H. B. Flanagan Hit By Car

H. B. Flanagan, 33, living four miles northwest of Spur, was fatally injured Monday evening when hit by an automobile. Mr. Flanagan was travelling south on Highway 18 about two miles north of Spur leading his team along the highway. A Ford car driven by Edwin Morris, a carpenter, overtook Flanagan at a point just north of the Duck Creek bridge.

Flanagan received a fracture of the skull above the right eye, one or more broken ribs on the left side which also punctured the left lung causing air to escape into the tissues, a long ugly gash cut through the left groin and a deep incision in the flesh of the right limb just under the knee. Just how bad internal injuries were was not determined, the patient being too weak for an X-ray examination.

Mr. Flanagan was a native Texan having been born in Kaufman County, October 3, 1897. He came to West Texas in 1922 and settled on the Plains. In 1924 he married Miss Hope Loren Odom at Muleshoe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Odom, formerly of Steel Hill community in this county.

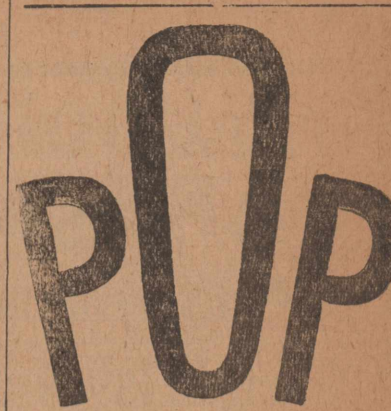
