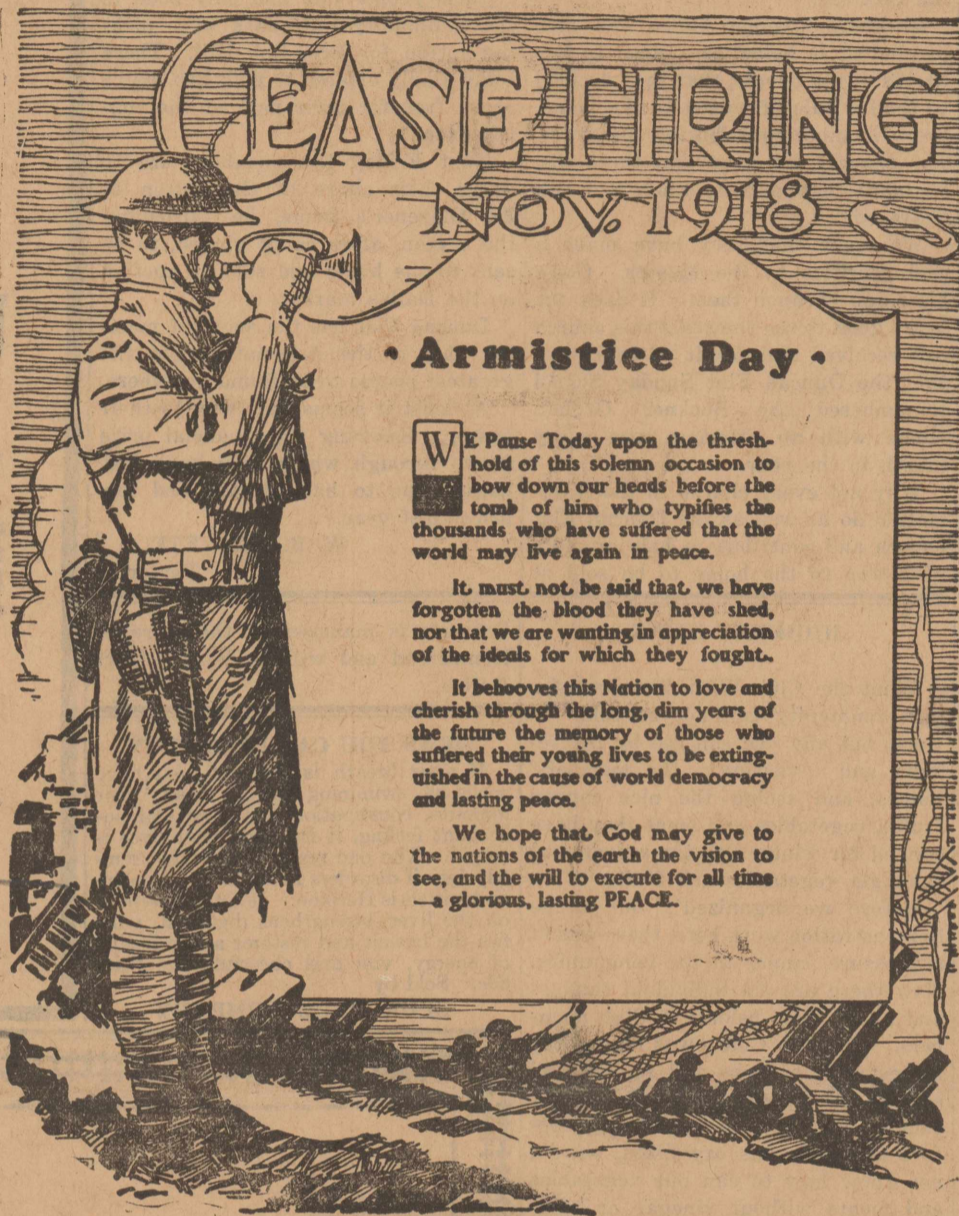

Duncan Flat Man Sends in a Potato That Is Some "Punkin;" Weighs Six Pounds and Ten Ounces; 5 1/2 In. Thru

R. H. Hill, one of the Duncan Flat farmers who believes in diversification, has been experimenting the past year with sweet potatoes. This week he sent one in to the Times office which easily proves his ability as a sweet potato farmer. This particular one had been harvested several days, was thoroughly cured and was ready to be put away for the winter. It was 10 1-4 inches long, and measured 5 1-2 inches through. The long circumference was 26 inches and the short circumference was 17 1-2 inches. After being cured, it weighed six pounds and ten ounces.

Mr. Hill did not make this a particular one of his crop. He had many

in its class, but just happened to get hold of this one which he sent us. We saw a quantity which Mr. Hill had given to his pastor and these would have been the pride of any of our farmers.

The sweet potato is an industry that would pay good profits in Dickens County. About the only thing needed is a few curing plants to put the potatoes in shipping condition. Then the farmer could devote two weeks' time to planting, cultivating, and in harvesting from ten to forty acres. From past experiences they would have more money than when they spend all their time shaking hands with "king cotton."

Duncan Flat Reports One of the Greatest Days in the History fo Their Community

On the first Sunday we had a great day at Duncan Flat. The pastor presented the conquest campaign to the church, and they responded in a nice way, fifty dollars and thirty cents being received.

Buckners Orphan home was also presented, it being so dear to the hearts of the people, that they decided to send a bale of cotton to the home, every member contributing his share. The chances are good that there will be more than a bale, when it is all delivered.

We know that they have made a real sacrifice to the Master. God's blessings be upon them. It does our heart good to see the seals this church has received and for it to be known that the Duncan Flat Sunday School remembered the Buckner Orphan Home with an offering once every month in the year.

Why not every church in the Association do as well as the Duncan Flat church and contribute a bale or more of cotton to the home to be sold at

auction on the Dallas market?

Cannot our Association feed the Buckner orphans for one month? Yes, they can and will if given a proper chance.

Some people who had only been in the community four days were picking cotton for Bro. Rob Hill. These folks gladly offered to pick Bro. Hill's share free for their part of the contribution.

Next Friday the members are to bring their share of the cotton to Ed Glazener's home, he furnishing the wagon, after being ginned, to be sent to the home and sold at auction on the Dallas market.

Duncan Flat has the smallest membership in the Association, but the greatest people to be found anywhere.

At least it seems that way to their pastor. Knowing the financial price stress through which they have just passed due to hail, drouth and low prices last year.

HIGHWAY NEWS

What the Club Work has done for our community can not be told in word, but any one can see by the results and visiting the members' homes, and seeing the nice canned fruits, vegetables and meat they have canned for winter and the seasons we can't get vegetables and fruits.

Before we organized our Home Demonstration work here, there wasn't a pressure canner in the community. Now there are six individual canners and all of them belong to Club members. Also the Club owns one of the largest size canners and sealers and several others say they aim to get canners just as soon as they can. Before the Club was organized, we did not know how to can our vegetables and meats without vinegar or acids of some kind. Now we can them by the Government plan. Our club members can meet at any of the members' homes and can a beef in one day and one beef will can about 100 three-pound cans, which we make in roll roast, plain roast, steak, hash, mince meat, chille and soup stock. All the members that have canned one beef are now planning on canning another when the weather gets cool enough for the animal heat to get out in one night's time.

We have learned not only to can, but have had so many lessons in sewing, embroidery, rug making, hemstitching, bread making, cake making and baking, and painting and all kinds of Christmas gifts. In fact, there are so many things, we can't mention all, but most every charter member is still well pleased with the Club work. Our girls have done some good work. Two of our girls won first and second places on their wool dresses at the Dallas Fair in 1926. Four of the girls completed the girls club work and now are members of the Ladies' Home Demonstration Club.

Our boys have done good work also. Wilber Tree and Ray Walker, both have nice Jersey cows that they raised. Harry Martin has a registered Duroc-Jersey sow that he raised and has realized a good profit. Oscar and J. T. Weaver, Raymond and Elden Powell have hogs and cotton. The cotton has already made over one-half bale per acre and they will get another picking.

Every one seemed to have a good time at the box supper last Friday night. The boxes sold rapidly and they made \$79.65 to buy playground equipment for the school.

J. Vernon Powell has bought a new 1928 model Chevrolet car.

Every one seems to be up with their cotton picking and just waiting for a frost so the last bolls will open.

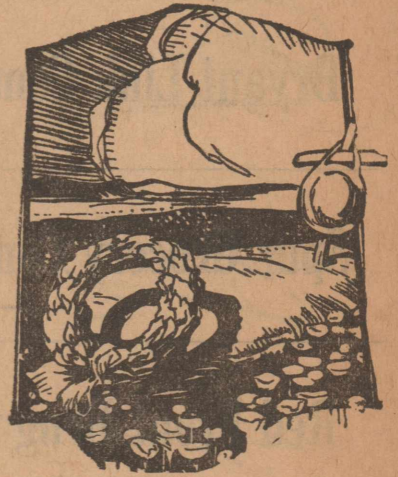



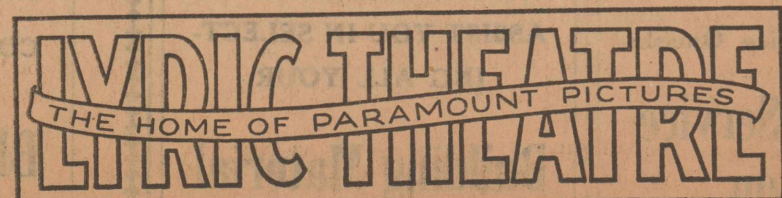
