WATERMELON RIND DEMONSTRATION

RECIPE FOR WATERMELON RIND PRESERVES

2 lbs rind (prepared). 2 quarts sugar. 4 quarts water. 1 lemon sleed thin. juice of 1-2 lemon.

6 pieces of root ginger. Lime water proportion: 2 tablespoons lime or calcium oxide.

2 quarts water. The thick rind melon is preferred for preserves. Remove peel and all pink meat of melon; soak in lime water over night using proportion above. Next morning drain and allow to stand in fresh cold water for two hours. Drain, drop in boilng water, cook very rapidly for ten minutes. Drain again, and add gradually to the syrup (made by boiling the sugar and water). Add the melon juice and root ginger which has been cut into about half inch lengths. Cook until the rind is tender and transparent. About 15 minutes before it has finished cooking, add the slices of lemon. Avoid breaking or tearing the

Pack firmly into sterilized standard glass containers. Fill to over-flowing. Garnish with slices of lemon or a bit of root ginger. Seal and process 15 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. Wash and label


