Dr. Barrier, who specialzes in correcting deformed feet and limbs had been called to take care of a case in Afton country. He had rigistered at the Central Hotel about one week before this time and had spent the intervening days in Afton community, and came back to Spur Friday afternoon.

He stated to friends Sunday that he had been suffering a number of years from an acute indigestion trouble which he had not been able to analyze, and that he had almost died of this condition the last two or three attacks, also he stated that two of his brothers had died of similar attacks. Should Not the Citizens of Spur Have Been Consulted

In all fairness should not the citizens of Spur have been consulted before a contract was entered into with an engine company entailing an enormous investment and which would increase the liabilities of the City?

Why did the City of Spur enter into an agreement to build an electric light plant and seek to run the West Texas Utilities Company out of the City through a program of Ordinance and Exclusive Contracts?

The agitation for a so-called municipal plant followed closely upon the visit of the engine company's representatives to Spur, and other towns in this section. Two citizens of Spur were exceedingly active in a campaign to embitter our customers against this company. Their battle cry was "the utility company's rates are too high."

Frankly, do you think this was the reason?

The city of Spur NEVER ASKED US TO REDUCE OUR RATES. The citizens were never advised that the rates would be lowered, although the City officials were aware of this fact. In the last two years we have made substantial reductions of our rates in Spur and towns of similar size on our properties. OTHER REDUCTIONS WILL BE MADE THIS SPRING.

Recently some one, zealous for the promotion of the so-called city plant, broadcast an advertisement purporting to show the successful operation of a municipal plant in the state of Louisiana. But the advertisement FAILED to MENTION THE RATES IN THAT TOWN. DO YOU KNOW WHAT RATE THE PEOPLE OF LAKE PROVIDENCE, LA., ARE PAYING FOR ELECTRICITY?

AND WHO PAID FOR THAT AD-VERTISEMENT?

Is it the policy of Spur to drive out the larger industries or to attract them?

Would you drive from your city an industry that is one of the largest tax-payers in Spur?

However, you do not have to go to Louisiana to find municipal plants with higher rates than ours in Spur. In this section of the state of Texas, two towns with over twice the number of electric consumers in the city of Spur have considerably higher rates than Spur.

Do you think an isolated plant, as that planned by your City officials would attract industries to your city?

Could such a plant pull the load required by the industries?

It would seem that these are some of the things your city officials should have consulted with you upon before attempting to binding you to support an electric plant of an engine company.

Now that the contracts, many of the citizens of Spur signed have been declared invalid by the Federal Court, a boycott campaign is being whispered around town.

Several merchants and business men of Spur have informed our representatives that although the Court had held the contracts invalid, threats are being made that there will be an attempt to injure their business if they did not support the municipal plant and abide by their exclusive contracts.
