"I started to terracing my land three years ago. It is sandy and was washing away altho it had only been in cultivation for four years. You sure can tell the difference in the land too. It plows so different and stuff grows off so much better and makes more stalk. I have my terraces running on a level and I would not take for them.'

That is what Sam thinks about terracing. He is spending two days with me learning to run lines with a level. He still has some terracing to do. And that is real head work too. Never try to terrace all of your place in one year. Put all your rows on a water level the first year and then terrace all you can and make a good job of it. Then next year start where you left off and finish all you can that year. It usual ly takes a fellow two or three years finish his terraces,

And about plowing over terraces That is all bosh! I have been watchng this terracing game for seven years in this section of Texas and I ret have to see my first man who nade a success of terraces which he plowed over. It just does not work. What you want is every row on a water level so that when you wake up after a rain every row in the field is standing full of water. Take a trip out to the Experiment Station at Spur and talk to Mr. Dickson. See the great increase in yields he has made by running his rows on a water level over those with only three inches fall to a hundred feet!

"Talking about plowing over 'em they just do not work that way. I have tried it for two years and they are a joke. Just do not work. I'm running my lines over this year and building all my terraces over and every row will be with the terraces." That is what a man says who has tried plowing over them, and he ought to know. He spent two days with me and knows a level from start

Cow Peas in the Maize Up in Duncan Flat on Bud Smiley's place I found Bud Smiley has his maize planted two and skipped one with cow peas in the third row. He says it is his second year on sandy land and that it is good for his land. Cotton after the peas grew off better and seemed to fruit heavier than on other land. He plants whipporwill peas, a red pea and a black pea. The black pea seems to be best. This is a good practice for soils that are sandy natured in this section. You make just as much maize on two

The Government experts have taken the trouble to find out that every year we lose twenty times as much plant food out of the soil to erosion as we lose to crops producted and severed from the soil.
