Work has started on a white way lighting system for Tahoke's business section. By reducing the city water pumping rates approximately 20 per-cent the white way will be practically no expense to the city. The West Texas Utilities Company will bear the expense of installation.

Construction has started on Ham-lin's large lake, and the site for the big iron reservoir has been cleared. Dig-sing of the ditch and laying of the main to town is under way. This lake will hold sufficient water to furnish a city of 2500 people, and suppl Ham-lin three years. if necesary, without rain.




