## LARGE CROWD EXPECTED IN MULESHOE SATURDAY FOR TRADES DAY EVENT

Varied Features in Series of Saturday Events to Be Staged by the Merchants Luncheon Club.

Saturday, May 4th, will start the ball to rolling in Muleshoe's big Trades Day event. According to the sheriff's office, Shannon had been drinking and had apparently become despondent during the afternoon, when he secured a pistol and threatened to end his life. Mrs. Shannon attempted to take the pistol from him and during the ensuing struggle the weapon was discharged.

The Shannons, who have lived in Texico-Farwell for several years, recently moved into a neighborhood near the court house, and when the shot was heard, neighbors who were not acquainted with the family, hurriedly called the officers, and the rumor spread "that someone had been murdered."

**LOOK NOW FOR INFERTILE EGG MARKETS**

College Station.—It is wise for poultry raisers to begin now to look for markets that will pay a premium for infertile eggs, for with the coming of warm weather next month farm eggs will likely be discriminated against in price because of the wide prevalence of fertile eggs. Producers who follow the good management method of selling off most of the roosters now and penning the remainder will be well repaid, provided they make arrangements to dispose of fresh infertile eggs for extra prices. It is usually possible to do this, either individually or through egg circles or associations, for the public demands good eggs and is willing to pay extra to get them.

In suspending such a course of action, E. N. Holmgren, Poultry Specialist in the Extension Service of A. & M. College, calls attention to the great increase in recent years of co-operative selling of fresh, infertile eggs in Texas. Last year alone groups of farmers and farm women in more than 100 counties sold eggs for premiums ranging from two cents to seven cents per dozen. In most cases local merchants handled these quantities on a small margin or bought them outright for re-sale.

"Some poultry success," says Mr. Holmgren, "depends on keeping up production and getting premiums on infertile eggs." With the coming of warm weather broodiness increases and production falls off unless something is done about it. Put the broody hens into coops in order to break up broodiness and maintain high production so necessary to profits."

**THIEF RETURNS MONEY STOLEN 20 YEARS AGO**

Buffton, Ind.—Fred Carhall, living south of here, is almost willing to believe in Santa Claus and fairy tales after receiving \$25 in an anonymous letter. Nearly twenty years ago while attending a basketball game here, Carhall's pocket was picked, \$15 being taken.

He has just received the following letter, returning the stolen money with interest:

"Please accept this \$25 for the \$15 with interest that I found once. Am sorry that I did it. Please forgive me. I realize that if everything is not made right here, it will be too late over there."

Miami has three study clubs, "Home Progress," "Study Club" and "Child's Study Club," which, with the Lion's Club and the Church Federation, are expecting to put over many needed improvements in Miami this year. It is their desire to make Miami a town noted for its beauty and attractiveness, and for its moral and religious attitudes.

**WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS**

Shipment of marble from the Jordan Marble Mountain, about 28 miles southwest of Alpine, has begun. Two new engines, of 80 and 120 horse power capacity, with new saws, polishing machinery and other equipment, have been installed. The lack of an adequate supply of water which was a handicap has been overcome with a new well and a 100,000 gallon reservoir.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be represented at the Lonestar Chamber of Commerce annual banquet to be held on May 16, by a staff member who will be seated at the Distinguished Guest table, according to Lucius M. Stephens, secretary.

Hobbs, N. M., has organized a Chamber of Commerce with forty charter members, business men, merchants and others, including Alex Reeves, who wrote the WTCC for constitution and by-laws. A delegation was sent to the South Plains district meeting in which Hobbs is located.

Vernon, the home of A. M. Bourland, President of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has recently completed its own membership drive, and turned in a hundred percent increase in memberships in the regional organization.

Rowena, where the first building was erected in 1900, now has fifty religious, educational, business and amusement establishments. The town has a first class telephone system, electric lights, natural gas, a live Chamber of Commerce, progressive citizens and prosperous business men.

Memphis' building program is expected to set a new high record this year. Homes of both frame and permanent construction, business houses and additions to other business houses, including basements, have been finished lately.

Perryton's fire record was one of two in Texas to win national honors. Perryton won second place in Class 5, made up of towns under 20,000 population. El Paso was placed fifth in Class 2 of towns under 500,000 and over 100,000 population. Only 57 cities and towns in the entire United States won honorable mention.

Grading and graveling is almost complete on the two mile stretch of the road between the Electra-Archer paving and the Iowa Park road. The new road will give a direct outlet from Electra to the oil field and irrigated valley communities, shortening the route with an all-weather road.

Work has started on a white way lighting system for Tahoka's business section. By reducing the city water pumping rates approximately 30 percent the white way will be practically no expense to the city. The West Texas Utilities Company will bear the expense of installation.

Construction has started on Hamlin's large lake, and the site for the big iron reservoir has been cleared. Digging of the ditch and laying of the main to town is under way. This lake will hold sufficient water to furnish a city of 25,000 people, and supply Hamlin three years, if necessary, without rain.

More than \$35,000 is being spent on changes and additions to the telephone system of the Pecos-Northwestern Telephone Company. Changing over to the common battery system is expected to be complete by May 1. Pecos has one of the four transcontinental repeater stations in Texas.

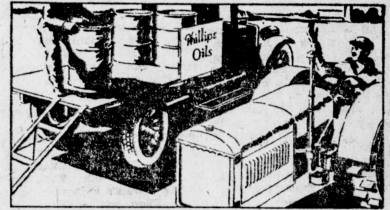

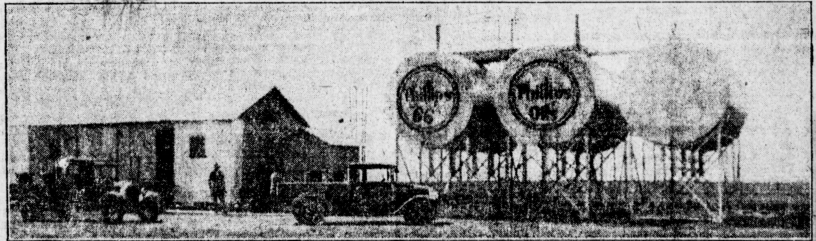

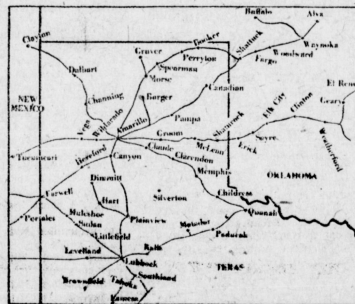

California, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania were ahead of Texas. Texas had one taxpayer on more than \$5,000,000 net income.

Texas produces more sheep and goats and more wool and mohair than any other state in the union.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters and otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a Majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, and shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavits or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bonds in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

The citizens want Tack and Mr. Wormfoot to explain this tangle in the program, as somebody has passed himself as E. R. Tack and imposed upon the hospitality of the homefolks.

True, the wind has been rather disagreeable, but when we read each day about the tornadoes and cyclones in the East, with the many lives lost and thousands of dollars damage done to property, we should be thankful. So far we have not suffered.

**Pioneer Oak Is Birthplace Of The Santa Fe Trail**

Council Grove, Kansas.—Among the legion of monuments that enshrine the glamorous past of this old western outpost, an ancient oak tree, warped and gnarled, is the holy of holies. Just over a century ago its leafy boughs lent shelter from a broiling midsummer sun to a little group of government emissaries, met in its shade to barter with the Osage chieftains for a peaceful way to the New Spain of the Southwest.

This was the birthplace of the Santa Fe Trail. A pipe was passed around the circle and red men and white pledged friendship. To the Indians, the federal commissioners gave \$500, and in return the Great and Little Osages promised to lead safe passage through their domain for the white traders and adventurers following the trail to New Mexico.

The pledge was never broken. The treaty was signed August 10, 1825, and as the emissaries turned back to carry their report to President John Quincy Adams, one blazed on the oak the legend, "Council Grove"—the name that was given the town founded here on the banks of the Neosho in 1847. The folk of Council Grove like to tell their neighbors of the old Kaw mission, where Vice President Curtis went to school and whence he fled when the marauding Cheyennes raided the Kaw reservation in 1869, of the old hermit's cave; of Custer elm; of the unknown Indian's grave, and the fabled burial place of Friar Juan de Padilla, America's first Christian martyr.

But the treaty oak is their especial pride.

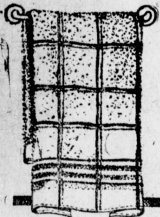

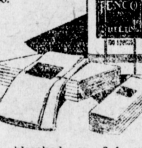

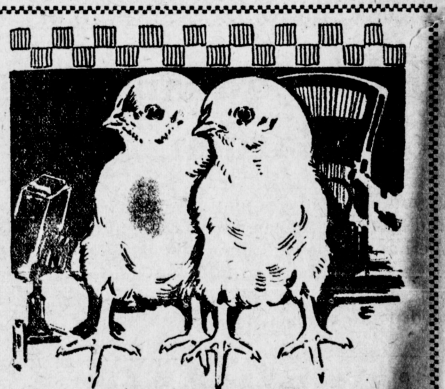

College Station.—Using the slogan, "You can come out on top if you take the proper steps," county agents throughout East Texas have organized the most comprehensive series of cotton and corn demonstrations yet attempted in that section. More than 50 farmer demonstrators in 30 counties have thus far been fitted up by agents to undertake this year to grow at least five acres of these two staple crops by the best approved methods as outlined by E. A. Miller, Agronomist in the Extension Service. The object of the work is to show the way to more dollars per acre from cotton and corn, and to establish enough of such demonstrations that neighboring farmers may watch the procedure and judge the results for themselves.

There are twelve steps leading to more dollars per acre as outlined by Mr. Miller, and as E. R. Carpenter, county agent in Gregg county, is telling his farmers: "The lift is not working; take the steps." The steps consist of: 1. Terrace the land if it is subject to washing; 2. Prepare the land well by bedding and re-bedding, or by flat breaking and bedding; 3. Fertilize with manure or commercial fertilizers; 4. Plant good, well bred seed of a variety adapted to the locality; 5. Plant at the usual time that cotton is planted in the locality; 6. Plant 1 bushel of seed per acre, maximum yields cannot be made without a good stand; 7. Plant the seed from one to one and one-half inches deep, depending on condition of soil and moisture; 8. Plant cotton on a bed in East Texas; 9. Chop cotton early when it has from four to six leaves, spacing twelve inches apart; 10. Cultivate shallow frequently enough to conserve moisture—deep cultivation injures plants and causes shedding; 11. Lay by when cotton laps in the middle; 12. Poison the insects if necessary, especially the leaf worms.

Brann's stock bourbon, 100 proof, \$3. per gallon; large bottles of beer per dozen, \$1.35—Chillicothe Valley News.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

**Life on Old J A Ranch  
Is Depicted By Model**

A miniature J A outfit, designed and made by men who have known chuck wagons for a long period of years, and so well made that it is pronounced a work of art, by both artists and ranch men, is the work of Clinton Henry and Jimmie Moore, who have placed the model in the museum of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society at Canyon.

For five months these two men, who have worked for years on the famous J A Ranch, gave all spare time to the construction of a complete chuck wagon outfit which would be a complete reproduction of the one used on the ranch.

Every piece, from the wagon to the butcher knives, coffee cups and Dutch ovens, and from the sacks of feed to the cow pony which stands idly by, is made to scale, and one of the requests of the makers of the outfit was that no one be allowed to measure or copy the model into which they had to put so much careful work and study.

The small outfit is placed in a glass case, the bottom of which is covered with sand exactly like that of the great canyon on which the J A outfit frequently camps. To add to the sense of reality, the makers prepared stage boot and horse track models to give the sand the tramped appearance it should have.

In the midst of this stands the chuck wagon; on one side hangs the quarter of beef, the water barrel, and the stake ropes and pins. On the other side of the wagon is mounted the coffee grinder, a small mirror and a tool box.

On the back of the wagon is the chuck box itself, in the drawers of which are small utensils, forks, knives, bread pan, pie pans, plates and cups and spoons. The chuck box lid forms the cook's table, in real chuck wagon style. Beneath the real spring seat is the commissary, and in the wagon bed behind it the cow punchers' bed rolls are carried; as the wagon stands the beds are piled out on the ground, each roll complete, even to buckles on the tiny straps which hold them together.

Under the spring seat are cases of tomatoes, buckets of Swift's lard, sacks of Arbuckle's coffee, Great West flour, slabs of bacon, and sacks of Omelette for the horses.

Behind the wagon is the pile of wood with the dry ax imbedded in a log and nearby is the fire with pot rack over it and coffee pot, Dutch oven, dish pan and bread pan, meat saw and battered wash pan, sour dough keg and kettles—all the utensils necessary to camp cookery.

On one side of the wagon horse shoes, hoof nippers and branding irons bear testimony to the presence of other workers than the cook.

With a bed roll under his head, and his hat over his eyes, the Mexican cook drowns his spare time away while the horse wrangler lazily awaits his next work. Not far away, Doc, the pet horse of the camp, stands with saddle in place, reins on the ground and hip bunched. The horse was carved out of wood by Clinton Henry with an ordinary pocket knife, but was painted by Harold Bugbee, artist.

The little J A outfit stands in the center of a group of ranch relics, including famous branding irons which tell stories of Northwest Texas.

Here it was recently seen by George Finley Simmons, Texan and now member of the staff of the Cleveland, Ohio, museum. Looking at it he said, "This

**LOOK NOW FOR INFERTILE EGG MARKETS**

College Station.—It is wise for poultry raisers to begin now to look for markets that will pay a premium for infertile eggs, for with the coming of warm weather next month farm eggs will likely be discriminated against in price because of the wide prevalence of fertile eggs. Producers who follow the good management method of selling off most of the roosters now and penning the remainder will be well repaid, provided they make arrangements to dispose of fresh infertile eggs for extra prices. It is usually possible to do this, either individually or through egg circles or associations, for the public demands good eggs and is willing to pay extra to get them.

In suggesting such a course of action, E. N. Holmgren, Poultry Specialist in the Extension Service of A. & M. College, calls attention to the great increase in recent years of co-operative selling of fresh, infertile eggs in Texas. Last year alone groups of farmers and farm women in more than 100 counties sold eggs for premiums ranging from two cents to seven cents per dozen. In most cases local merchants handled these quality eggs on a small margin or bought them outright for resale.

"Some poultry success," says Mr. Holmgren, "depends on keeping up production and getting premiums on infertile eggs. With the coming of warm weather broodiness increases and production falls off unless something is done about it. Put the broody hens into coops in order to break up broodiness and maintain high production so necessary to profits."

**THIEF RETURNS MONEY STOLEN 20 YEARS AGO**

Buffton, Ind.—Fred Carhall, living south of here, is almost willing to believe in Santa Claus and fairy tales after receiving \$25 in an anonymous letter. Nearly twenty years ago while attending a basketball game here, Carhall's pocket was picked, \$15 being taken.

He has just received the following letter, returning the stolen money with interest:

"Please accept this \$25 for the \$15 with interest that I found once. Am sorry that I did it. Please forgive me. I realize that if everything is not made right here, it will be too late over there."

**WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS**

Shipment of marble from the Jordan Marble Mountain, about 28 miles southwest of Alpine, has begun. Two new engines, of 80 and 120 horse power capacity, with new saws, polishing machinery and other equipment, have been installed. The lack of an adequate supply of water which was a new well and a 100,000 gallon reservoir.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be represented at the Lometa Chamber of Commerce annual banquet to be held on May 16, by a staff member who will be seated at the Distinguished Guest table, according to Lucius M. Stephens, secretary.

Hobbs, N. M., has organized a Chamber of Commerce with forty charter members, business men, merchants and others including Alex Reeves, who wrote the WTCC for constitution and by-laws. A delegation was sent to the South Plains district meeting in which Hobbs is located.

Vernon, the home of A. M. Bourland, President of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has recently completed its own membership drive, and turned in a hundred percent increase in memberships in the regional organization.

Rovena, where the first building was erected in 1900, now has fifty religious, educational, business and amusement establishments. The town has a first class telephone system, electric lights, natural gas, a live Chamber of Commerce, progressive citizens and prosperous business men.

Memphis' building program is expected to set a new high record this year. Homes of both frame and permanent construction, business houses and additions to other business houses, including basements, have been finished lately.

Perryton's fire record was one of two in Texas to win national honors. Perryton won second place in Class 5, made up of towns under 20,000 population. El Paso was placed fifth in Class 2 of towns under 500,000 and over 100,000 population. Only 57 cities and towns in the entire United States won honorable mention. Grading and graveling is almost complete on the two mile stretch of the road between the Electra-Archer paving and the Iowa Park road. The new road will give a direct outlet from Electra to the oil field and irrigated valley communities, shortening the route with an all-weather road.

Work has started on a white way lighting system for Tahoka's business section. By reducing the city water pumping rates approximately 30 per cent the white way will be practically no expense to the city. The West Texas Utilities Company will bear the expense of installation.

Construction has started on Hamlin's large lake, and the site for the big iron reservoir has been cleared. Digging of the ditch and laying of the main to town is under way. This lake will hold sufficient water to furnish a city of 25,000 people, and supply Hamlin three years, if necessary, without rain.

More than \$25,000 is being spent on changes and additions to the telephone system of the Pecos-Northwestern Telephone Company. Changing over to the common battery system is expected to be complete by May 1. Pecos has one of the four transcontinental repeater stations in Texas.

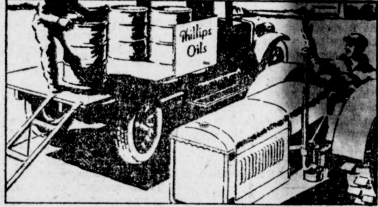

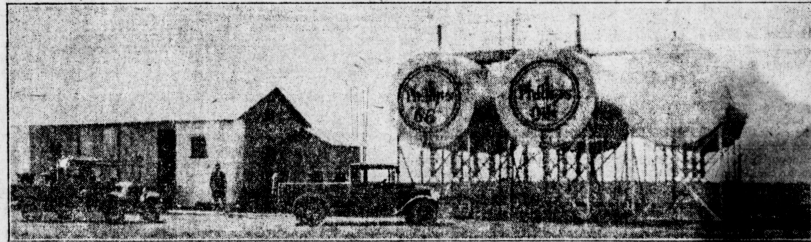

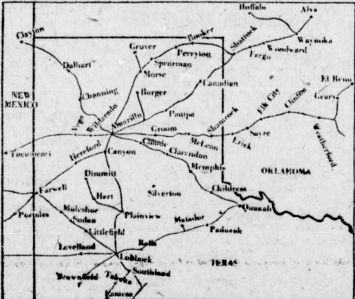

**KNOW TEXAS**

Texas stood ninth in the number of individual income tax returns in 1928 and also in net amount of income, 111,438 Texas reporting \$547,562,501 net income. California, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania were ahead of Texas. Texas had one taxpayer on more than \$5,000,000 net income.

The Texas syrup crop, from sugar cane and sorghum, is valued at \$4,000,000 a year.

Texas produces more sheep and goats and more wool and mohair than any other state in the union.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised by such regulations and orders as the Court by a Majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."  
Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warrantum and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.  
The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or a pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

So far we have not suffered.

**Pioneer Oak is Birthplace Of The Santa Fe Trail**

Council Grove, Kansas—Among the legion of monuments that enshrine the glorious past of this old western outpost, an ancient oak tree, warped and gnarled, is the holy of holies.

Just over a century ago its leafy boughs lent shelter from a broiling midsummer sun to a little group of government emissaries, met in its shade to barter with the Osage chiefs toward a peaceful way to the New Spain of the Southwest.

This was the birthplace of the Santa Fe Trail. A pipe was passed around the circle and red men and white pledged friendship. To the Indians, the federal commissioners gave \$800, and in return promised safe passage through their domain for the white traders and adventurers following the trail to New Mexico.

The pipe was never broken. The treaty was signed August 10, 1825, and as the emissaries turned back to carry their report to President John Quincy Adams, one blazed on the oak the legend, "Council Grove" the name that was given the town founded here on the banks of the Neosho in 1847.

The folk of Council Grove like to tell their neighbors of the old Kaw mission, where Vice President Curtis went to school and whence he fled when the marauding Cheyennes raided the Kaw reservation in 1868; of the old hermit's cave; of Custer; of the unknown Indian's grave, and the fabled burial place of Friar Juan de Padilla, America's first Christian martyr.

But the treaty oak is their special pride.

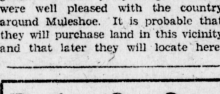

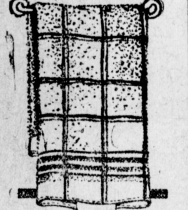

### DETERMINING SUCCESSFUL CROP GROWING

College Station.—Using the slogan, "You can come out on top if you take the proper steps," county agents throughout East Texas have organized the most comprehensive series of cotton and corn demonstrations yet attempted in that section. More than 150 farmer demonstrators in 30 counties have thus far been lined up by agents to undertake this year to grow at least five acres of these two staple crops by the best approved methods as outlined by E. A. Miller, Agronomist in the Extension Service. The object of the work is to show the way to more dollars per acre from cotton and corn, and to establish enough of such demonstrations that neighboring farmers may watch the procedure and judge the results for themselves.

There are two things leading to more dollars per acre as outlined by Mr. Miller, and as D. R. Carpenter, county agent in Gregg county, is telling his farmers: "The lift is not working, take the steps." The steps consist of: 1. Terrace the land if it is subject to washing; 2. Prepare the land well by bedding and re-bedding, or by flat breaking and bedding; 3. Fertilize with manure or commercial fertilizers; 4. Plant good well bred seed of a variety adapted to the locality; 5. Plant at the usual time that cotton is planted in the locality; 6. Plant 1 bushel of seed per acre, maximum yields cannot be made without a good stand; 7. Plant the seed from one to one and one-half inches deep, depending on condition of soil and moisture; 8. Plant cotton on a bed in East Texas; 9. Chop cotton early when it has from four to six leaves, spacing twelve inches apart; 10. Cultivate shallow frequently enough to conserve moisture—deep cultivation injures plants and causes shedding; 11. Lay by when cotton laps in the middles; 12. Poison the insects if necessary, especially the leaf worms.

### 25 COPIES OF STAR-TELEGRAM FOUND AT RAILWAY STATION

An advertisement of the H. Brann & Co., dealers in liquors, says: "We wish to call the attention of the good citizens of Fort Worth to the fact that we are here to stay." Brann's straight bourbon, 100 proof, \$3. per gallon; large bottles of beer per dozen, \$1.35.—Chillicothe Valley News.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars; and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

**Life on Old J A Ranch**  
**Is Depicted By Model**

A miniature J A outfit, designed and made by men who have known chuck wagons for a long period of years, and so well made that it is pronounced a work of art, by both artists and rapt men, is the work of Clinton Henry and Jimmie Moore, who have placed the model in the museum of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society at Canyon.

For five months these two men, who have worked for years on the famous J A Ranch, gave all spare time to the construction of a complete chuck wagon outfit which would be a complete reproduction of the one used on the ranch.

Every piece, from the wagon to the butcher knives, coffee cups and Dutch ovens, and from the sacks of feed to the cow pony which stands idly by, is made to scale, and one of the requests of the makers of the outfit was that no one be allowed to "measure" or copy the model into which they had to put so much careful work and study.

The small outfit is placed in a glass case, the bottom of which is covered with sand exactly like that of the great canyon on which the J A outfit frequently camps. To add to the sense of reality, the makers prepared tiny boot and horse track models to give the sand the tramped appearance it should have.

In the midst of this stands the chuck wagon; on one side hangs the quarter of beef, the water barrel, and stake ropes and pins. On the other side of the wagon is mounted the coffee grinder, a small mirror and a tool box.

On the back of the wagon is the chuck box itself, in the drawers of which are small utensils, forks, knives, bread pan, pie pans, plates and cups and spoons. The chuck box lid forms the cook's table, in gal chuck wagon style. Beneath the real spring seat is the commissary, and in the wagon bed behind it the cow punchers' bed rolls are carried; as the wagon stands the beds are piled out on the ground, each roll complete with buckles on the tiny straps which hold them together.

Under the spring seat are cases of tomatoes, buckets of Swift's lard, sacks of Arbuckle's coffee, Great West flour, slabs of bacon, and sacks of Omeline for the horses.

Behind the wagon is the pile of wood with the tiny ax imbedded in a log and nearby is the fire with pot rack over it and coffee pot, Dutch oven, dish pan and bread pan, meat saw and battered wash pan, sour dough keg and kettles—all the utensils necessary to camp cookery.

On one side of the wagon horse shoes, hoof nippers and branding irons bear testimony to the presence of other workers than the cook.

With a bed roll under his head, and his hat over his eyes, the Mexican cook drowns his spare time away while the horse wrangler lazily awaits his next work. Not far away, Doc, the pet horse of the camp, stands with saddle in place, reins on the ground and hip lunched. The horse was carried out of wood by Clinton Henry with an ordinary pocket knife, but was painted by Harold Bugbee, artist.

The little J A outfit stands in the center of a group of ranch relics, including famous branding irons which tell stories of Northwest Texas.

Here it was recently seen by George Finley Simmons, Texan and now member of the staff of the Cleveland, Ohio, museum. Looking at it he said, "This

is the first model of any kind I have ever seen which was convincing. No ship's model ever suggested a ship at sea, but this tells the whole story of a ranch camp. It is a real work of art, and is located in the region to which it belongs."

The outfit may be seen by all who wish to visit the museum of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, which is housed in the administration building of the Teachers College at Canyon—West Texas Today.
