#### BOGUS INDUSTRIES

A certain group of promoters offered for sale stock in a proposed woolen mill, relates W. R. Morehouse of the Public Relations Commission, American Bankers Association. In order to sell the stock they resorted to the use of misrepresentation and false claims. After renting space on the ground floor of an office building fronting on a busy street, they began their campaign. Orally and by printed advertisements extravagant claims were made for the proposed corpora tion which were grossly false.

It was claimed that the promotion had the support of the Chamber of Commerce, but it did not have any such indorsement. It was claimed that the corporation had a signed con tract for the sale of millions of dollars worth of its products-orders enough to keep the mills running day and night for many years and accordingly to insure its success, but all that it had was valueless fake agreement.

It was claimed by two of the principal promoters that they had had many years of experience in the manufacture of woolens-in fact had organized and financed a woolen mill which is the largest in the United States. The facts were that these two promoters had not been connected with any mills for more than twenty years and they had attempted at different times to promote mills, all of which had failed.


