What's Doing
In West Texas

Carbon saw the installation of a cream route on April 22. This is the result of co-operation of the community club with farmers. O. Stone and County Agent Patterson made a canvass of the territory south and west of Carbon and reported at a meeting of the club presided over by S. P. Rumph that conditions were favorable.

Rochester lays claim to being the smallest town in the world with talking pictures. Greenwald, owner of the Rochester Theatre, says that the newly installed machinery will make it possible to feature all the latest vitaphone pictures. All talking pictures will be shown the first three nights of the week.

Sweetwater's band will be in charge of George H. Winter after May 1st. Winter has a record of 24 years in band experience in university and industrial organizations. He will conduct classes in band and orchestra instruments at his Municipal Building offices.

Munday will keep several hundred dollars at home since the establishing of a modern laundry there by Miss Jewel McKee of Knox City. The capacity of the plant will be increased as fast as the patronage justifies. The plant is equipped with several washing machines and a drying closet.

Winters will hold an annual "Living at Home Fair" beginning with June 20, 21 and 22 of this year. Exhibits by communities and individuals, 4-H Clubs, vocational agricultural judging contests, short courses and field day, a "Live at Home" banquet and the opening of the airport will be featured.

Stephenville will start work on the laying of 70,000 square yards of brick pavement soon. The contract went to the Thurber Brick Company, whose price on concrete was \$2.01 for six inch thickness reinforced with 40 pound steel. The paving will amount to between six and ten miles.

Junction's beautiful lawns this summer will be inspired partly by the contest being sponsored by the Parent-Teachers Association and other civic organizations. Kimble Courts is one of the models, and the work there is attracting the attention of all interested in landscape work.

Lubbock men are at work tearing

down a two story structure to make way for the twelve story Hilton Hotel for which the permit for construction was taken out recently and was in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

CORRECTION: Levelland's latest scholastic census showed a tabulation of 187 school children between the ages of 7 and 18 years, instead of 206 as given out previously. This is an increase of about thirty-three percent and indicates that the county has a population of more than 12,600 at this time.

Turkey is slated over the announcement of a \$30,000 sanitarium to be built at once. An unlimited supply of water has recently been piped into the town, railroad surveyors have laid out a north and south railroad route, two buildings of brick are under construction and plans for others are being made.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is sending an invitation signed by Governor Dan Moody of Texas, Governor Dillon of New Mexico and Governor Phillips of Arizona to President Hoover, asking that he attend the eleventh annual convention and the commemoration of the Gladsden Purchase at El Paso.

The April issue of West Texas Today, official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will be in the mails this week. The issue was originally intended to be the Convention Number, but was not on account of the postponement of the dates for the regional organization meet.

J. M. (Mack) Bell of the Longview section was a caller at The Journal office Monday. Mr. Bell stated that conditions in his community were excellent and that some of the farmers were planting their crops.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a Majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least, seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appointing of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction, under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof shall issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the

returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State. Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

Washington.—A bill to improve rural life in southern states was introduced recently by Senator Simmons, Democrat, North Carolina.

The bill would authorize the secretary of the interior to create one organized rural community in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas, and to acquire land for 200 farms in order to demonstrate planned settlement and rural development.

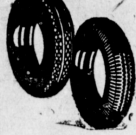

STUNT PILOT IS BLAMED IN CRASH OF BIG AIR LINER

San Diego, Calif.—Lieut. Howard Keefe, army pilot, was blamed by the San Diego board of air control for the mid-air collision of his army pursuit plane and an air liner that cost six lives including his own, last week.

A statement by J. Allison Moore, president of the board issued after the examination said that Keefe had been speeding and otherwise violating the air traffic rules.

The tragedy, the second of its kind in San Diego in three days and the most disastrous in the history of the city, occurred shortly after the air liner, owned by the Mojave Air Lines, Inc., and carrying five passengers, took off for Phoenix, Ariz. Ground observers said Lieut. Keefe, who was following the air liner in his swift pursuit plane, evidently misjudged the distance and crashed into a wing of the big plane.

ICE PRELIMINARIES FOR OIL TEST NEAR MORTON COMPLETE

All preliminaries incident to the securing of a deep oil test on the Slaughter Block, about fifteen miles southwest of town, according to the terms of a drilling contract entered into several weeks ago by McElrath & Suggitt, contractors, and the Slaughter interests combined with the owner of the farms in that vicinity, were completed last week.

Approximately forty-eight farmers living in that vicinity were paid an average of about \$1.50 per acre for a lease on their lands, and while some held larger tracts of land than others, the amount received will average about \$240 per man. These amounts were paid last week and will be a material aid in bridging the crop seasons this year.

The drilling activities will begin not later than July of this year and is to continue until a depth of 4,500 feet is attained unless oil in commercial quantities is found at a less depth. A steel rig will be erected and the drilling done with rotary machinery until the lime formation is encountered, after which a change will be made to standard tools.

The geological reports on this location are said to be exceedingly favorable, and the price paid for the leases would indicate a confidence on the part of the oil companies seldom shown in wildcat territory.—Hockley County Herald, Levelland.

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ICE JAM SMASHED BY TERRIFIC HEAT

Using the thermite process which he perfected for clearing away ice jams and destroying huge icebergs, Dr. Howard T. Barnes, an engineer at McGill University, Montreal, Canada, recently burned hundreds of thousands of tons of ice out of the St. Lawrence River.

This method makes use of the intense heat produced by firing a mixture of fine aluminum filings and iron oxide. Not in itself an explosive, thermite, when set off with a time fuse, quickly develops terrific heat, reaching a maximum of 5,000 degrees Fahrenheit. This first causes the ice to crack and then to explode.

There is a story told of a farmer up in the Panhandle who last fall took a load of wheat into town and sold it at an unusually good price. Thought he, it will surprise my wife. So he bought a suit of clothes, a hat, and a pair of shoes, and put them under the seat of his wagon. When he got home he stepped on a lonely road near the river, took off his old clothes and threw them into the water. Then he looked under the seat for his outfit. It was gone! What to do? No clothes and four miles from home. Finally getting back on the wagon, he said, "Giddap mules, we'll surprise her anyhow."

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

MISSISSIPPI RIVER THREATENS THOUSANDS OF HOMES

Quincy, Ill.—The Mississippi River is on the rampage again. Possibility of rain in the watersheds north of here held the greatest potential danger today for nearby Illinois, Iowa and Missouri lowlands, after prospects of a decline in the Mississippi river yesterday had brought hope that the levees might withstand the highest waters in 78 years.

A rise of another foot here would probably send the river through or over all dikes in this vicinity. South Quincy faced its most serious situation since the high water began in March. Workmen have been kept busy day and night repairing holes in the dikes. Over a million dollars worth of homes and improved farms, it is estimated are in the threatened district. Guards are kept constantly on duty.

The present flood is the most menacing that this section has seen in 75 years. Not since 1851, when the great flood of that year sent the river to 22 1/2 feet, has the level risen so high or remained so long.

In Arkansas, more than 5,000 persons in Phillips and Desha counties were homeless and at least 14,000 acres of rich farming lands under water as a result of a break in the Laconia Circle levee and high water around the main Mississippi river levee at Knowlton's Landing.

High water from the White river forced a gap in the levee more than 200 feet wide.

In West Texas**

Carbon saw the installation of a cream route on April 22. This is the result of co-operation of the community club with farmers. O. Stone and County Agent Patterson made a canvass of the territory south and west of Carbon and reported at a meeting of the club presided over by S. P. Rumph that conditions were favorable.

Rochester lays claim to being the smallest town in the world with talking pictures. Greenwade, owner of the Rochester Theatre, says that the newly installed machinery will make it possible to feature all the latest viaphone pictures. All talking pictures will be shown the first three nights of the week.

Sweetwater's band will be in charge of George H. Winter after May 1st. Winter has a record of 24 years in band experience in university and industrial organizations. He will conduct classes in band and orchestra instruments at his Municipal Building offices.

Munday will keep several hundred dollars at home since the establishing of a modern laundry there by Miss Jewel McKee of Knox City. The capacity of the plant will be increased as fast as the patronage justifies. The plant is equipped with several washing machines and a drying closet.

Winters will hold an annual "Living at Home" beginning with June 20, 21 and 22 of this year. Exhibits by communities and individuals, 4-H Clubs, vocational agricultural judging contests, short courses and field day, a "Live at Home" banquet and the opening of the airport will be featured.

CORRECTION: Levelland's latest scholastic census showed a tabulation of 337 school children between the ages of 7 and 18 years, instead of 206 as given out previously. This is an increase of about thirty-three percent and indicates that the county has a population of more than 12,000 at this time.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court—

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by Majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in which the Courts of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," if it appears from the

returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

The bill would authorize the secretary of the interior to create one organized rural community in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas, and to acquire land for 200 farms in order to demonstrate planned settlement and rural development.
