the educational appropriations. The judiciary appropriation bill has passed both branches of the Legislature and has been signed by the Governor. The eleemosynary and departmental bills are in the hands of free conference committees to adjust differences between House and Senate measures. The appropriation bills call for reductions from 25 to 35 per cent below figures of the past two years.

RATE REDUCTION SAVES FARMERS BIG MONEY

As a result of rate reduction the farmers of Dickens County had saved \$28,869 on their cotton up to January 16. The rate of transportation from Spur to coast shipping points was reduced from 92 cents per hundred to 72 cents in 1931. This was approximately one dollar per bale of 500 pounds, Railroads put this rate into effect in 1931 and truck lines followed suit when truck transportation
