RICE PILAU (Turkish Pilaf, Risotto, Spanish

2 thin slices salt pork cut into

3-4 cup hot water. 2 medium onions cut fine. 2 cups tomato juice an dpulp.

1-2 cup chopped celery. 4 tablespoons minced parsley.

Fry the salt pork until slightly browned. Add the rice which has of honeysuckle and trumpet, also browned. 


