The visitors were then conducted to the feeding pen of the sheep. These are divided into about nine divisions. Mr. Flint stated that all lots were being fed ground milo heads and cotton seed meal in the same proportion. Ther, in adition to this each lot had a separate feed used. In lot No. 1, the sheep were being fed alfalfa hay; lot No. 2, red top cane; lot No. 3, feterita; lot No. 4, kaffir; lot No. 5, hegari; lot No. 6, milo; lot No. 7, milo No. 9, red top cane and lime.

The results being obtained from the above described experiments was very peculiar. It was found that lot No. 7, where milo and lime were added to the base ration is where the greatest gain is being made. Lot No. 9. where red top cane and lime is being used was making the second best record. 



can be disposed of." Charts Are Used A somewhat technical talk on water and soil losses through washing, was made by R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the Spur sub-experiment station. By means of charts. Mr. Dickson explained the relation of land slope, crops, and physical condition of soils to the loss of moisture and natural fertility. Realizing that conservation of moisture and soil is of great importance in retaining the natural fertility of the soil, the Spur sub-station has been conducting an elaborate series of experiments for the past three years to determine now the moisture and soil may be saved. Considerable data on rainfall, and its relation to soil losses and crop yields, was given by Mr. Dickson. The Spur sub-station, by the way, has done more work in soil and moisture research than any other research agency in the world. Colonel C. S. Holland of Houston, cold of the enormous resources of Texas, and declared that "it is time the citizenship of this state awakened to the fact that we are living by means of agriculture." In Brownwood the 'majority of the farmers sell their cream. Most of the farmers living close to town bring their cream in to the creamery built last march at a cost of approximatey \$75,000.00. Other farmers sell the whole milk.

An ice plant was built in connection with the creamery and the men who make the milk routes gathering the cream deliver ice at the same time. The creamery makes ice cream, pasteurized milk and Bulgarian buttermilk

The number of cows around Brownwood totals from one to one hundred on each farm, with the owners of the largest herds suplying the whole milk thirty to forty bulls in circles in the county keep the standard of stock graded high.





The development of the dairy industry in Spur is shown by the fact that a census to determine the numper of dairy cattle in Dickens county last spring found an average of four cows to every farm. Since that time the establishment of a cream factory which makes it possible for the farners to market their cream either sweet or sour has increased the interest. The cream plant makes about 2,000 pounds of butter from sweet cream per week at present.


There are some \$10,000.00 worth of dairy cattle in the Spur trade territory. Thirteen head of jerseys, which breed seems to be most popular were purchased at the State Fair Sale n Dallas in October. The interest in the industry is rapidly becoming more than just a side issue with farmers in the territory, and they are studying the feeding and care of the stock, and other problems relative to dairying. As there are no cream routes out of Spur the farmers have agreed among themselves to take weekly turns delivering the dairy products in their respective communities.

At Tulia 60 dairy farmers are endeavoring to build up line bred herds. Several years ago the Tulia Chamber of Commerce and the First National Bank purchased ten bulls at the price of \$300.00 per head. They were purchased at a price that was very low on account of the lack of demand for Jerseys at that time, and were from world famous sires, which, in the opin ion of Tulia authorities, could not be duplicated today for \$1,000 per head. During the year 1922 dairy products barely exceeded \$100,00. To-

day the cream checks alone average better than \$1000. per day, each day of the year. The cream checks handled through one bank in Tulia exceed \$20,000 monthly.

One hundred and twelve herds are on the accredited plan with the United States Department of Agriculture, which fosters pride in stock, and encourages building of more dairy barns with beter equipment.




