Sam Z. Hall to the effect that the first payment of one dollar on the per capita apportionment of \$17.50 will be paid on November 10, 1931 to all counties having ex-officio county superintendents and to independent districts in said counties having separate depositories. This will be net from the state to all of the schools in said counties dependent districts in said counties having separate depositories. 




