



A New Tax System Now Being Talked

A new system of taxation for Texas is being advocated by many people of the state. The basis of this tax is to be placed on earnings instead of property values. To illustrate the plan: instead of a farmer paying taxes on his land at a fixed value each year whether it makes him a dime or not, he is to pay taxes on the cotton, feed, cattle, hogs and other products the farm produces. The ranchman the farm produces. The taxation for it happened to be shipped and was not in the state on a particular date should not excuse the oil from taxation. Gas and other natural products would come in for taxes, and probably the gasoline tax would be lowered some.

A tax would be assessed on luxuries and on all drinks of the price to pay taxes on the cotton, feed, cattle, hogs and other products the farm produces. The ranchman the farm produces. If the ranchman has purchased the cattle and placed them on his ranch, he is supposed to deduct the purchase price and the man he buys them from pays taxes on that

taxation since it is assessed in proportion to people's ability to pay.
Farms in Dickens County the past three years have been a losing proposition. Still ,the farmers owning the farming business. Grass on the ranches may dry out during the summer and fall and the ranchman the taxes were justly equalized that the taxes on real estate would be summer and fall and the ranchman sustain great losses in cattle, yet he must pay his taxes on the ranch for values set a year in advance. If the farmer paid taxes on his cotton sold, his taxes would be paid at the time the sale is made. If the ranchman paid taxes on the cattle sold his taxes would be paid when he received his check for the cattle. If the farm or ranch made nothing there would be no taxes to be paid.

The same principle would apply

to the merchant. All merchants have to compute their gross income to comply with the present income tax law. Each month, or other inventory period, he could make his computation and pay his taxes before he spent the money for other things. In other words, you pay taxes according to the way you prosper. If you make hig money, you pay big taxes; if you make little money, your taxes will be small.




