### NEGRESS EFFECTIVE WITH PISTOL

Mary Jones, colored, shot and killed Razz Jones, another negro, about ten o'clock Saturday night. Mary stated that at the examining trial that she was forty years of age and had been living with Jones for sometime, taking care of him. She said that Jones had threatened to "bust her brains out and leave the country."

Mary went to the colored Methodist Church Saturday evening to an entertainment and stated that Jones followed her and called her out of the church after she had gone in and sat down. She went out and said that Jones told her she was going home. He told her to follow him and went to his car which was parked in the highway some distance from the church. He got into the car and when she attempted to get into the car he forbid her doing so. She started back toward the church when he called to her to go to the other side of the car. When she reached the other side of the car she stated he put her arm upon the car window and Jones grabbed her. He drew back with an iron tool threatening to kill her. Mary stated she aimed to shoot him in the arm and make him drop the iron, but missed and the shot took effect in Jones' body killing him instantly. There were no eye witnesses to the shooting.

The result Sunday morning was that one negro was in eternity and another in jail. A preliminary hearing was held before Judge Malone's Court and bond prepared. The case came up before the next term of District Court.

### HANEY'S STORE ROBBED

The store of J. N. Haney and Son at Afton was broken into Wednesday night of last week and merchandise cash were taken. The officers have amounting to \$250 to \$300 and some good clues as to who are the guilty parties but so far no one has been taken into custody.

With visitors expected from the Texas Technological College, the Texas A. & M. College, the Extension Service, the Department of Agriculture at Washington, the packers at Fort Worth and feeders from all parts of Texas and New Mexico, the Feeders Day at the Spur Experiment Station tomorrow is expected to command a very large crowd. The farmers of Spur country and all counties adjoining will find some very interesting things which have been worked out during this feeding project. The 85 steers have been fed with grain sorghums, cotton seed and cotton seed meal which are staple crops in West Texas. Farmers are extended an invitation to be present tomorrow and take notes of what has been done.

The following values were placed on the feeds and grinding: Milo heads, \$4.00 per ton; Bundle feeds, \$2.00 per ton; silage \$1.00 per ton; cotton seed meal \$15.00 per ton; cotton seed \$7.00 per ton; oyster shell \$25.00 per ton; grinding \$1.25. There were seven pens fed on different rations to determine the various degrees of gain.

Pen No. 1 was fed chopped sumac cane bundles, milo heads chopped, cottonseed meal and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 2 was fed chopped kaffir bundles, milo head chops, cottonseed meal and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 3 was fed chopped hegari bundles, milo head chops, cotton seed and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 4 was fed chopped sumac cane bundles, milo heads chops, cotton seed and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 5 was fed sumac can bundles (not chopped), milo heads, cotton seed and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 6 was fed sumac silage, milo head chops, cottonseed meal and oyster shell flour.

Pen No. 7 was fed sumac silage, milo head chops, cottonseed meal, no oyster shell flour.

It is very interesting to know the difference in gain made by these animals on these various rations. Everything will be displayed tomorrow for the benefit of the visitors, and these are the records as kept by the feeders during the 160 days closing yesterday.

There are many things to take into consideration in feeding cattle. First, the fattening ability of the animals; second, the quality of beef as judged by the packers; third, the cost of feeds on the market, and other things.

### MRS. M. B. HAILE ENJOYS BIRTHDAY

Mrs. M. B. Haile, who has been a citizen of Dickens County close on to forty years, celebrated her 85th birth- day anniversary last Sunday. Mrs. Haile was 85 Saturday, April 29, but Sunday was the great day with her.

Her children, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Haile, made Sunday a gala day for Mrs. Haile by preparing a great dinner and inviting a great number of old friends to be present. Those present for the day were:

Han- ey, Mrs. Lula Mae Haney and child- ren, Jim Tom, Chas. Edward and Mary Helen, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Brad dock, all of Afton; Mrs. C. C. Gay of Dickens; Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Hale, Miss Annie Mae Hale, Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Hale and two daughters, Ernestine and Marion, Mrs. Kate Buchan- an, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Starcher and son, Billie D., Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Haile, all of Spur; Mrs. Jimmie King and Mrs. John Smith of Matador.

In speaking of the guests Mr. Haile stated that their desire was to invite the pioneer settlers who had been as- sociates of his mother in early days. The mother was the guest of honor at the first table at the dinner. There were ten people seated at this table whose combined ages totaled 692 years, an average of more than 69 years to the person.

Dr. Haney, Biedy Hicks, Fred C. Haile and C. C. Haile formed the or- chestra which furnished music for the day. Pleas Curd and Mrs. Biedy Hicks gave some beautiful piano solos.

In speaking of events Mrs. Haile said that her maiden name was Miss Mary B. Hodges and that she was born in Tennessee April 29, 1848. She came to Texas in 1853 and settled with her parents in Grayson County about eight miles north of Whites- boro. She stated that she attended school in Whitesboro and at one time counted the houses of the town which numbered 48. The town was named from A. B. White who was among the first business men in the community. She quit school at Whitesboro in 1865 when the soldiers of the Civil War began returning home. She stated that her father and four brothers were in the Confederate Army.

In speaking of the Civil War days she said that her family carded, spun and wove all the cloth that was used by the family for clothing, bed cloth- ing, etc. and they made all the yarn and knitted all the socks and stockings that the family used. All the work was done by hand as there was no sewing machine. She said the first sewing machine she ever saw was in Cooke County and she was the mother of three children at that time. In speak- ing of fine dresses she said that the first dress she ever had after the Civil War made from factory cloth was when she was twenty years of age. She then related of how the boys under 18 years of age had to fight off the Indians while the older men were in the Confederate Army. She related of how her father after the Civil war fought the Indians and of the perilous days they had to endure.

She said she had lived a frontier life. She moved to Montague County and lived at Bowie before the railroad was built there. Later her father moved to Throckmorton County and was living there when the drought of 1886 struck. She said friends from Bowie tried to induce her father to return east and went to Throckmorton with teams to take his belongings, but he refused to go.

She related an amusing incident of Civil War days. She said that a woman of the eastern states was being per- secuted by the Union soldiers. Her husband was in the Southern Army and she saw the Union soldiers were going to destroy everything she had. So the woman collected some things and started for Texas on a horse. She had secured several bolts of cloth in- cluding calico. Mrs. Haile stated that she had a girl chum who traded this woman a cow and calf for ten yards of calico to make a new dress. She said that a new calico dress in those days was the peak of fashion.

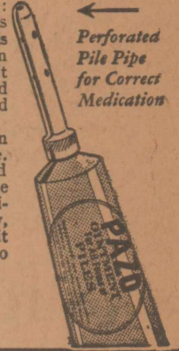

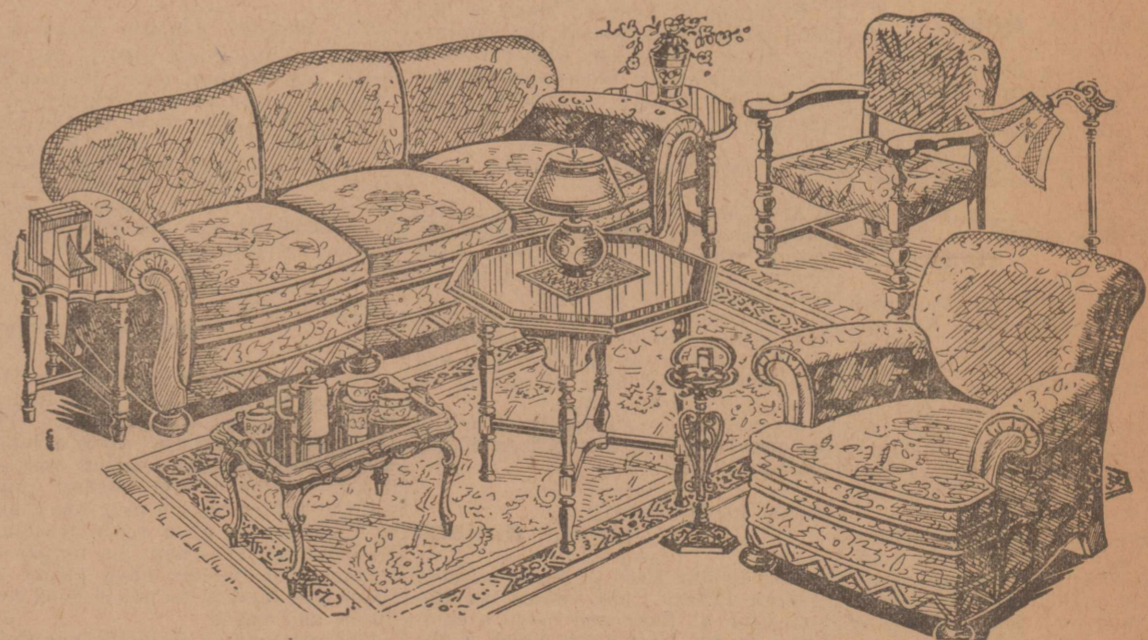

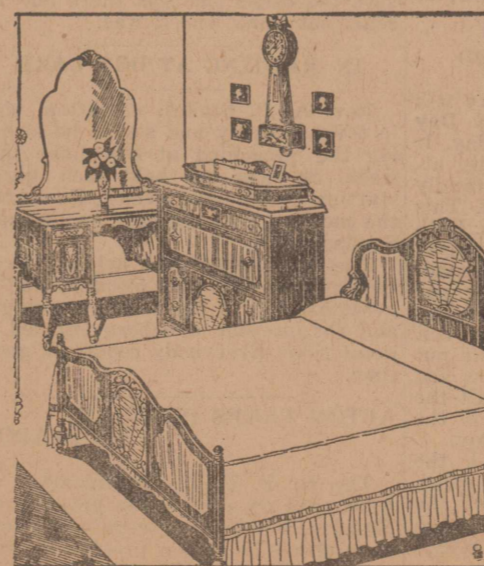

Officials of the Texas State Teachers Association have issued a call for a regional educational rally, to be held at the Lubbock Senior High School from 10:00 to 12:00 a. m. next Saturday, May 6, M. H. Duncan, superintendent of the Lubbock Public Schools has announced.

Dr. J. T. Hutchinson, president of the Lubbock School Board will preside, President Bradford Knapp of the Texas Technological College, Tom Garrard, member of the State Board of Education.

All school people in the South Plains section interested in public school finance are invited to the meeting.
