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SOME THINGS LEARNED AT

The next subject was that of ratalways thought that the rat was one of the necessary evils with which we are forced to contend, but after hearing the lecture on this subject and having models of rat proof barn's shown us and having explained to us how simple and economical it is to rid of the rats around our barns, we became convinced that it was the height of folly and extravagance for us to continue to feed and maintain a large number of rats. In a brief way I wish to outline this method of ratproofing barns, which is as follows; First, have the floor of the barn some fourteen to eighteen inches above the ground, this pievents the rats from standing on the ground and eating directly through the floor. It also eliminates their burrowing and nesting under the floor to a great extent. Next if the barn is to be built new, as soon as the floor joists are put down put a strip tin about ten inches wide around the outer edges of the barn on top of the floor joists and over the center sills, then nail the flooring planks down over this tin; with the floor as high above the only place a rat might get in is to ground as recommended above the stand on the sills and eat through the floor and with the tin under the flooring planks and extending out a few inches beyond the sills the rat can stand on the sills but cannot eat through the tin. If the barn has already been built the strip of tin is nailed on top of the floor and on the floor over the center sill, in this case the rat can stand on the sill and eat through the flooring but as soon as he has done so he strikes the tin and is stopped; if the barn has a shed to one side that is supported by posts the rats might climb the posts and come into the barn from above, so, in this case a strip of tin about a foot wide is nailed around each post some two or three feet above the ground which will prevent the rats from climbing the posts, the total cost for rat proofing a fairly large barn is only about \$15 which is far less than the average farmer loses from rats each year. The extension department of A. & M. College estimates that the annual loss in feed from rats is \$50,000,000.00 which amount can be saved by an expenditure of a far
