L. B. Denning, president of the Lone Star Gas Company, who is to be one of the principal speakers at the inspirational sessions of the Texas Press Association Convention which meets in San Angelo June 1, 12 and 13, has played one of the most important parts in the development of Texas natural gas service. At a aime more than 20 years ago when natural gas service was only a name and was looked upon as highly risky business, Mr Denning took the lead in organizing the company which built the state's first long distance gas line

Under the supervision of E. R. Brown, as vice-president and general manager, and W. P. Gage, as superintendent the first pipe line was constructed by the Lone Star Gas Company from the Petrolia field near the Red River to Fort Worth and later to Dallas, this was in 1909. He became president of the Lone Star in 1915 and since then has been instrumental in build ing up a gas system of about 4,000 miles of pipe line, supplying complete gas service to about 300 con

munities in Texas and Oklahoma. Mr. Denning was born in Greens burg, Indiana. He became associated with natural gas interests in 1902 as attorney for gas companies in Southern Ohio, and his contact with the industry covers a period of almost 30 years in the leading

Among the simple home remelies, there is nothing that gives satisfactory relief for earache Various oils have been used. Laudanum is used extensively, a mix ture of carbolic acid and glycerine is used, but none will satisfy every case. This suggestion is for the benefit of the patient; give a dose of aspirin, or some other pain relieveing medicine, the size of the dose reasonable for the age of the patient. If he is not relieved. report to your physician for an ex amination. It is too dangerous to delay very long. -Lubbock Avalanche.

The daily average production for the United States as a whole was 2,376,410 barrels, an increase of 6.9 per cent over MHarch but a reduction of 7.2 from levels reach ed in April, 1930, the Bureau's report said. Imports averaged 229,-857 barrels daily, falling 2.3 per cent below the preceding month and 12 per cent below the corresponding month of last year.

Daily average production in the seven sections of Texas during April, as reported by the American Petroleum Institute, was as follows: Panhandle, 54,320 barrels: North Texas, 57,320 barrels; West Central Texas, 25,150 barrels: West Texas, 225,290 barrels; East Central Texas, 295,510 barrels: Southwest Texas, 62,470 barrels; Coastal Texas, 157,780 barrels. In these figures East Central Texas and East Texas are combined as East Central Texas to affor comparison with previous mon in the Bureau's records.



"If you could only construct a speaker," she said. "which would concentrate the sound as it is concen trated when it comes through the lips then the marvels of radio would be at the disposal of the deaf."

It was such concentration that enabled Miss Keller to learn to talk. By placing her fingers on the lips, nose and larnyx of her teacher, and reproducing with her own lips, throat and to form words and sentences.
