With regard to the future possibility of State Highway No. 18 missing east side of Duck Creek, I will say fit where ever possible and when ever possible the important towns along the routing of Highways. Personally I do not believe that the Department will sponsor such a change as rerouting State Highway No. 18, east of Duck Creek and thereby entirely missing the town of Spur. Personally my recommendation would be that Spur remain indefinitely on the routing of State Highway No. 18, and so

LUBBOCK, Texas, July 17 .- Saturday, August 25, has been set as the date for the 7th annual Traveling Men's Jubilee here at Lubbock and the word is going out over the Southwest that Lubbock is again getting her house in order to entertain the "Knights of the Grip'.

Seven years ago a few civic leaders of Lubbock joined the little hand full of peddlers, who were calling Lubbock home at the time and staged the first peddlers' jubilee ever held in West Texas.

The annual stag parties have grown in popularity with the years, with Lubbock and with the increase in the number of salesmen making Lubbock headquarters and making this place on their routes.

Along with the first party, sprang up a mystic organization of peddlers under the name of R. O. R. E. This fraternity has lived down through the seven years and is gaining new members each year. All new members are initiated into the society each year and this year, those in charge of affairs have announced that some new tricks will be worked out for the present membership and that all new peddlers will be given fun aplenty.
