

ARE YOU KEEPING UP WITH WHAT THE FEDERAL FARM BOARD IS DOING?

The Federal Farm Board las week approved a national organization for the marketing of grain What does that mean to the cotton farmer? The following information issued from the offices of the Farm Board at Washington gives the details of this and any farmer can do his own figuring as to what we of the cotton world will have to do to get lined up with this new movement to better agriculture:

With the filing of Articles of Incorporation at Wilmington, Delaware, to-day the Farmers National Grain Corporation, a central marketing agency for the grain cooperatives of the United States, came into legal existence with neadquarters in Chicago. This is liations. the first national commodity cooperative sales association to be set up under the guidance of the Federal Farm Board. Similar organizations for the wool and mohair and livestock cooperatives are in the process of formation and will be completed at an early date. Organization of the cooper atives handling other commodities on national or regional lines, dependent upon the particular commodity, is being fostered by the Farm Board in the hope that they they too, will put themselves in position to take full advantage of the provisions of the Agriculture

At the call of the ederal Farm Board fifty-two representatives of thrity-six farmer owned garin marketing associations met in Chicago July 26 as the first step in the organization of the corporation. An organization committee of sixteen committee of three members was designated to draft articles of incorporation and by-laws. This sub-committee conferred with the Satisfy. Farm Board in Chicago early in October and again in Washington two weeks later, when complete agreement we reached on the detail of ofganiaztion. The sub-commit tee made its final report to the organization committee in Chicago October 25 and the aritcles of incorporation and bylaws were formally adopted and ordered filed.

The coroporation has an authorized capital stock of \$10,000,000 and no patronage dividends will be distributed until the capital stock and surplus total \$20,000,000. Dividends on all stock will be limited to 8 per cent. Stock may be subscribed for only by farmer elevator associations, farmer owned grain sales agencies, and growers grain pools upon the minimum basis of one \$100 share for each 2000 bushes of all grains handled by the association. Stock may be paid for in full or on terms. If purchased on terms, ten per cent must be paid down, and the balance cov ered by five notes of equal amount one of which is payable annually.

Only associations meeting the provisions of the Capper-Volstead Act my subscribe for the capital stock of the corporation. The main provisions of this Act are:

1. That the membership shall be made up of agricultural producers. 2. That the association must be operated for the mutual benefit of its members.

3. That the Association does not do more business with non-members than with members and

4. The association must conform to one of the follwing: either that it follows the principle of one vote per member, or else dividends on capital stock must be limited to eight per cent.


