There are two ways to prevent small pox: First, by quarantine on the subjects; and, second, by vaccination. People may be vaccinated at any age between one year and 101. Babies usually have no trouble with vaccination, and when they are one year old is the best time to vaccinate them."

The State Health Department is ges that everybody from the age of one year up take the typhoid and small pox vaccine, and that all tude that sometimes prevailed in children from one year up take the diptheria toxoid. In this work a service that would cost them around \$20.00 to \$25.00 per family.

The vaccine is being ordered, and in the very near future there will be days arranged for people to take it for one or all three of the above named diseases.

Judge Newberry was present at the meeting at Dickens and stated that should an epidemic of disease break out at this time, the county would not be in a financial condition to take care of it. He asks that people take advantge of this opportunity. He stated that it costs the county on an average of \$100 per month to take care of these three diseases by way of quarantine, etc. If people will take the serums at this time it will practically stamp out all three of them for a long time. Typhoid serum has to be repeated every two years, but the others last throughout life.
