
Robbed Sunday

> The present Grammar School build-High and relieve the congestion in the High School building. The present High School was built to accomodate 100 pupils. This year there were 290 pupils there to receive instruction.


Mr. Cluck states that the grammar schools of Texas have more failures than any other state due to the fact that they do not usually have Junior High schools and promotions are made by grades instead of by subjects. With a Junior High School much more efficient work can be done in the matter of promotions.
