WAR AND PEACE

It may be that conferences, agreements and treaties for the limitation of armaments, together with various provisions for arbitration, will in time bring about world peace. The value of treaties and agreements, of international conversations and meetings is not to be dismissed with a sneer. Rochester and Syracuse, Sacramento and San Diego do not carry on military warfare as did the cities of the Middle Ages, and the relations of peace which exist in New York and California may ultimately extend to larger areas such as nations, continents and races.

Yet to abolish war in the abstract, as it were, to outlaw it per se, seems somehow to partake of the elusive. We are dealing here with an amazing variety of complicated questions of fact, and it behooves man to be humble of opinion. An example is the idea that if only nations would disarm forthright all would be well. But the historians must answer the question of whether disarmament, or its milder form, unpreparedness, has always prevented wars.

Then, too, it is a much-disputed point whether military or naval power incites to its own use. There is, of course, the saber-rattling, jingoistic type of army or navy officer who needs every now and then to be suppressed. Modern progressive nations do not propose to leave their international policies entirely with professional soldiers. Yet, looking at the subject more broadly, it is a question whether great military power, especially in the hands of autocratic government, has not been more an instrument of aggrandizement than its cause, the willing tool of a deep underlying purpose.

A great scientific organization, when instructing its delegates about to leave for an interracial conference, gave directions that, whatever subjects were taken up by others, its delegates were not to mention the words "war" and "peace". This may shock many good people, but its purpose is full of common sense. What civilized man must do is to dig up the roots of war. To abhor and denounce the culmination of deep-seated differences does not get very far, because the issues have by then become too vague, indefinite and far-reaching. We must go back of the great omnibus calamity of war and clear the soil as far as possible of racial, social, economic and political wrongs. Straight thinking demands that cause and effect must not be confused. The unarmad Canadian border dates from an agreement between this country and Great Britain. But if Canada and the United States had not enjoyed much in common and trusted each other all these many years, the agreement would have been

valueless. Whatever devices or mechanisms are found to be useful in maintaining peace, it will never do to forget that underlying them is the necessity for unremitting toil in clearing away international misunderstandings and injustices.

CHRYSLER CONTINUES FOREIGN TRIUMPHS

Chrysler's long series of impressive triumphs in foreign racing events was carried auspiciously into 1928 by the capture of two Australian records in the month of January, cables received at the company's Detroit headquarters indicate.

As a result of these two victories, all interstate records in both Australia and New Zealand are now held by Chrysler cars.

The latest achievements, according to the cablegrams, consisted of a run of 591 miles from Adelaide to Melbourne in 11 hours and 49 minutes on January 15, and one of 576 miles from Sydney to Melbourne in 10 hours and 42 minutes on January 31.

The Sydney-Melbourne record has been hotly contested between Chrysler and another American car. H. J. Beith, an amateur driver, set a new mark for this run December 22 last by covering the distance in 11 hours and fourteen minutes. His drive was the more remarkable as it was made in a salvaged Chrysler "70" which had been badly damaged in a fire and which Beith bought for eighty pounds from an insurance company and refitted. The car had 37,000 miles already on its speedometer. Beith had no competition on the run, carried no tools except a hammer and a spanner and was without even as much as a spare spark plug as provision against possible accidents.

The record thus spectacularly won was lowered early in January and the Chrysler "70" was sent once more over the course on the last day of the month, again making a fresh time mark, as the cable now received shows. The time on this last dash averaged 53.83 miles an hour.

Chrysler now holds all speed and distance records in Australia, including the interstate runs from Brisbane to Sydney; Melbourne to Sydney; Fremantle to Adelaide; Christchurch to Bluff; and Auckland to Wellington in New Zealand.

Among the other feats which have given its cars high prestige in the Antipodes Chrysler holds the Australian 24 hour record and all speed records up to 1000 miles through the spectacular drive made by William Attwood and A. H. Collier in a "70" two-seater last August over the dry bed of Lake Pukohihi. In this feat the drivers averaged 66.995 miles an hour for the distance of 1607.87 miles.

Happily for us as a nation, most of our great fortunes have been built up by men of restless constructive genius, imaginative men of unusual endowment, so constituted that the fostering of vast enterprises was their natural channel of self-expression. Their desire to make money has been subordinate to the urge to build, to leave behind a chain of monuments of their own handiwork to be tangible and speaking memorials of the builder's ability to conceive and carry out great projects and often to hint at their love for their fellow man.

General approbation was withheld until it became apparent that the substitution of wholesome milk for poisonous milk had saved uncounted thousands of infant lives. Gradually the Straus benefactions expanded until now they constitute a business which absorbs much of its

They crave admiration and esteem, and so they try to buy them instead of earning them.

It would be unjust to hold these self-centered Croesuses up to scorn and loathing. Often they are very good fellows. The stethoscope would reveal warm hearts beating under their waistcoats, and the best-trained ear could hear no murmur of the cash register. Something is unquestionably wrong with them. It may, of course, be sheer meanness; but it is more likely to be lack of imagination, ignorance of what a dollar or a million of them will buy when spent in wise benevolence, or failure to perceive how surely giving blesses him who gives as well as him who receives. When the warm heart of youth grows cold it is because absorption in personal interests has shielded it from distress and want on every hand. Our first-hand knowledge of the human great imaginative philanthropists are able to perceive human needs and to relieve them without coming into close personal contact with them. Our poor little rich men who lack this fine faculty need to come face to face with the sick and starving and the unemployed so that they may behold with their own eyes the conditions which exist about them. Few could harden their hearts to what they would see or resist holding out a helping hand.

The best type of benevolent man thinks little and says less about laying up treasures in heaven. He does what he does because he likes it and because he can get more kick out of life in that way than in any other. His taste may be, and usually is, an acquired taste, but this makes it no less strong. Happy is he who acquires it before he can afford to gratify it. For this is the best guaranty that the desire will become and will remain a preferred creditor.

Communities in which mean or unimaginative rich men outnumber the opposite type deserve a certain amount of sympathy; but in the long run their lot will be happier than that of their poor little millionaires whose lives are slipping away without yielding them the best of the rewards for which they have been grubbing. The loss is theirs and it is irreparable. Deathbed generosity will avail them little.

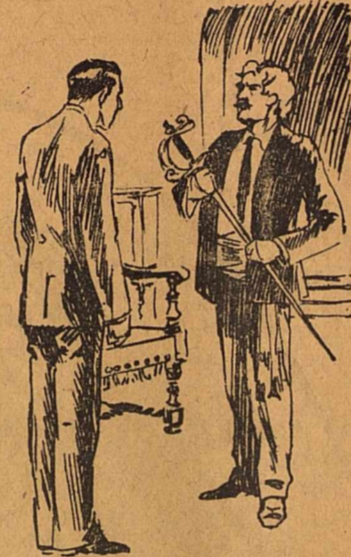

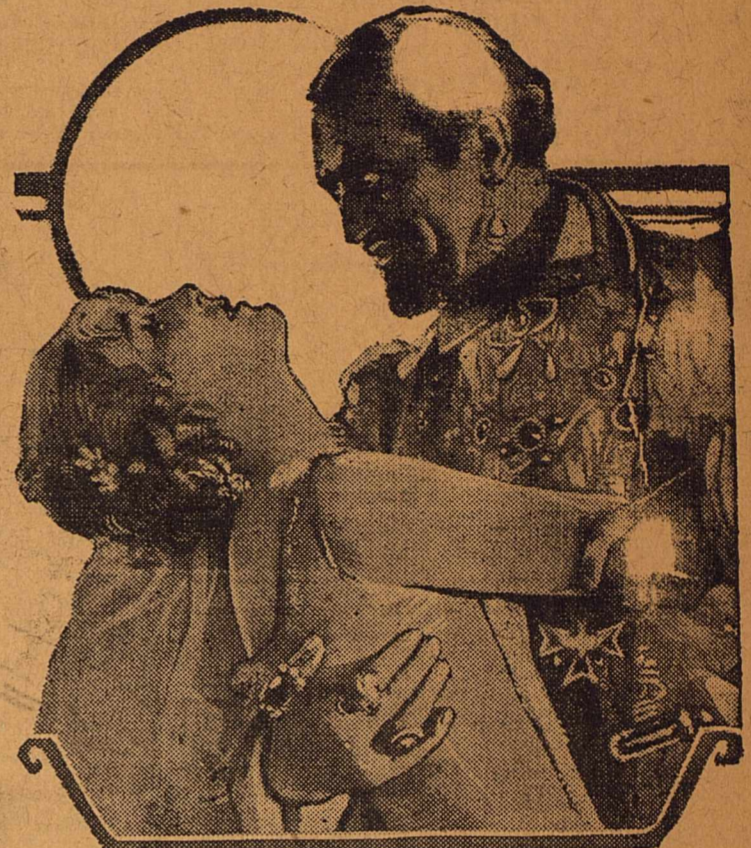

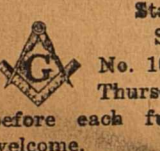

tentary offense to operate any exchange to sell any future contract or to sell or offer to sell any product that does not exist.

TARIFF

I favor such revision of our tariff laws that will prevent discrimination against the producers of raw material

in favor of the manufactured products. Whatever incidental benefits to be derived by the tariff should be enjoyed by the producer as well as the manufacturer.

TAX EXEMPT BONDS

I am in favor of the repeal of the law which permits bonds or securities of any kind to be exempt from taxation. This law was a war measure which should have ended when the war ended. The law is a special privilege to money lenders and puts an additional burden on the masses. Be-

sides, it keeps away the investment of capital that should go into industry and the development of the country.

LABOR-IMMIGRATION

I favor such legislation as will limit the immigration of foreign labor into this country to a very low level. The dignity of American labor cannot be maintained if our working classes are compelled to compete with the pauper labor of foreign countries. America for Americans is my slogan.

I stand for the working classes already here and would have them earn a living and a saving wage.

WORLD PEACE

I stand for any cooperative movements among the nations of the world that will bring about world peace and prevent wars. However, at this time on account of the disturbed condition of foreign countries and the almost daily threat of international war, I am of the opinion that our country should not enter the League of Nations or surrender any of our rights to any foreign tribunal. We should only consider these steps when the nations at interest are in a state of peace with each other.

I favor the encouragement of our Peace Societies for world peace and the continuation of our treaty-making policy heretofore followed by our Democratic Administration.

RAILROADS

Prompt and safe railway service is now a national necessity for the prosperity of the nation. I favor a fair policy toward the railroads of the country.

Like the postal system the railroad system is, by nature of the business, a national question. The business affairs of our country have become so interwoven and closely connected that it has become impractical to have a state regulation with supreme authority over the railroads as it would be to have a system of state post-offices. I am in favor of strict regulation of the railroads through the Interstate Commerce Commission acting under the authority of Congress. I favor a course of regulation that would allow railroads to charge only such rates as will permit them to pay a living wage to their employees, furnish prompt and good service to the public, and leave a fair return on the investment to the stockholders. We need more railroad extensions and railroad building in Texas right now. I shall discuss this question more fully during the campaign.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

I stand for a navy large enough and strong enough to protect the lives and property of Americans and defend the honor and dignity of our flag and all it means, before the world.

A relatively small standing army will be sufficient for land defense, well equipped and highly trained, supported by the National Guards of the several states, the United States Reserve Corps and the continuation of the national defense policy for the Reserve Officers Training Corps and the Civilian Military Training Corps organizations.

I favor a more liberal policy for the administration of the United States Veteran Bureau for veteran relief. Our rich and powerful government should be liberal with its defenders.

Hospitalization of all veterans of all wars, without compensation, is a just policy to be extended America's defenders whether service connected or not. This policy to be inaugurated in addition to the present policy for hospitalization where necessary, of those veterans drawing compensation.

I favor a law extending the time for making application for government insurance.

I favor a law retiring the civilian emergency officers on equal pay and basis with those of the regular army.

NATIONAL HIGHWAYS

I favor the continuance of federal and state aid for a connected system of state and national highways.

PROHIBITION

I am a prohibitionist, I am dry by vote and practice.

When I am elected to the high office of United States Senator I will favor such additional changes in our national liquor laws as will bring about a safe, sane and sure enforcement of the 18th Amendment. The illegal sale of intoxicating liquor is the vice to be prohibited. It can and must be prohibited and the Constitution

search and seizure of liquor to recover possession against the possessor.

will vote for the strongest law that can be written to punish the sale and manufacture for sale of liquors, but the unreasonable invasion of our American homes is another question.

A DEMOCRAT

I am a loyal Democrat. I believe in party government. I will support

the nominee of the party for President, whoever he may be, Al Smith or anybody else. I have faith that the Houston Convention will make a wise choice.

These issues above set out, with possibly others of equal importance, will be fully discussed as the cam-

aign progresses. Guided by the star of Democracy, with due regard to our nation and the rights of the several States, as a native son of Texas, my heart shall ever be with her and her interest and the interest of her people shall be the first and highest object of my endeavor.
